Editorial

Education, the key to world problems and the magic quality pursued relentlessly by more people today than ever before. The millions of Asia have a rapacious appetite for it and compete strongly for limited places in their institutions.

Do we regard our education with such respect and pursue it with a similar vigorous endeavour? Do we too, have an appetite? Is it satisfied solely by a succession of facts and techniques or do we extend over a broader field and consider our knowledge and skills in the fuller relationship of our values to the community.

This is the dualism of a real education based on British traditions: personal success and its synthesis with social service. The individual and the community must be complementary to achieve true harmony and social progress.

The word education is derived from Latin: educate, to bring up; educere, to draw out, lead forth. The process begins then from the time we are born when our parents commence to shape our development with the assistance of other members of society. We are influenced by their ideals, precepts and example.

Hence integrated within our personal education is the influence of home, school and vital community cultural organizations such as the church. We could define education as everything which helps to shape the human being with the function of the school to "draw forth" the individual to the fullest use of his or her abilities and talents. This can only be done if the traits of self-discipline, co-operation and diligence are established together with adherence to all rules of society and respect for adult members of the community.

The community in which we live is a young and vigorous one with enthusiastic, able leaders of cultural and sporting bodies. It is their ideals at which our young people must aim. The example shone brightly for us all at Tokyo.

On his return, our Tokoroa representative conveyed modestly and sincerely to us the Olympic message: "The honour was in the taking part and the striving to win." This could be applied to all our activities at school and then we would be much nearer our ideal of education.



STAFF NOTES

The prevailing note in the staff situation during 1964 has been that of constant change. A complete staff of fulltime teachers would number about 24, and by a strange coincidence exactly 24 teachers have come or gone, or both, in the course of the year.

Most felt among the changes are the departures of two who have been with us for six years: Mrs D. B. Robertson and Mr C. T. Loretz,

Senior Mistress and Head of Mathematics respectively. Mrs Robertson has won the affection and respect of pupils and staff alike, not just as the "Bio" specialist, but as a kind and sympathetic teacher and friend. Mr Loretz likewise was more than principal teacher of mathematics, he has been a considerable figure in the sporting and social life of the school.



Another group of "leavers" whom we are reluctant to see go are Mrs B. Elder and Mrs B. McKenzie, both of them enthusiastic leaders in girls' sport, and Mr K. J. Milton, who with his talent for music and drama has made a valuable contribution to the cultural life of the school.

Five other full-time teachers both came and went between February and August: Mr and Mrs A. J. Foley, Mr J. Perkins, Mr J. Rodrigues and Mrs M. Brown.

Fortunately some teachers were appointed also who appear to be going to stay for a time: Mr D. Spender and Mr D. Olding in the technical department, Mrs S. Benzie, Mrs E. Evans and Mrs B. Chapman teaching science, English and mathematics, Mr N. J. Murphy, appointed P.R.A., English department and Mr D. Roberts, mathematics.

As in other years, the position has been eased by part-time teachers who have answered the call: Mrs J. Christensen, Mrs M. Denton, Mrs L. J. Carter, Mrs A. Wisheart, Mrs A. Shaw, Mrs E. L. Tubby and Mrs S. Henderson.

As we go to press Mr C. Beaumont has just been appointed to St. Kentigern College, Auckland and we wish him well.

