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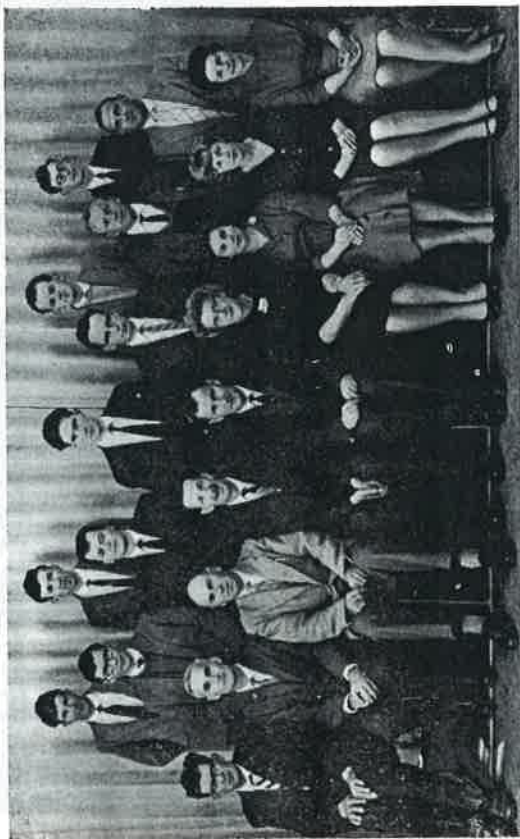

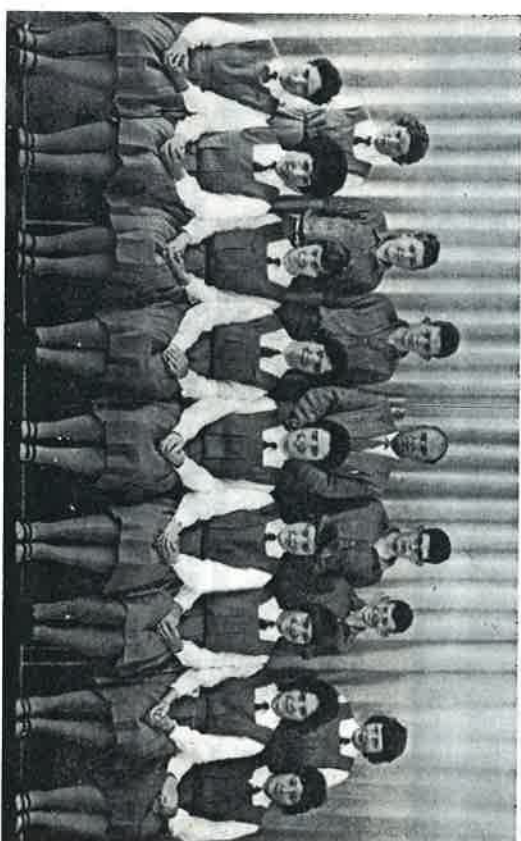

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EDITORIAL

This year, 1962, might well be called the year of the E.E.C. There can be few New Zealanders who have not at some time listened to broadcast talks or read newspaper articles on the Common Market. It has even penetrated our school and supplied the topic for the senior oratory competition.

Talk of the Common Market has entered our school in another way too. Economists like Dr W. B. Sutch have made it clear that we must cease relying entirely on one of our assets, namely a climate favourable to pastoral farming, and must turn to another that we have overlooked for too long—the skill of our people.

But skill is not acquired without training, and training is another word for education. We are beginning to realise that we must look to the schools to produce skilled men and women in all walks of life. All those capable of university education must be encouraged to take advantage of their opportunities, for upon these people we rely for our professional and scientific leaders.

