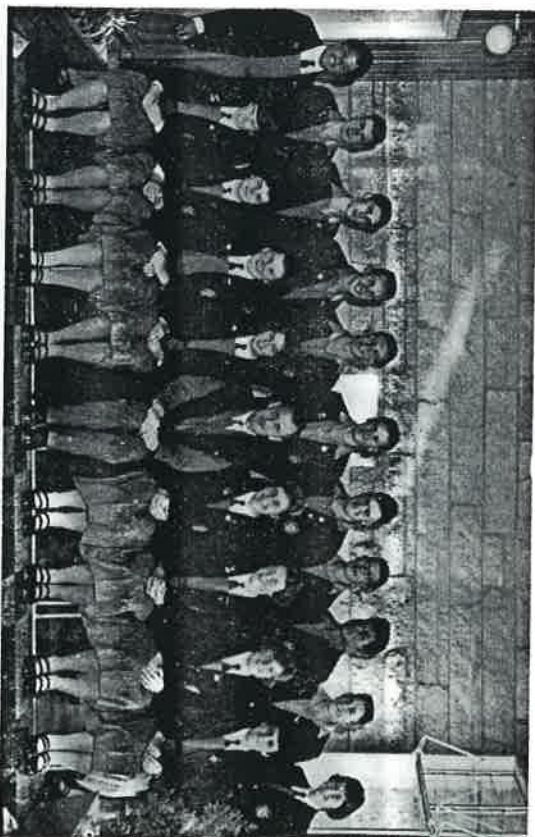

EDITORIAL

This year Tokoroa High School completes its fourth year of existence. Four years is not very long in the life of a school but already our School has changed so much that it is hard to call to mind what it was like in February, 1957.

The physical appearance of the school has changed almost beyond recognition. Where four years ago our three incomplete buildings stood on a waste of pumice dust and builders' debris now four blocks stand in a smooth oasis of green. Our concrete paths and sealed drives were not very evident on opening day.

The school has changed in other obvious ways too. Our roll has begun that steady increase that will one day make our school very large indeed. With this increase in roll has come an increase in staff and a great growth of extra-curricular activities. Not only rugby and cricket and basketball but also indoor basketball, hockey, soccer, tennis and golf have taken their place in school life. We have staged dramatic performances, provided musical programmes and put on a physical education display.

These are all examples of progress that is easily seen. There are, however, signs of a different and more important kind of progress. We are developing a core of pupils who are at school for the serious purpose of learning; who intend to leave well qualified for their chosen occupations. They are not to be found in any particular course or group. They are not necessarily the most gifted. But they all have one quality in common, the ability to settle down to a task and do it to the best of their abilities.

Tokoroa High School will change in the future. Its roll will grow and its buildings will multiply. But in the long run our reputation as a school will depend on our producing an ever greater proportion of hard working and conscientious young people.

END OF YEAR CEREMONY, 1959

The annual Prize Giving Ceremony was held in the School Assembly Hall on December 7th, 1959. Guests were welcomed by the Chairman of the Board of Governors, Mr J. K. Logan who then addressed the School. Mr G. Anstice then gave the Principal's Report outlining the School's activities and progress during 1959.

The Guest Speaker was the Hon. R. Boord, Minister of Customs. Mr Boord spoke on the value of education and the need for young people to make use of the great opportunities that are offered them.

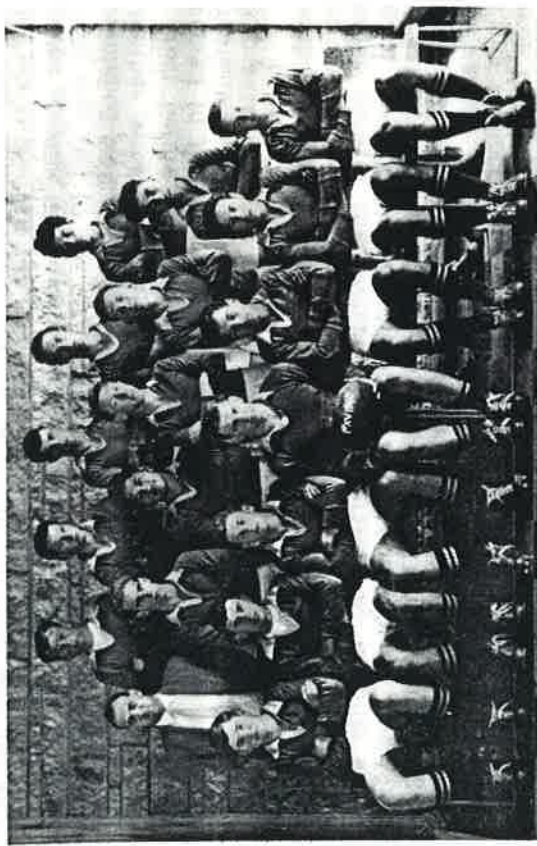
1st FIFTEEN

The backs from the start showed they were prepared to spin the ball and run hard and as a result scored many tries. As a unit they functioned very smoothly. McLeod and Pilcher were a happy combination and set the line off well. J. Seymour