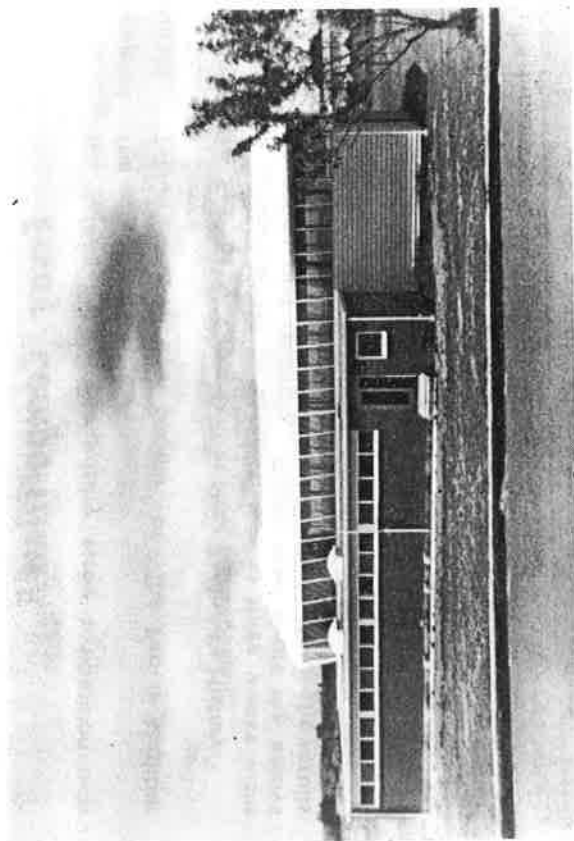

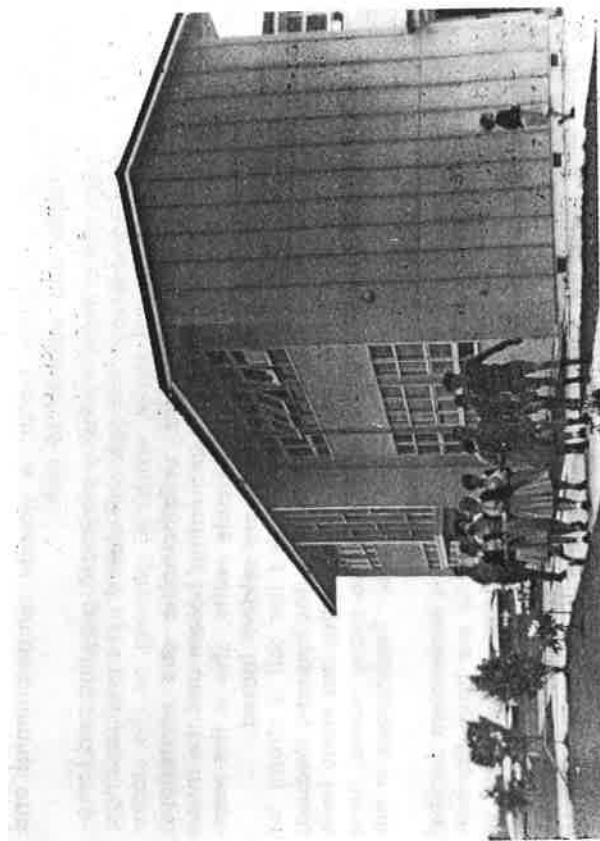

A GREAT DAY IN NEW ZEALAND'S HISTORY

As I stood, one among thousands, my mind was occupied with only one thought. Would the meat reach England still completely fresh?

The scene was the Port Chalmers Wharf, February 15, 1882. Thousands of people had assembled on the wharf to watch the departure of 'Dunedin', a modern sailing ship. Her mission was to carry a cargo of 600 meat carcasses 13,000 miles to England with the meat to remain fresh. Of course this would be impossible without apparatus such as a freezing chamber. One had previously been sent from England and installed in the ship.

The result of this experiment would mean such a lot to the people of New Zealand as many farms would be established and, in some cases, it would help to overcome the problem of poverty. Livestock could be farmed and the meat sold overseas for a reasonable price. People realised that if this experiment proved successful it would be a big step for New Zealand.

The days that passed while waiting for the result seemed like years. Anxious farmers would make an effort to go into town every day to hear the news.

At last it came. The 'Dunedin' had reached England 98 days after leaving New Zealand and the meat was still as fresh as it was the day it had left. Every carcass had been sold to English butchers and there were orders for more.

Farmers throughout the country rejoiced at the news and within three months 2000 acres of new farm land had been opened up and sold. Livestock farming was now possible in New Zealand. The importance of this has since grown and I am sure February 15, 1882, will be always remembered as a great day in New Zealand's history.

One may argue that a good vocabulary and general knowledge may be gained from the radio broadcasts but a child is much more likely to watch a television programme which really entertains him. Pictorial images stay with the young children for quite a long time.

The youth and adults in our society also benefitted from the coming of television. We are given something to think over, something to awaken our intellect and make us more alert. Every programme, no matter what it is, makes us think and thinking is a good exercise for everyone. Television programmes are watched much more widely than any other form of amusement and this provides a topic for conversation among a class of people who would otherwise have nothing to talk about.

We are brought home to the problems of the world, whether it be the welfare of refugees or the racial position in South America. These problems give us some idea of what to do and what not to do in New Zealand. We get a much better idea of what world co-operation really means and just how important it is.