However there is another group that must be encouraged for more than ever before and this is the group that supplies our highly skilled tradesmen and technicians. This will involve more and better schooling which will cost more money. But the money will be wasted if pupils and their parents fail to realise the importance of getting as much training as possible. They must be prepared to stay at school and work. Failure to do this could have evil results for New Zealand in that we will lack the skilled people we need to support and raise our standard of living. Failure to do this will certainly have evil results for the individuals concerned. They will find themselves unskilled in a world that needs skilled people and has only menial tasks or perhaps none at all for the unskilled.

END-OF-YEAR CEREMONY, 1962

The fifth annual Prize-Giving Ceremony was held in the Assembly Hall on the 7th December, 1961. Mr J. K. Logan, Chairman of the Board of Governors, welcomed the guests. He then addressed the school. Mr Logan stated that owing to the extremely rapid expansion of Tokoroa, the district would require another High School at the beginning of 1969. This meant that a suitable school site would have to be purchased in the near future. In the meantime however, prefabricated classrooms were inevitable. Mr Logan congratulated the P.T.A. on their very generous and voluntary efforts in sowing grass over the newly developed area. Mr Logan also thanked all those individuals and organizations that had assisted the school, in some way or another, throughout the year.

The Principal, Mr R. W. MacMillan, then presented his Annual Report for 1961.

Mr MacMillan welcomed the guest speaker, Mr N. C. McLeod, Project Engineer for the Waikato Hydro-electric schemes, and Mrs McLeod.

Mr MacMillan reported that the roll was 360, which was only a small drop on figures for the beginning of the year. He then dealt with staff changes during the year, the excellent record of the First XV, the successful activities of the P.T.A. which included a fund raising campaign for the Swimming Baths, and the school's examination results. In the Third and Fourth Forms, six weekly tests had replaced the traditional examinations held twice yearly. Mr MacMillan then congratulated Carolyn Logan, Elizabeth Steele, Diane Wilson and Douglas Henry who, having started as foundation pupils in 1957, had become the first pupils to pass through classes in the school from Form three to Six A.

Mr MacMillan concluded by commending all pupils returning to school beyond the age of 15; they were making "the finest investment possible," by disregarding monetary and material rewards in order to further their education.

The guest speaker was Mr N. C. McLeod, Project Engineer, Mangakino, who held everybody's interest with his keen observations. Mr McLeod paid tribute firstly to those who had won prizes. They deserved acclaim and encouragement for they must accept responsibility and leadership. Those leaving school would soon be taking the places at present filled by parents, teachers and others in authority. The important thing was not so much what you knew, but what sort of person you were—any prospective employer would be looking for that first and foremost. Mr McLeod pointed out that the combined technological and scientific progress made since the end of World War II exceeded that made from the dawn of History to 1945. Another way of expressing this was that 80 per cent. of the scientists that had ever lived were still alive.

Unfortunately material rewards had not brought us the greatest happiness—that could only come from using our abilities in the service of others. Learning was like climbing hills—every rise brought us glimpses of enchanting valleys beyond and of more hills. Peaks, as in mountaineering, were for the few who bore the greatest responsibility. For all, the rewards were greatest for those who worked the hardest. Those who ceased to strive decayed. The greatest forces in the world today were still those of good and evil, and we must learn to employ all our ability and effort for good.

A vote of thanks was moved by Dr Brunt—Deputy Chairman of the Board of Governors.

The end of 1961 marked the departure of several of our staff members. Mr S. Komendolowicz, the art teacher, left to take up a position in Rotorua. Miss M. Black, our Homecraft teacher, married and left for England and Miss G. Watson, of the Commerce Department, went to Australia. Miss B. Dews took up a permanent position at the Tokoroa Intermediate School and Mrs Overhill resigned her position as Senior Mistress.

However the new year saw the arrival of the following teachers. Mr Diegan came to us from Toronto, Canada, to replace Miss Watson. Miss Hill, who had been teaching in Australia for some years replaced Miss Black and Miss J. Buchanan, a former foundation pupil, is temporarily assisting Miss Hill in the Homecraft Department. Mr L. John arrived in the third term from Swansea, Wales. Mr E. R. Waghorn, the caretaker, has been replaced by Mr W. Millar and Mrs Marryatt, the principal's secretary, by Mrs M. Buttimore.

