THE FOUNDATION OF TOKOROA HIGH SCHOOL

Tokoroa High School was opened officially in October, 1957 to meet the educational needs of one of the most rapidly expanding towns in New Zealand. Let us briefly review the developments which were so important in the growth of Tokoroa, and therefore in the decision to build a High School here.

Before 1937 farming in the Tokoroa district was uneconomic because its pumice soils lacked the trace element cobalt. After years of patient research the absence of this substance was detected and the introduction of the use of cobaltized phosphate and stock licks here transferred this area into a prosperous farming region.

Concurrent with the revival of farming was the establishment of 175,000 acres of pine plantations, on which the timber industries at Kinleith are based. Then in 1953 the New Zealand Forest Products Company opened its timber, pulp and paper mills at Kinleith.

The effect these events had on the population figures for Tokoroa is obvious. In 1947 the population here was 146. In 1957 it was 7,000. In 1950 the school population was 330. In 1958 it has grown to 1,500.

The Tokoroa East School, which had been built in 1915, soon reached a point where it could no longer handle this greatly increased school population, so the Education Department began an extensive building programme here. The Tokoroa Central School was opened in 1954, Amisfield in 1956, and Matarawa in 1958.

Meanwhile, the need for the provision of secondary education here had grown apace. During the 1940's secondary pupils were sent to the secondary department of the Putaruru District High School. When this solution became inadequate as Tokoroa grew into a large town, various methods of providing secondary education here were considered. The idea of a secondary department attached to East School was discussed. Finally, mainly because of the efforts of the then Chairman of the South Auckland Education Board, Colonel T. Durrant, Mr J. Currie, of Forest Products, and others, a forty-acre block was bought on Maraetai Road and a full post-primary school planned.

In 1956 a deputation from the Education Department met interested residents, who decided that a full post-primary school should be established, and that it should have its own Board of Governors.

In the meantime the contract to build three blocks of the "Porirua" type of school had been let to Churchouse & Shirley, Ltd. Along with odd sub-contractors this firm faced the usual difficulties and setbacks, and the School was approaching a habitable condition by February 1957. On opening day the Board considered that the grounds and buildings were not ready for occupation and school was

held at the Community Centre and rooms lent by the East School. Two weeks later the 121 foundation pupils and seven staff members moved to the new High School buildings in Maraetai Road.

In September, 1956 the Board of Governors was set up with the following representation:

Colonel T. Durrant, Governor-General's Appointee;

Mrs Z. A. Paul, South Auckland Education Board's Representative;

J. K. Logan, Matamata County Council Representative;

Messrs Sholto Black and R. W. Mayne, School Committee Representatives of the South Auckland Education Board;

Mr R. Taylor acted as Interim Secretary.

A Principal was chosen by the Board in September, 1956 and the foundation staff appointed towards the end of 1956.

Early in 1957 four Parents' Representatives were elected. These were Messrs J. Shorland, J. Hassall and Dr J. Brunt. In 1958 Mr J. Shorland resigned and Mr A. H. Leggatt was elected to the Board.

The School buildings themselves are pleasantly situated just to the south-west of Tokoroa itself, on a forty-acre block between Maraetai Road and Billah Street. The School consists of an administration block (A Block), and two blocks of classrooms (D and C Blocks). A further block of classrooms will be built soon. The appearance of the School, with its low, flat-roofed structure and multi-coloured walls, harmonize well with the general impression of modernity which the town itself gives. In design, the School is of the Porirua type, in which the need for long space-wasting corridors is eliminated by building each block as a separate unit. This is usually called "dispersed block design." Each block contains six rooms, ultra-modern in decoration, design and furnishing. A particularly good feature of our School is that the rooms are always light and airy, having large areas of windows. We have been lavishly supplied with specialist rooms — Woodwork, Metalwork, Homecraft, Social Studies, Technical Drawing, Laboratories, Shorthand-typing. Much common sense has gone into the design of facilities for pupils. There are sickrooms, a bookroom, prefects' rooms, lockers, bicycle sheds and steam heaters. The Assembly Hall in the administration block provides all sorts of opportunities for extra-curricula activities such as drama, gymnastics, films, and music. This is 70 feet long by 50 feet wide with a stage 20 feet by 50 feet. This has proved a tremendous asset in school life, and an advantage which many older schools do not possess.

THE OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE TOKOROA HIGH SCHOOL

Tokoroa High School was officially opened by Sir David Henry, on October 19th, 1957, before a large gathering of parents and visitors. After the National Anthem, addresses were given by Colonel T. Durrant, D.S.O., and Mr le F. Ensor, M.A., B.Sc., Dip. Ed. After welcoming visitors, Colonel Durrant said that he was pleased to have been associated with the original thinking which went into the planning of the school, and thanked the Education Department for what it had done for Tokoroa. Mr Ensor, district superintendent of education, Auckland, then reviewed the progress of education in New Zealand from the early 1900's to the present. He drew attention to the growth of technical education and the revolution that has taken place in regard to the number of pupils who now come on to High School.