An example of such a programme was broadcast recently. It showed several leaders of world powers having a conference by way of television relayed by Telstar. These men were sitting in their offices talking into a microphone and looking into a television camera. This programme showed us just how small the world is getting. Millions of people must have seen this programme and this means that not only the people of New Zealand but the people of the world are confronted with an example of world co-operation. This is a very important aspect of television programmes.

We can also see many great people, events and places that we would never otherwise see. Our horizons are broadened when we realize just what the world has to offer.

Politicians and Ministers of religion are able to reach the people in their homes. Watching a speech being given over television is more satisfactory than just hearing it.

We have much to learn from other countries and this can be achieved via television. The minds of the people are moved into action and we can strive for a better New Zealand. The man in the street can see things which he has never seen before. This influx of new ideas prevents the development of morons and there are such people in our modern society.

The coming of television to our society has stimulated the intellect of the people, educated everyone in all respects, has given new goals to work for and should thus lead to a more modern and efficient New Zealand.

THE PEN IS MIGHTIER THAN THE SWORD

At first sight the saying 'the pen is mightier than the sword' seems an empty, airy paradox.

War, of which the sword is symbolic, is an immediate compulsive thing and has clean-cut effects. But this is only a momentary turning, a ripple on the mainstream of human affairs.

It is the pen that shapes human affairs and presents the collective force of human thought and tradition. It provides a composite of human ideas (morals and experiences in the written word. It enhances the shared experiences of mankind.

For example, the pen has been responsible for material progress since the earliest times. Men have recorded their discoveries which were either discarded as fallacies by succeeding generations or retained as the basis of another step forward. In this way man has progressed.

Through the Bible the pen has given man a code of morals which has been before him for nearly 2000 years. It is foolish to think that the Ten Commandments are universally and at all times obeyed but man's conduct is still measured against them.

The written word can also have a corruptive influence. The pen can sway popular belief and public opinion as many people get their ideas from what they read. As a result they can be manipulated like puppets; fed official opinion and put into an acquiescent, militant or enthusiastic frame of mind as required. This, it seems, is the reason why the first act of dictatorship is often to seize the Press so as to suppress any independent, individual opinion.

These are only three of the powers of the pen. It has afforded us material advancement, moral codes and can still mould our opinions for better or for worse. Perhaps it would be better if we had only an oral tradition. Who can say? But one thing is certain. The pen is mighty indeed. Beside it the sword is a not very effective and very temporary source of power.

THE PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION

The P.T.A. has been responsible for the raising of £4000 during the last six years, most of it being raised during the last four years. This, together with the Government subsidy was the means of providing the school with the new Gymnasium which was completed in June this year.

This year, meetings have been held every two months with interesting speakers present. These included: our principal, Mr Ryan; Mr Perkins, an American member of the staff; Mr Henderson of the Y.M.C.A., and Mrs B. Chapman who spoke on her travels through Asia and the Middle East.

The proposed Ball in September had to be cancelled through lack of support but an enjoyable Family Dance was held in October.

P.T.A. members are currently helping with the Pantomime and their immediate aim is to help the school gain its quota for the University Halls of Residence Appeal.

LIBRARY NOTES

Our chief concern during 1964 has been the provision of extensions to the Library. Wet days have become something to dread with the crowds pouring in at morning break and lunch time to seek shelter and, in some cases, higher learning. The shelf space also has proved quite inadequate for our present stock of books.



Early in the year a plan for alterations and extensions was presented to us by the Department but we considered that it was not suitable to meet our needs. We made a request for an alternative plan and although this necessitated a delay we feel that it has been justified. The final plan that was presented for our approval was much more to our liking and we feel satisfied that a Library worthy of the School will result. The alterations will remove the existing walls between the present library and the Geography room and a new Office-workroom will be built.

A total of 540 new books were added to the Library during the year. Of these 371 were non-fiction and 169 fiction. The increase in the cost of books, largely due to increased shipping freights, has meant that our grant has not provided as many books as previously. The increase in postal rates will also have an adverse effect in this respect.

We are grateful to the publishers of the Encyclopaedia Britannica for making a set available to the School.

It is pleasing to be able to record that many pupils have given up a great deal of their spare time to help in the Library. Most notable of these have been Shirley Davey and Ian Johnstone. Without the help of these and many other pupils the efficient running of the Library would not have been possible.

Many pupils when leaving the School have donated the refund on their textbooks to the Library and have had a book inscribed with their name added to the shelves. We are grateful to these pupils and feel they could leave nothing more fitting behind them for the pupils who will follow after.