It is with regret that we have this year to say goodbye to Mr L. S. White, who has been First Assistant since the school began in 1957. Foundation pupils and staff who remember that first difficult year which began in temporary accommodation lent by N.Z.F.P., followed by months in partly completed classrooms, with grounds that looked like a "battlefield on the moon", will also remember how much Mr White's calm good humour and efficiency helped to bring order out of the chaos. These qualities, together with his kindly consideration have earned him the highest degree of affection and respect of staff and pupils alike. As a mathematics teacher Mr White has those qualities of patience and calmness that are vital to the teaching of this subject.

Staff and pupils join in wishing Mr and Mrs White and their family every happiness in their new sphere.

LIBRARY NOTES

Once again it is pleasing to report that the Library has played an important part in the educational and recreational life of the school. There have been times, particularly during wet lunch hours, when our floor and table space has been quite inadequate to meet the needs of the pupils. We are hopeful that with our rapidly rising school roll, provision will be made to meet the need of expansion.

We feel justifiably proud of not only the quantity but also the quality of the books on our shelves. A weeding out of shabby or superfluous books has been carried out. The following figures will indicate our book stocks and the use to which they are put:

Number of books in Library - - 2767
These comprise: Fiction - - - 1484
Non-Fiction - - - 1283

With our roll of 439 this still falls far short of the National Library Service recommendation of 10 books per pupil. Considering that the school has been in existence only 6 years and that its roll is increasing rapidly we feel the present position to be satisfactory. If the School Board continues its present generous allocation of £500 per year the number of books per pupil should show a gradual increase.

Number of new books added during 1962 - - 608
These comprise: Fiction - - - - - 333
Non-Fiction - - - - - 275

In addition to these, 10 new Class Sets of plays have been added to the Drama Section. Our Class Sets, which are not shown in the above aggregate, now number 163.

A separate Teachers' Library of about 100 books has been established in the Staff room. This comprises books of value to the Staff only and it is an advantage to have them more conveniently located.

With our increased 6th Form roll an effort has been made to build up a good 6th Form section in the Library. This is housed in the Library workroom and is proving of value to the Senior pupils.

With remedial reading classes instituted this year it has been necessary to provide a special section of approved reading books with which to meet their requirements. These books, which have proved themselves very popular, are also housed in the workroom.

A useful addition to our shelves was made by the Tokoroa Jaycees who contributed most generously to our New Zealand Section. Their donation included the New Zealand Junior Encyclopaedia and other books of great value to us.

Many of our pupils, when leaving school, donate the refund on their text book deposit to the library. In many instances this amounts to the full £1 deposit and books of value to present and future pupils of the School have been purchased.

Pupils were allowed to take books out during the May and August holidays and on each occasion the number of books exceeded 500. During term time the number of books taken out each day fluctuates due to such influences as examinations but averages about 70 a day. It is usual for between 400 and 500 books to be out at one time.

It is pleasing to be able to report that on the whole the books have come through a further year's considerable use in good condition. It is understandable that such books as *Born Free* and the new Olympic Games book are no longer in their original immaculate condition. It is felt that our policy of covering with plastic all books which have dust jackets adds considerably to their life and attractive appearance. All books but one lost by pupils have been paid for. The final analysis shows that although there were seven lost and paid for five of these subsequently turned up and the money was refunded. Until the end of the year check is made against the catalogue cards it will not be known if any further books have strayed but it is not anticipated that these will be numerous.

We feel that our Library has stood up to its true test, that of being used, appreciated and of meeting requirements. This opinion was endorsed recently by the comment of the Librarian at the Tokoroa Public Library that very few High School pupils were to be seen searching her shelves for something to read.