RESULTS OF INTER-SCHOOL GAMES

v. Taupo Won 18-0

In ideal conditions Tokoroa convincingly defeated Taupo by six tries to nil. The heavier Tokoroa forwards won a monopoly of the ball and the backs turned on some fine attacking movements. Sound team work and persistent attacks eventually broke down the Taupo defence and provided openings for V. Seymour to score four tries.

v Tamaki lost 9-6

A good crowd witnessed what was without doubt the best School exhibition of football given by Tokoroa High School team, in an even and exciting game against Tamaki.

From the start the heavier Tamaki forwards drove back the Tokoroa pack with vigorous bursts and tight rucking and dominated the first fifteen minutes of play. However, determined defence by the local backs kept Tamaki from crossing for a try,

and although they had a marked territorial advantage, the visitors could only score from a penalty. The Tokoroa forwards rallied well and began to win an even share of the ball. J. Seymour provided the first thrill for the home supporters when he penetrated from a back movement, ran deep into the Tamaki half and kicked ahead, but the opposing full-back won the race for the ball. The forward battle was now very even with both packs playing tight and constructive football and play switched from one end to the other frequently. The backs of both sides combined well but gaps were hard to find. Tamaki scored from another penalty to lead 6-0 after 25 minutes.

Just before half time Pitcher ran the blind from a lineout, veered in field to beat two men and passed outside again for Watkins to score in the corner. Half time score Tamaki 6, Tokoroa 3.

In the second half play continued to be very fast and even, with the exception that F. Townsend became increasingly more prominent in the forwards as the game progressed, and in the latter part of the second half dominated the lineouts and a good deal of the general play. But the defence of both sides was sound and it was 20 minutes before Tamaki scored a good try wide out following a bustling short passing rush by the forwards. Tokoroa retaliated and kept Tamaki on the defence. From a short penalty, Townsend cross kicked and V. Seymour won the race for the ball to score the final points of the game. Congratulations to both teams on a fast and enjoyable game.

V. Mangakino Won 13-0

The first half of the game was scrappy and although Tokoroa won a lion's share of the ball, careless errors and the bustling tactics of the Mangakino side kept attacking movements to a minimum. The Mangakino forwards were no match for Tokoroa in scrums and lineouts but were very quick to the loose ball and almost scored on several occasions.

After the interval Tokoroa looked a different side and tight forward play forced the roving Mangakino forwards back into the rucks with the result that the backs with more room to move frequently penetrated and three good team tries resulted.

THIRD GRADE REPRESENTATIVES

Congratulations to F. Townsend, J. Seymour, J. McLeod, M. Pitcher, B. Waghorn, V. Weatherley, and G. Watkins on their selection for the South Waikato teams and particularly to J. Seymour who scored four tries for this team against the Mangakino representatives.

2nd FIFTEEN

1960 proved to be a most successful season. The team was unbeaten and scored 108 points for and had 20 points scored against. Only two tries were scored against the team. This

was a reflection of the type of game played which depended on a tight cover defence rather than any particular outstanding attacking player. Top scorer was Des Kelly (35 points). All these points came from kicks. Tries were spread evenly throughout the team. Eight of the team played in the South Waikato 4th grade repres. at either Mangakino or Morrinsville. In both these games Tokoroa High School players were the leading scorers.

Only one inter-school game was played outside club competition. This was a decisive victory (31-3) against Mangakino District High School. The games were won by good teamwork against teams which were generally larger. The two classic movements of the season were runs from our 25 to the opposing team's goal line by John Banks and Tony Logan, with a run by the latter resulting in a try. These two were the principal try scorers with Logan scoring six tries and Banks four tries in 4th grade games during the season.

3rd FIFTEEN

The third fifteen competed in the local Saturday fifth grade competition and although the boys played well they were only placed third equal at the end of the season. The season started well with the defeat of Pirates but there followed a series of hard games which we narrowly lost. The team finished the season with the conduct cup which was won by half a point from Pirates.

In the inter-school matches the team had some very successful games as they were more evenly matched in size and weight. Two of the best games were played against Mangakino, which was won by 23-0 and against Taupo which was won by 19-0.

The team was ably led by Brent Chambers and was well coached by Mr Culliford. Some of the boys finished the season with South Waikato representative honours. They were B. Chambers, R. Hunter and A. McClymont.