THE HOUSE DRAMA COMPETITION

During the first week of the third term a drama competition was staged at the High School Hall. Each house was responsible for the production, sets, make-up, lighting equipment and acting personnel for a one-act play. The plays were presented to a large audience and Mrs Beverley Holland, a local drama producer, judged that the plays "Dear Departed" of Blue House and "A Happy Journey" of Green House tied for first place. The whole venture was highly successful in that over sixty students of the school were directly involved, the standards of acting and production reached a level rarely attained by school presentations, such a large number of Tokoroa people were delighted by the entertainment offered and all those who participated found the preparation for and the performance of their play both rewarding and enjoyable.

GREEN HOUSE PLAY:

"A Happy Journey" by Thornton Wilder. The title of the Green House play describes the spirit and atmosphere which prevailed among the cast and production personnel of the play. The journey from first rehearsals to final performance was marked by a happy readiness to move together, react together and work together. The resultant success was a measure of the individual acting ability and the enjoyment and co-operation experienced by the cast. A difficult task well done.

RED HOUSE PLAY:

"Noah and his Sons," the play produced by Red House this year, was written in the Middle Ages. The actors wore medieval costume, in order to preserve the atmosphere of the play as much as possible.

Although simply written, "Noah and His Sons" presented some problems, which the cast worked admirably to overcome, such as the fact that it is written in irregular verse, and uses many archaic expressions. Many thanks are due to the workers in the woodwork shop who produced a most convincing ark.

This play was an outstanding achievement for a school production. Few drama groups attempt such a difficult dramatic proposition as a mediaeval play on the limited modern stage.

The lighting, stage properties and voice production were commended by the adjudicator.

Mrs G. Curtis, the producer, at late notice was forced to take the leading role of Noah, which made the play ineligible for the House Competition. Her performance and that of all the cast and helpers made a notable contribution to the school's 1964 cultural programme.

BLUE HOUSE PLAY:

The first House Drama Festival held at the beginning of the third term was a great success and was the result of a lot of hard work on the part of pupils and staff alike.

Blue House produced "The Dear Departed" under the competent guidance of Mrs Benzie and Mrs Chapman. This was a one-act play and the comedy and antics of the characters made it a very amusing performance.

Margery Dawe took the lead as Mrs Slater and acted the character of this short-tempered, hypocritical woman very commendably, which drew praise from the adjudicator, Mrs B. Holland. T. Givins played Henry Slater, her hen-pecked husband and Victoria, D. Staples, was their ten year old daughter. Dale Smith and G. Wardell were Mr and Mrs Jordan and helped to build up to the climax when Abel Merryweather, played by S. Nicholson, made his untimely entrance just as his family were dividing his possessions after his death.

The play gained first equal and Blue House will look forward with enthusiasm to next year's Drama Festival.

GOLD HOUSE PLAY:

Gold House's production was "The Reluctant Doctor" by Moliere. This French Farce was well received by the audience, and those who took part found it a stimulating experience. The play calls for some competent character acting. The challenge was well met by Alan Johnstone, Kerry Hoy, Sharon Wright, Peter McKellar, Kevin Francis, Chris Logan, Trevor Henry, Joye Molesworth and Graeme Storer. Production was by Mr Milton, assisted by Peter Lane.

This too was a difficult play illustrating an important period in the evolution of drama and a credit to the cast and producer.

THE CRUSADERS

This year the Girls' Crusader group has had the largest audiences it has ever had in its four years of existence. The boys group however, is not yet in the same position and has just a few members.

The girls group meets every Friday lunch hour for half an hour in the music room, where they have the use of the piano. The boys meet in the Monday lunchhour in the Nelson block.

The aim of the groups, which are interdenominational and are held in most schools throughout New Zealand, is to foster Christian fellowship.

The meetings begin by singing choruses, followed by prayers, and a talk given by the leaders, based on a Bible reading. This year, Mrs R. Ward has led the girls and Mr C. Beaumont has taken the boys. Each term, the girls have got together and held a social gathering.