PUBLIC SPEAKING CONTEST, 1962

Speech by Valerie Cox, winner of the Jaycee Cup:

NEW ZEALAND AND THE E.E.C.

No New Zealander who has the interests of his country at heart can fail to be moved by these three apparently innocuous letters E.E.C. I would go further: no one with any real appreciation of his own interests can afford to ignore the problems and the dangers that the European Economic Community poses. At this very moment in conference rooms and cabinet rooms all over Europe questions are being discussed and bargains are being made, that will eventually lead Britain to join, or decline to join the Common Market.

It is now more than five years since the representatives of Belgium, France, Italy, Germany, Luxembourg and the Netherlands signed a treaty in Rome establishing the European Economic Community. The aim of this 1957 treaty was: to establish the foundations of an even closer union among the European peoples; to ensure the economic and social progress by common action in eliminating the barriers which divide Europe; to confirm the community of interests which bind Europe and overseas countries; and to strengthen the safeguards of peace and liberty by this pooling of resources.

The inspiring leadership of Claude Monnet, who must surely deserve the title of "Father of the Common Market", had brought the countries together. He had not altogether extinguished their doubts, however, and France particularly was dubious about the whole business. But five years have altered all this. The early doubts are gone. The countries of the Common Market are united and prosperous, and their future looks bright.

Already it is clear that European countries which are outside the group have felt the pressure of their competition, and among those who have suffered is Britain, who declined her first invitation. However, the British government now believes that it would be to Britain's advantage if she joins the scheme, provided she does not have to make too many concessions. One concession that Britain is reluctant to make is that she should sever those special trading relationships which are some of the more tangible bonds that bind the Commonwealth together.

But what if Britain, after doing her best for us all, finds that she must, in her own interests, abandon us and join the Common Market? To answer this we must know what the special advantages are that we will lose. At the moment Britain buys 57 per cent. of our products, and, in return, over 40 per cent. of our exports come from Britain. Not only do we sell our goods in the United Kingdom, they are allowed into that country at specially low rates of duty that enable us to compete successfully against similar products from countries much closer to the British market. But the Common Market will impose a uniform duty on all goods from outside their group, and it will be a higher duty than we are used to paying. It will be a duty that, as things stand, would price us out of our old markets. That this would be a heavy blow to the New Zealand farmer we can readily understand. That it would be an equally heavy blow to us all is no less obvious.

This is a gloomy but by no means hopeless prospect. We could accept it as a crushing disaster. We must accept it as a challenge: if our produce is priced out of world markets we must reduce our prices. We must have another look at our efficiency to see if it is all we have imagined. We must become competitive. If we can no longer afford to import our accustomed quantities of consumer goods we must learn to make them. We must husband our resources, develop new skills, and re-examine our country for wealth that we have overlooked. Finally we must work. We must accept once and for all, that our leisurely ways are a luxury we can no longer afford in a hungry and competitive world.

DRAMA CLUB

The School Drama Club was formed in March by Mr Corbett. A meeting was held and all those who were interested attended. A club committee was elected, with Sandra Levin as Chairman, and John Rennie as Vice-President, with the help of Mr Corbett, selected a play for production. Ian Hay's "Middle Watch" was the play chosen, and as soon as Mr Corbett acquired sufficient copies of the play, lunchtime readings commenced for the selection of characters. By May, rehearsals were well under way, with a cast of fifth and sixth form pupils. These included Peter Brunt as Hercules Herbert Hewitt, Robert Hunter as Captain Maitland the honourable craft H.M.S. Falcolm, John Rennie as Commander Baddley, and Elspeth Kilburn as his fiancée (the admiral's daughter), Margaret Wilson as Fay and Douglas White as Captain Randall were another engaged couple, Tony Logan as Marine Ogg, and Sandra Levin as Fay's cousin Charlotte, provided most of the amusement. Valerie Cox as Mary Carlton, an American actress, Jeen Koning as Ah Fong, the Chinese servant, Mark Scotson as the Sergeant and other members of the cast included Barbara Swift, Norman Jonkers and John Mitchell.

