VALEDICTORY

MRS A. GESTRO

Mrs Gestro, whose husband is the first headmaster of a new school in Tokoroa, came to us at the beginning of the year as an experienced teacher in both primary and secondary schools the world over. This background and her recent experience as a teacher at her husband's previous school in Samoa helped to make her immediately accepted not only by Polynesian pupils, but also by all those who had language difficulties of any sort. During the year she was appointed to the position of responsibility in charge of remedial reading and through her guidance in a remarkably short time built up a core of workers and teachers in this specialised field. Not only will the school miss her vibrant enthusiasm and ready wit, but the community at large will regret they can no longer witness her vitality in the women's sporting and cultural organisations to which she belonged. We wish her every good fortune in her new high school position at Tauranga and her husband in his position as headmaster of Bethlehem School.

MIR BACH

Mr Bach joined the school at the beginning of 1967 as Head of the English Department and will be leaving at the end of the year to further his university studies.

The period of his administration has seen tremendous growth in his department and consequent expansion, particularly in the library where his interests have added variety to the general stock and class-sets. He has been enthusiastic and energetic in his efforts to co-ordinate departmental activity and pass on information from refresher and in-training courses. At present he is Chairman of the Bay of Plenty School Librarians' Association.

Mr Bach came to us having already inaugurated the Walkato Secondary Schools' Hockey Competition. As President of this Association in its initial stages he travelled extensively to get this competition under way and its benefits have been enjoyed, particularly by the rural high schools of the Walkato. He was also responsible for organising the first secondary schools' hockey tournament staged by this school. His enthusiasm for this sport has naturally been reflected in hockey in the school.

Mr Bach's interests in the community are varied too. He has served as a committee member of the South Walkato Hockey Association, Organiser of a Scout Recruitment Campaign and as President of the United Churches' Council, he conducted a social survey of Tokoroa.

MIR D. M. CARTER

Mr D. M. Carter joined the staff of Tokoroa High School in September, 1963, as an Assistant Teacher. He was promoted to Head of Science Department at the beginning of the following year. Under his guidance the Science Department has been one of the healthiest in the school—measured by examination results and general activity.

Mr Carter has always been an excellent example of a teacher prepared to extend his work outside the classroom. In this area hundreds of students have been influenced by his enthusiasm and personal concern, particularly through the chemistry clubs, his after school study groups and various sports, particularly rugby football.

Tokoroa as a whole and the High School, in particular, will sadly miss this dedicated worker for his fellow men. In regretting our loss we are glad for Edgewater College, Auckland, where Mr Carter will be continuing his work.

MRS EVANS

Mrs Evans has been on the staff for five years. During this time she has taught English, French and Art and has done valuable work in building up the Art Department which is now a busy and delightful corner of the school. Mrs Evans's expert guidance, enthusiastic drive and encouragement have led many students on to furthering their studies in art. Among Mrs Evans' better known works have been the very effective sets for the school's drama productions.

We will miss her deep interest in the pupils, her helpful advice and ready wit, and as a "front runner" in the staff relay team, we feel she is irreplaceable.

The Rev. and Mrs Evans have widespread interests and are well known and respected in the community, perhaps especially among the Island people whose background she has been able to absorb during her stay and visits to the Islands.

The Rev. and Mrs Evans, Ann and Marie, are going to Wellington and we wish them every happiness in their new surroundings.

MRS ORCHARD

Mrs Orchard first came to Tokoroa High School as a pupil in 1958 — one year after the school was opened. She became a prefect and was school pianist.

After leaving school she worked with the A.N.Z. Bank for three years and from there she went to Auckland Technical Institute to attend the Senior Business Course, attaining Senior Government examinations. After a year at Wellington Polytechnic, Mrs Orchard not only gained P.C.T. and I.P.S., but was awarded the certificate for "Best All-Round Student."

In 1967 she came as a teacher to Tokoroa High School as Miss Giles. She has taught Commercial Practice, Bookkeeping and English. Her services as organist and Staff Representative on the Student Council have been invaluable.

Towards the end of Term II this year we were able to congratulate Miss Giles on becoming Mrs Orchard, and when she leaves in December will take up the position of full-time farmer's wife.

Mr MAIAYA

Mr Maiava came to New Zealand from Samoa in 1959. He joined the accounting section of N.Z. Forest Products Ltd in Auckland and stayed there for four years until he went to Training College in 1966. He joined the staff of the Tokoroa High School in 1967 as a member of the Commercial Department, teaching bookkeeping and commercial practice. Besides his interest in the students, he has done valuable work in the community, especially among the young people of his own race. Mr WALKER

He is returning home via Australia and the East at the end of the year, arriving in England at a time set down for summer. Mr Walker was a member of the school party which visited Australia in 1967 and during his stay in New Zealand has spent most of his holidays seeing the country. Many of the students will have happy memories of trips made with Mr Walker during the holidays. He has been most generous in sharing his holidays with students, to whom his experienced guidance has opened up the pleasures of youth hostelling and hiking in N.Z.