The next nine games in the inter-school programme produced a record of wins that the team is justly proud of. The results were as follows:

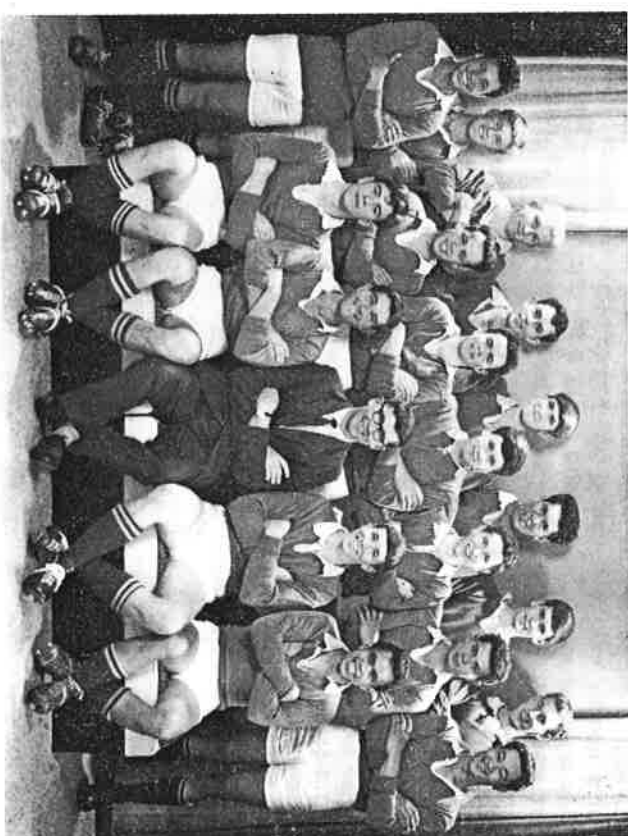
- v. Morrinsville—won 13-6.

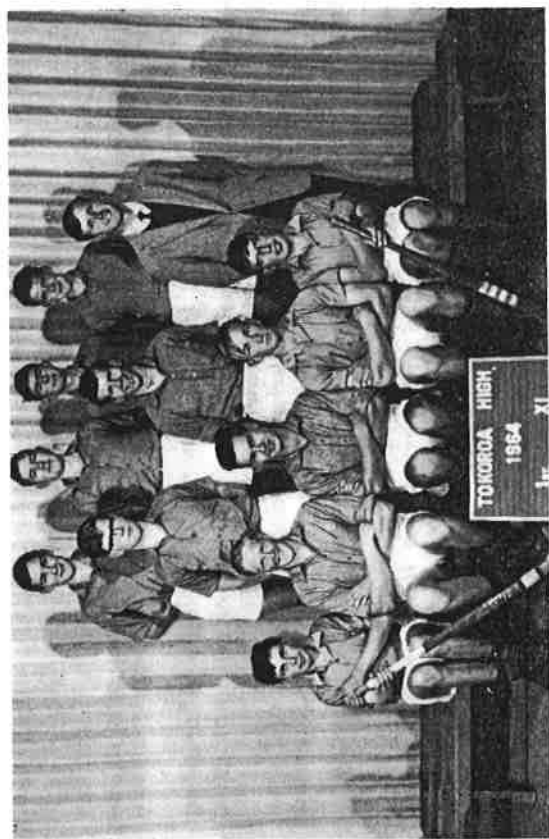
Two trophies were played for, the Crabb Memorial, and the Rishton Cup.

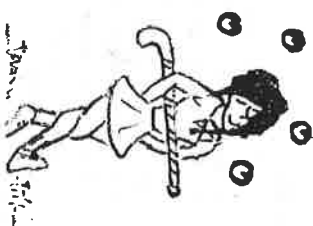

There were as well eight non Saturday playing basketball teams.