SOCCER

This year Association football was introduced into the School. Although it has been only a minor sport, a group of keen, if not highly skilled, players enjoyed the Thursday afternoon games.

No school team was selected but two combined teams had a good day's football at Te Awamutu, winning one game and losing the other.

With the number of promising young players interested, it may be possible to form a regular school team next year.

INDOOR BASKETBALL

Once again the School can be proud of its three indoor basketball teams who turned out regularly with full teams and correct uniforms.

Playing constructive basketball they set a fine example to other teams on how the game should be played.

Many of our players gained representative honours, Ratahi Rapana, as a most successful shooter, Dave Morgan playing terrific games at guard whose rebound play and drive for the basket was not bettered, and Joe McLeod as the most improved player of the season. These were but a few.

We must give special thanks to those players who turned out regularly but did not always get a run, and to our captains, Ratahi Rapana, Verrel Weatherley and Dave Morgan, who kept our team spirit high.

SCHOOL "A" INDOOR BASKETBALL TEAM

This year's "A" team has had what must be regarded as the most successful season ever had by a high school indoor basketball team. The team, consisting of eight players—D. Morgan (captain), R. McLeod, F. Townsend, T. Puckey, J. Rennie, M. Pilcher, G. Watkins, Mr G. Peters—lost only four out of twenty games and as well as winning the handicap round, were runners-up in the competition.

Indoor started off successfully for the girls this year considering that the majority of them had not experienced the game before. The team consisted of:

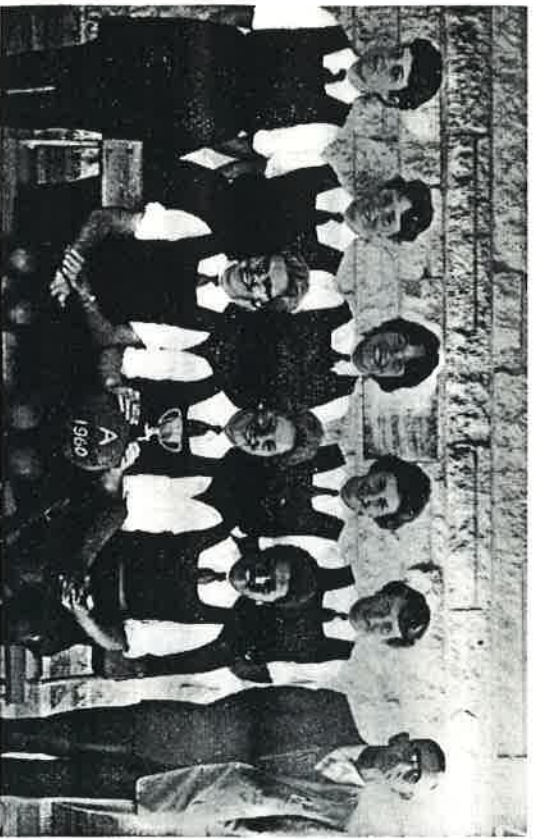

The hockey season opened at the beginning of the Second Term with the formation of two teams. These were coached under Miss Hoe and Mrs Robertson.

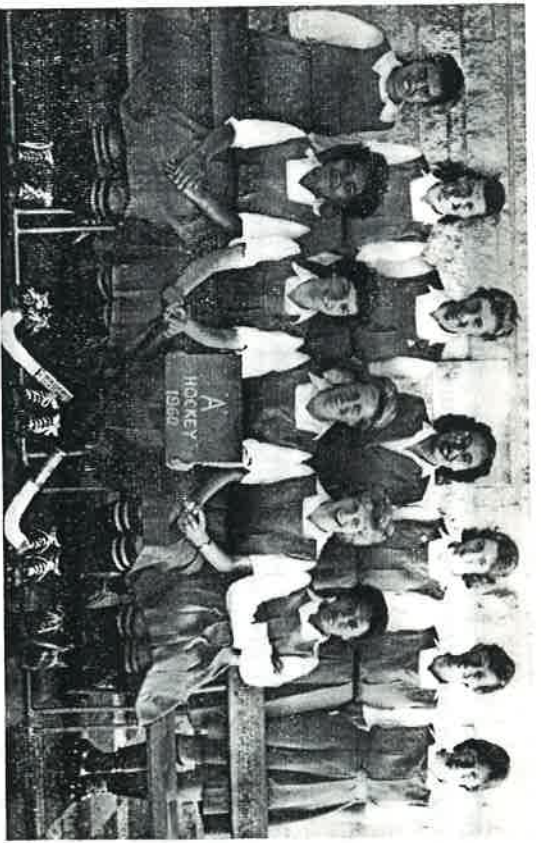