Meanwhile, under the supervision of Mr Corbett and Mr Squier, a team of boys worked on the sets and lighting. The production date was fixed for the 28th June, and with the assistance of other members of the club, the dressing room and the help of Mrs Kofoed on the make-up, the play was a great success. £70 was the sum raised for school funds.

The only other activity of the Drama Club was the reading of Christopher Fry's "The Lady's not for Burning."

THE SCHOOL ORCHESTRA

Early in 1962 it was decided to form a School Orchestral Group. A number of instruments were purchased by the School and, together with others kindly lent by parents, sufficient were made available to make a start during the second term.

The right Rev. Hulme-Moir, the Bishop of Nelson, visited our school in April. The theme of his address was "Courage" and he gave many interesting examples from his experiences as Padre with troops overseas.

Kenneth Goodman, the eminent Negro organist, came to the school on the 21st June to give us a recital. It proved to be a most popular and enjoyable entertainment. The concert included excerpts from Carmen, Handel's Messiah, and Negro Spirituals. At the conclusion Mr Goodman invited us to join with him in singing some of the American folk songs, which we did with great gusto.

During September a young Indian journalist, Mr Beran Irani, travelling New Zealand as a guest of Rotary Clubs, spoke to the third and fourth forms on life in India. He stressed the huge problems that are facing the Government responsible for the welfare of over 300 million people. The general feeling among pupils at the conclusion of this talk was, that if all Social Study lessons were as interesting as this, examinations would hold no terrors!

GROUNDS DEVELOPMENT

At the beginning of the year our playing fields were in poor condition. We had lost the use of the intermediate school's football field and our own newly-sown areas were not firm enough for use. However, thanks to the Ministry of Works, more seed and soil were supplied for topdressing and oversowing. The local farmers formed a working bee to do the job. Twenty-three tractors and trailers, two front-end loaders and one grader blade at work was a truly spectacular sight. Each farmer driving his own tractor and trailer was assisted by third and fourth form boys armed with rakes shovels.

As a result, during the second term the three football fields on the top flat and the two hockey fields and a fourth football field on the lower flat could be played on.

It was early in the third term that we had our Arbor day. After a short ceremony Mr Logan, chairman of our Board and Mr Wilson, chairman of the Ground's Committee followed by Mr White and Peter Brunt, the remaining foundation pupil, planted the first two trees. The remaining shelter trees along the Northern and Eastern borders and those for shade around the top of the terrace were planted by first year pupils. It is hoped that they will tend to their trees during their years at school.