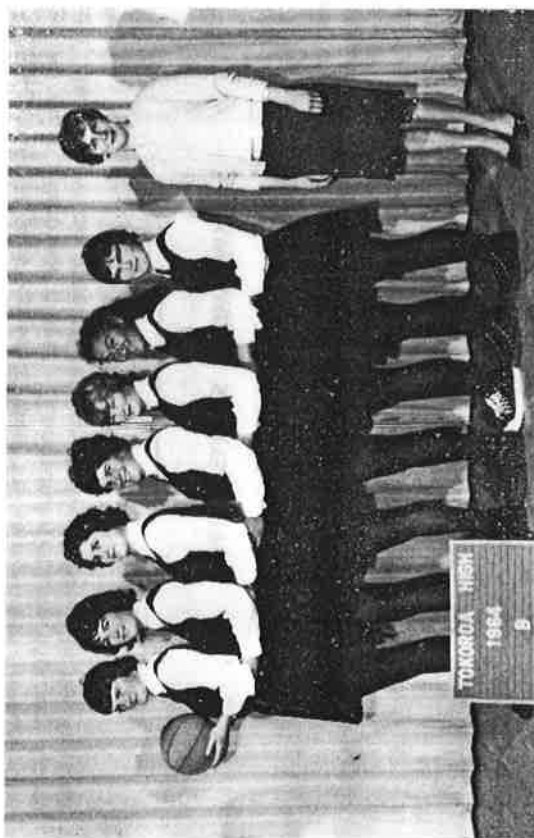

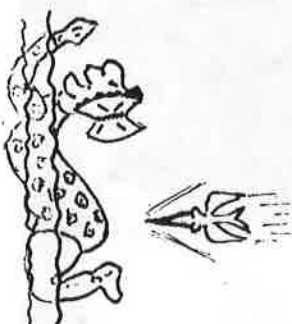

We gained second place in the team competition but were unplaced in the handicap and knock-out competitions. The former because a number of our players were off sick, and the latter because we drew the top team in the first round.