Before performing the opening ceremony Sir David Henry thanked the Education Department for the manner in which it had looked after the needs of the town and the Board of Governors for the efforts it had made to establish the school. He then spoke of the purposes of education.

Finally, the climax of this impressive ceremony was reached when the whole assembly stood during the Official Opening and the unveiling of the plaque by Sir David Henry.

This was followed by an expression of thanks by Mr F. R. G. Aitken, M.A., B.Com., Senior Inspector of Post-Primary Schools, Wellington.

After the Opening Ceremony the school proceeded to its first assembly, which was dedicated by His Lordship the Bishop of Waikato.

END OF YEAR CEREMONY, 1957

The programme opened with "A Saga of Christmas," presented by pupils and assisted by junior pupils from Central School. In his opening speech Colonel T. Durrant welcomed parents and visitors and complimented those who presented "A Saga of Christmas." The guest speaker for the occasion was Mr Rowe, M.A., who gave an interesting address on the place of education in a modern community.

BOYS' SPORT ATHLETICS

In their first year in an inter-school athletic competition the boys of Tokoroa High School performed creditably in the Mid-Island Athletic Meeting at Mangakino on March 29th. The most successful athlete was D. Cowley in the senior boys' competition. He won the high jump, came second in both the shot-put, for which he entered on his own initiative at the time of the event, and third in the 220 yards. T. Puckey with a third place in the 440 yards gained the only other individual senior success. The senior relay team gained third place.

In the junior competition, P. Mischewski gained first place in the high jump and third place in the 100 yards. J. Banks was placed third in the high jump and J. Anderson third in the broad jump. The relay team gained second place.

In the Waikato Inter-Secondary School Sports at Hamilton against far stronger competition the only successful competitor was P. Mischewski, who gained third place in the junior 220 yards.

RUGBY

Despite the fact that none of our Rugby teams won a title, we had a successful season with the lower grade teams. A good first XV should develop in the future on present indications.

3rd Grade

The third grade team had a brief life during which time they lost eight games, two of which were by default. During its short life the team took some severe thrashings and some milder beatings. Fortunately or unfortunately, the team collapsed and died after this treatment. THE LIBRARY

Although the Library is still in its temporary home in C Block until B Block is erected, there are now 1,150 volumes in daily use and the books have not quite overflowed the shelves, although the willing band of pupils who are librarians, led by Diane Wilson, have the difficulties of chalk and untidiness to deal with as it is, unfortunately, used as a classroom. The "Waikato News," the "Te Ao Hou," "Paris-Match," "Health," "The Rotarian," "Free World," "New Citizen," "Realite," "The Listener," "Agriculture" and "The Gardener" are among the magazines received and Moorhouse made a useful rack for them to be displayed.

Pupils are reading keenly and there are waiting lists for such books as "Over My Dead Body," by June Opie, and all career books. The plastic covers, although dear, preserve the attractive dust covers and encourage borrowing.

DRAMA

In March a large group of pupils from Tokoroa High School went to Rotorua to see a production of George Bernard Shaw's "Pygmalion" by the New Zealand Players. This was the first major dramatic production the school had ever seen and everyone thoroughly enjoyed it.

Later, in July, the School was visited by a group from the New Zealand Players who presented short scenes from twelve different playwrights, ranging from Euripides to Thornton Wilder. These were ingeniously selected so as to form a sort of tableau depicting youth throughout the ages.

Finally, on September 30th, the School had its own drama evening. Four classes presented plays (3Q "Queer Street," 3P "The Golden Mean," 4X "Aloysius," 4Y "The Man With the Big Cigar"). These performances were enthusiastically received by a large audience. This was the School's first venture into amateur dramatics and a high standard of achievement has been set for the future.

The current project of P.T.A. is the provision of outside dressing and shower rooms. This is urgent, as the present facilities are inadequate. It is proposed to hold film evenings and other entertainments to enable the necessary finance to be raised.

The executive takes this opportunity of thanking those members who have given time and assistance during the past year, and hopes to increase considerably the membership during 1959.

ANZAC SERVICE

The School Anzac Service was held on Thursday, April 24th, in the Assembly Hall. The service commenced with the National Anthem, and was followed by the presentation of foundation certificates to last year's pupils. The presentation of the School Motto in the form of a dramatic dialogue then followed. After the singing of the School Hymn and the reading from the Bible, Colonel T. Durrant, D.S.O., spoke on the significance of Anzac. The service was concluded with the singing of "God Save the Queen."

EXCHANGE VISITS

Towards the end of the second term Mr Dawe left on a Fullbright award to teach for one year at Simsbury High School, Connecticut, U.S.A. He will be teaching English and History to senior forms. We hope his stay in the United States will be a pleasant and profitable one.

In exchange for Mr Dawe, we have acquired Miss Mary Clark, M.A., from Simsbury High School. Miss Clark was officially welcomed to Tokoroa and the School at a special assembly held on the first day of the third term. We are very pleased to have Miss Clark with us and hope she enjoys her stay.