v Tamaki Won 6-3

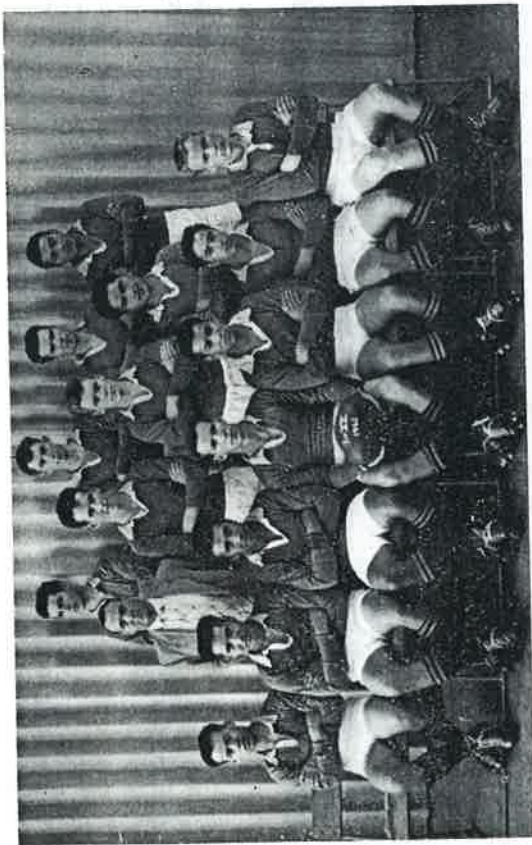

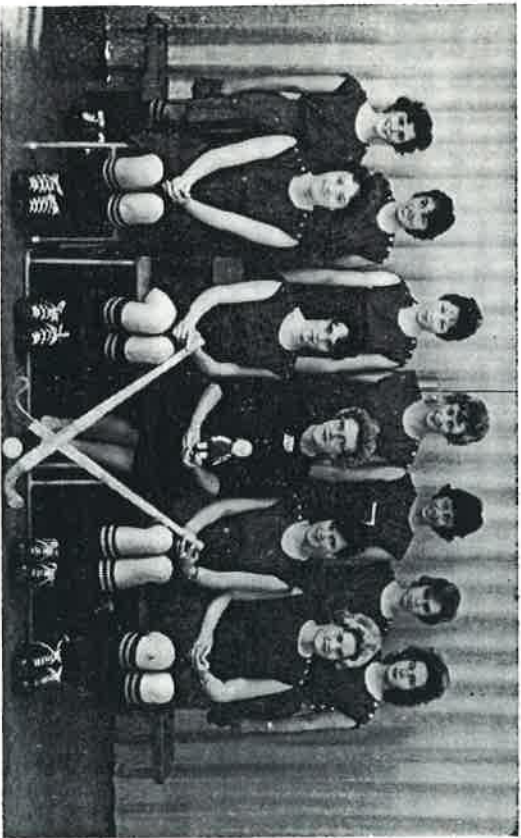

The "A" team has proved itself to be one of the top four teams in the Waikato.

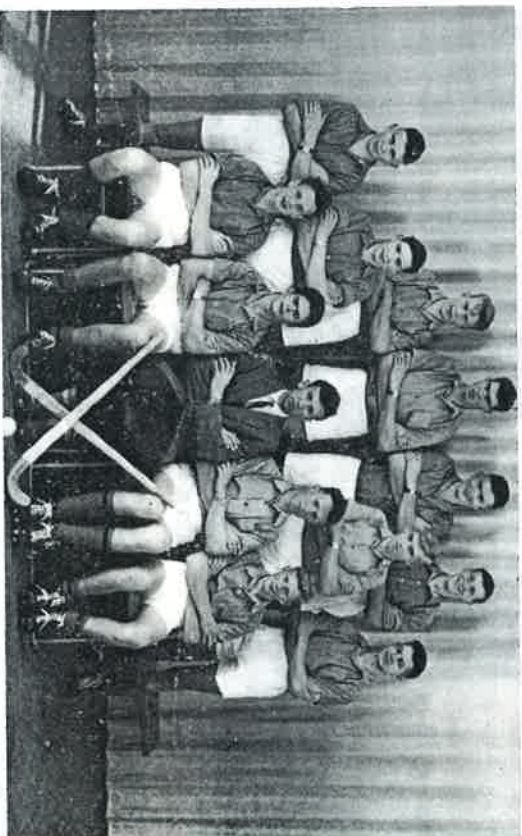
Our first game was against Matamata at Tokoroa and although both sides missed many opportunities the result was a scoreless draw.