Within the school Mr Walker was keenly interested in music and formed a choir for a time. He took an active interest in the Wurlitzer organ from its installation and spent many hours there. At all times Mr Walker was interested in any activity which would encourage young people to make their own entertainment, and, although he was not a sports coach, he often spent his Saturdays at school watching our representatives' efforts against opposing schools. Staff and students alike will miss Mr Walker, but we all join in wishing him a happy return home, even though it will be through Siberia.

DEBATING

John has attended a football match between Kansas State University and Iowa University. In a letter home he says how impressed he was by the whole spectacle of the match and the number of people, 38-40,000. At half-time 105 bands with 6000 bandspeople assembled on the field and while they played, a section of the audience held up different coloured cards, forming patterns and pictures. Although he had to pay \$5 for his seat, he said it was well worth it.

John, who is a keen musician, is taking piano lessons from a Professor of Music at Kansas Wesleyan University. His family is very musical (Mrs Ruperts is a music teacher) and have an organ in their basement so John, who learnt to play the Wurlitzer, will be able to keep in practice.

John has been prominent here in the fields of speech and drama. This year he won the senior speech contest. In the 3rd and 4th Form he took part in the "Blue House Play" and in the 5th Form, "The Importance of Being Ernest." Last year he won a B.D.L. award for his portrayal of Ivan Vassilievitch in Chekhov's "The Proposal" and this year in the schools' production of "The Crucible." John hopes to gain valuable experience while in America, as his school produces three plays and one musical annually. Already he has taken part in one play "Tea House of the August Moon" as Colonel Durdie, and now is rehearsing his part in the musical "Bye, Bye, Birdie."

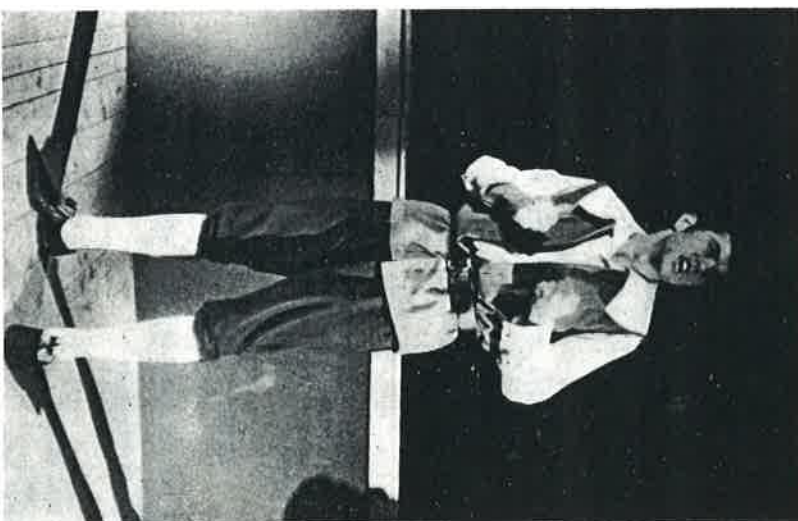
A Maori skirt, and many New Zealand slides were included in John's luggage. He gave his first lecture recently and many of the audience found that the New Zealand scenery was much different from what they had imagined. A few are already planning to take their vacations here.

An important feature of American life is pizzas. John has been to one Pizza parlour where Honkey-Tonk piano and hango plays and everyone sings, while involved in the exacting task of wrapping themselves round giant-sized pizzas.

CONCLUSION: Friendship and increased understanding among their fellow men have been the aims of the American Field Service since its inception in 1914. The work on the teenage level began in 1947 as being most likely to accomplish the objective.

The students are encouraged to participate wholeheartedly in the life of their American community where they attend the senior year of High School and live in carefully selected homes as members of their U.S. families on the same basis as the young people in the home. While they learn first-hand of many different aspects of life, customs, ideals, interests and problems — they also broaden American horizons by telling of their own countries and daily life and their own homes.

John is the fourth Tokoroa student to attend an American school and we are confident he will be a valuable ambassador for New Zealand.



John Givins, American Field Scholar student, in the role of John Proctor.