TUCK SHOP

The Tuck Shop opened for business on September 24th. On the first day only Coca-Cola was available for sale. The saturation point of the pupils was under-estimated and the initial order of 30 dozen disappeared in the short space of three days. Hot weather and the School steeplechase pushed sales higher than had been expected.

The second day saw a variety of sweets available for sale. It was soon to be seen that the most popular items were those that could be sold for a penny or twopence.

As soon as power is laid on, a refrigerator will be installed. Ice-creams and cold drinks will then be available. Other items planned are an oven for heating pies, a Zip heater for supplying hot water for cocoa next winter, and possibly, when finance is available, a milk shake machine.

EVENING CLASSES

As the result of a survey made during 1957, which indicated considerable interest in both recreational classes for adults, and in continuation classes for those who had recently left school, it had become obvious that an important part of the School's services would become the provision of tutors, classrooms and equipment for an Evening School. Little could be done during 1957 to achieve this end, due to the lack of heating and other limitations, but a start was made in March 1958, when over 200 students, of ages from 15 to over 50, enrolled for classes in English, French, Mathematics, Dress-making, Millinery, Typing, Woodwork, and various branches of Engineering.

During the second term, a group of enthusiasts made enquiries concerning the provision of a class in the Maori language, as a result of which two highly-qualified tutors were engaged, and in this connection it is worth noting that provided suitable teachers can be found, the School can provide classes in any subject for which there is a demand from at least a dozen students.

Next year, in addition to extending the range of present classes, it is hoped to explore the possibility of running short, intensive courses of ten or twelve weeks' duration, in a number of more specialised subjects.

It was a drizzly day as we stepped outside and headed towards the broken-down shed where the antique Lizzy Ford was kept. It didn't have a Warrant of Fitness, so we couldn't drive it on the road, but we could go along the railway line, and that is what we did.

When we reached our destination we climbed out and set off into the native bush. We had two dogs, called Tip and Spot, with us. Sending them out into the bush, we followed a narrow, muddy track, which seemed to be heading for a cliff face, but later we found that it went along its face. After travelling about three miles we heard a bark and a pig squeal. Heading toward the noise we finally came upon the two dogs holding a young pig by the ears. All of a sudden the pig dipped his head and brought it up again, ripping Tip's chest wide open. My brother shot the pig and took off his coat. He told me to lift Tip while he put his coat under the dog and tied the sleeves together.

I felt hungry, so I opened the bag containing the food and, giving some to my brother, proceeded to eat. After a while we decided to go on as it was getting late. With my brother carrying Tip, and me half the pig (we left the other half behind) we followed the track. After walking for an hour and a quarter we suddenly found ourselves going in the wrong direction. We back-tracked and found that we had taken the wrong track. Spot was puffing and we were exhausted, so we sat down and tried to decide which way to go.

My brother told me to climb a tree and see where we were. I tried three trees, but couldn't climb them, as the branches were few and far apart. The only thing to do was to walk and hope. It was getting on for seven o'clock as we set off down a steep slope. We walked, it seemed, for hours, when we finally came out of the bush on to a road which we recognised as the one we had just been up in the Lizzy. We trudged the final miles to the truck to find that we had walked in a big semi-circle. We drove the Lizzy home without any lights (it didn't have any), sometimes banging into the fences alongside the railway line. When we got home I dropped, exhausted, on the bed without getting changed or washed. When I woke up in the morning, Tip was dead.

On disembarking, we crossed over the famous Pontoon Bridge and saw the Floating Market. After changing our money for Curacaoon currency, we hired a taxi, which took us on a tour of the island. This tour lasted 1½ hours, and included a trip round the Botanical Gardens to the oldest Synagogue in the Western Hemisphere, and a drive through the residential sections to the historic "slave bridge," and to Ararat Hill, overlooking the Caribbean. Passing through the Panama Canal, we had our next thrilling experience. We were connected to trains before the first lock, and these pulled us through the three sets of gates. Although this was the last time we set foot on land until we reached New Zealand, I feel two more incidents on board are worthy of relating.

Not long after leaving Panama, the Crossing The Line ceremony was held. People were dragged forward to be judged by King Neptune. Then his men tortured the guilty by rubbing dough in their hair, hosing them, stuffing fish in their mouths, and finally ducking them in the pool. The ceremony over, Neptune let the water out of the pool, and everyone was caught by a storm of water and kippers. Afterwards we were presented with "Crossing The Line" certificates.

A visit from the Pitcairn Islanders was the most touching experience of our trip. One evening at eight o'clock, we anchored off the Pitcairn Islands, and the islanders rowed out to us in their little boats, despite the stormy sea. With them they brought novelties such as coral, shell, fans, and also loads of luscious fruits.

As it was a Saturday, and their Sabbath, they demanded no payment for their wares. Unfortunately, their stay was only brief, but as they slowly drew away from the ship, they sang in unison, "We Shall Meet At The Shore," which left us with tears in our eyes, but a memory to treasure in our heart.

The rest of the voyage was uneventful and it was wonderful to see, at last, the sun shining over Wellington Harbour, and to wonder what the new life in New Zealand held for us.