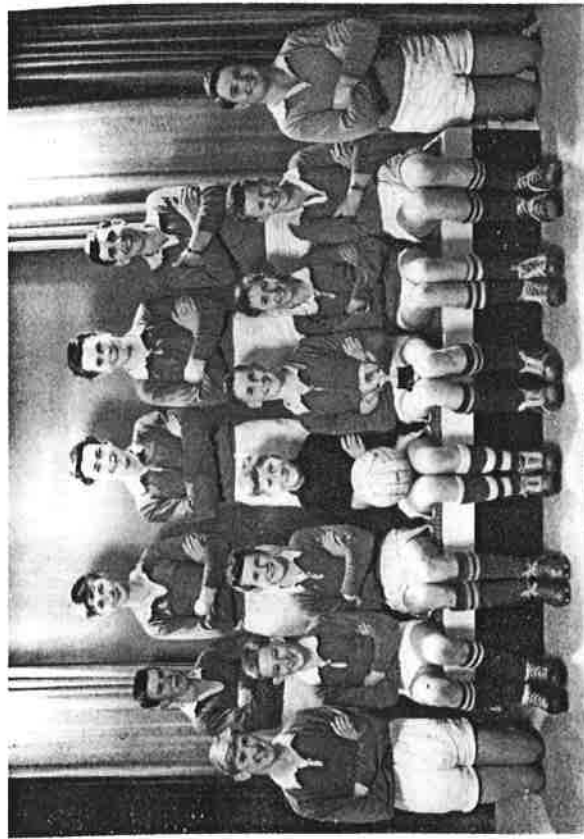

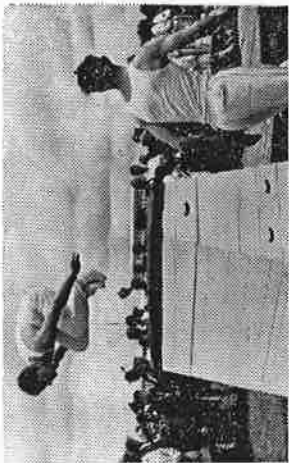

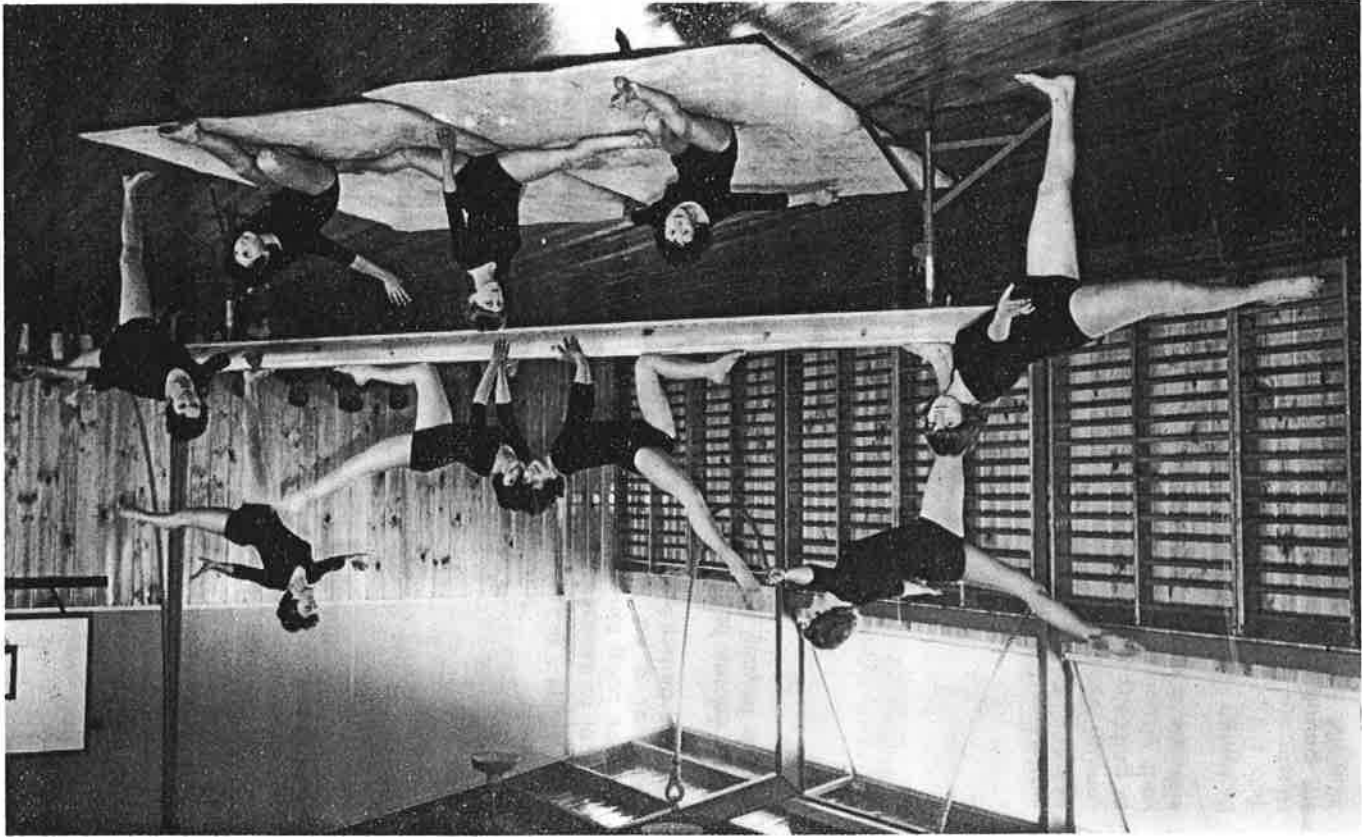
SCHOOL TENNIS ACTIVITIES

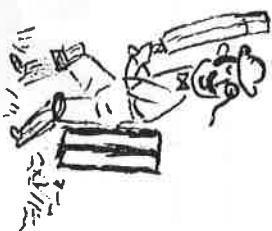

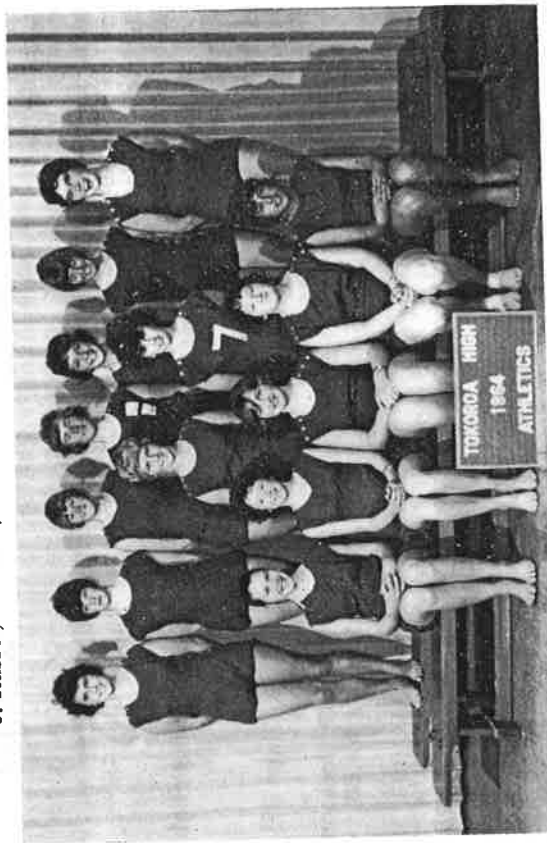