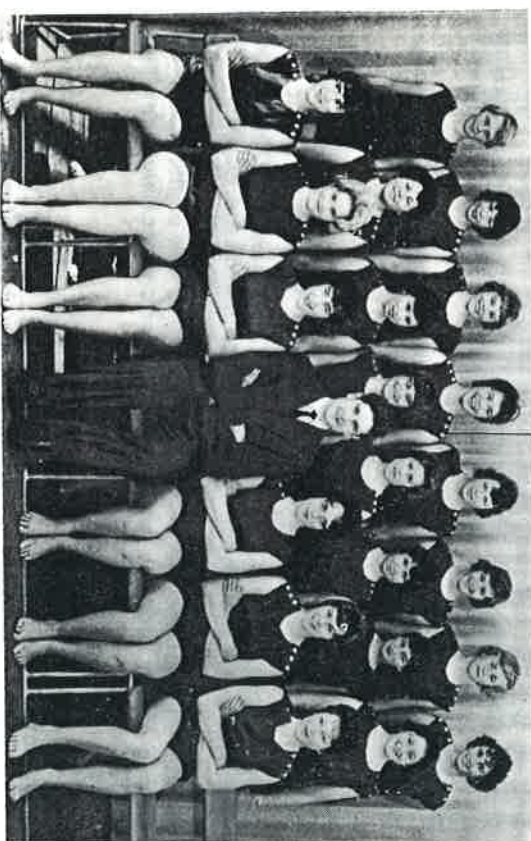

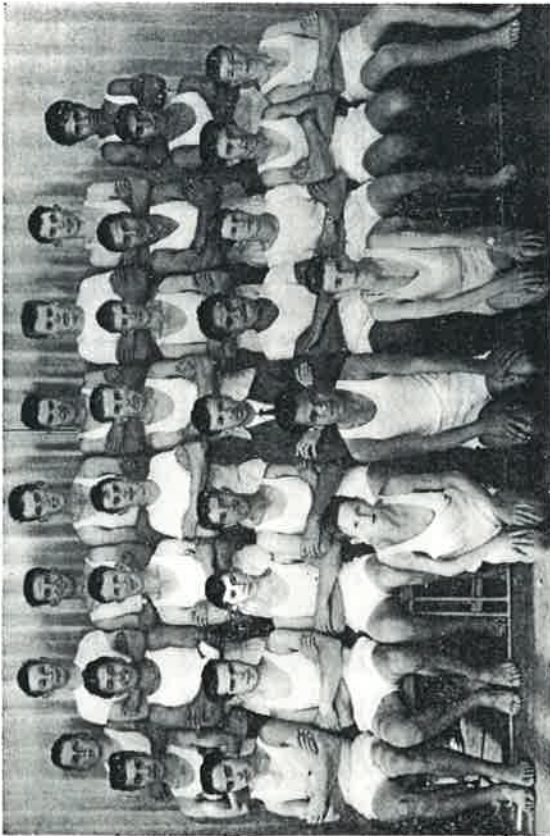

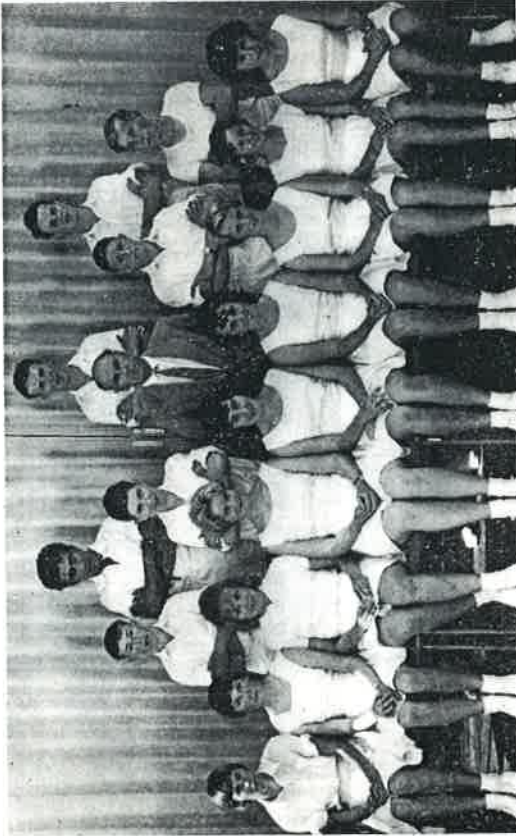