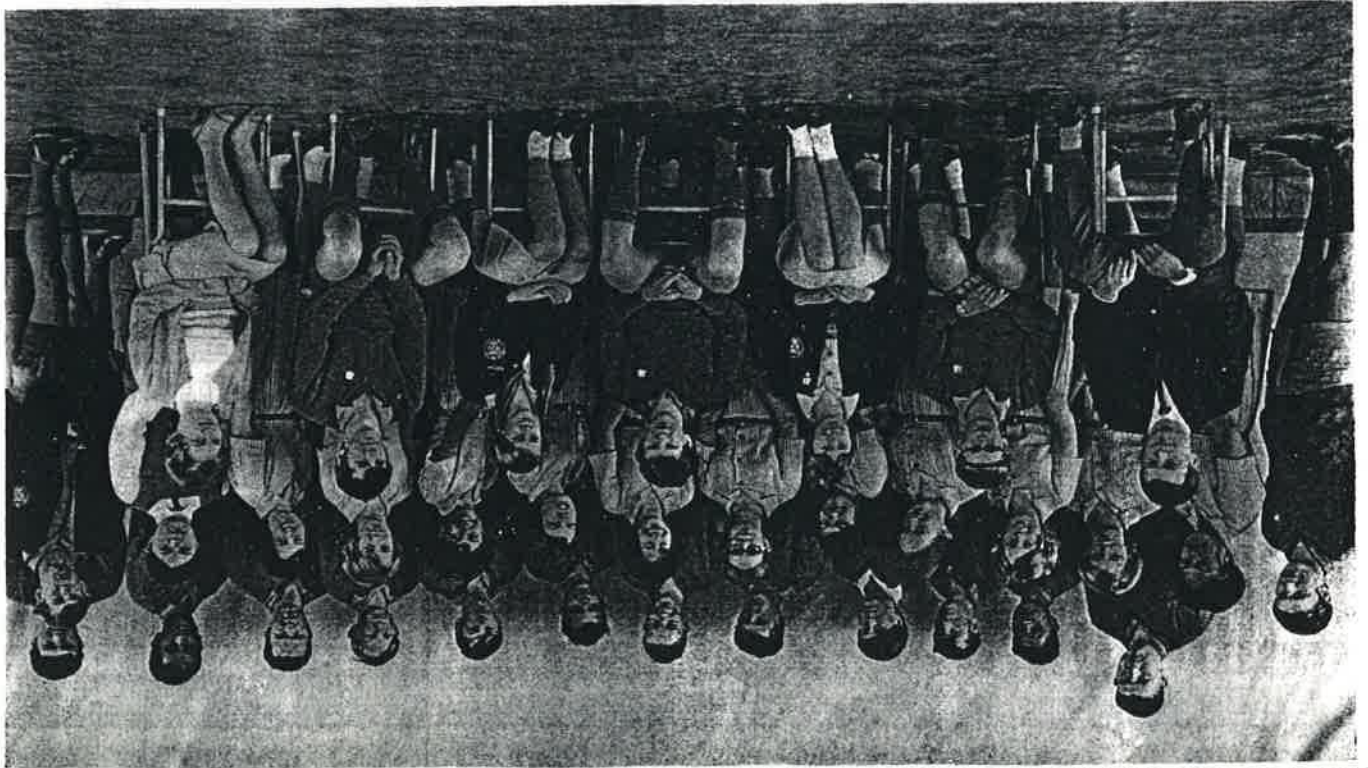
Message from the Principal

It is interesting to find on looking back over the Magazines produced in the past in this School that this very article represents "a break with tradition," because never before has the Principal of this School published a message in the Magazine.

Critics of Tokoroa have often held up the lack of tradition in the community as one of its weaknesses. I suppose that it is comforting to know when one does a certain thing that it has been done before and was then found sufficient, but there is also in this a danger that, because actions in the past were sufficient, doers in the present might be content merely to follow in the set pattern.

I have experienced this stultifying effect of "tradition" in other communities and been frustrated by the discouragement of progressive thought. The people of Tokoroa, speaking generally, I have found are not bound by the past. There is growing up here a settled and ordered community and gradually a tradition is being established, but the community remains alive to the possibilities of the future and is prepared, therefore, to make changes when necessary to meet new and challenging situations.

Long may this attitude continue, for such is the spirit of progress.

1938 has been a year of quietly efficient progress and consolidation for the Council. Nothing very radical or controversial has rocked the school, but a lot of effective work has been done all the same.

A comprehensive Constitution for the Council has been drawn up by a small student sub-committee. Over forty students helped the Lions with their collection for Intellectually Handicapped Children, and other students worked with the 'Paddy's Market' project in aid of the towns baths' fund. The Jaycees also received assistance in the shape of waitresses, when running a major conference in Tokoroa. Both organisations congratulated the Council on the calibre of the students and were appreciative of the help given.

The greatest triumph, however, was the conducting of a record-breaking 'Work Week.' Over \$2000 was earned with a net profit of nearly \$1700. The organising committee for this project was Mr Bristow, D. McLeish and G. Chambers. During the week each form had its own work-day, and several prefects from 6A did sterling work with administration throughout the week.

The financial success is the most apparent benefit of the scheme, but the lessons learned by the participants will have more lasting value. The student learned first-hand the joys and disappointments of organising and dealing with people. Among their own number they were thrilled to find people ready to work hard and conscientiously for the common good instead of personal profit. This joy, however, was tempered by finding also a minority who regarded their work-day as a holiday.

The people of Tokoroa responded magnificently to the students' offer. Plenty of work was provided and generously rewarded. Many people paid more than the price originally quoted in recognition of a job well done. Several others made a point of phoning the school to compliment its student body on the good behaviour and high standard of work of our 'ambassadors' to the community. This encouragement alone made all the hours of preparation and energetic execution worthwhile. Nevertheless, several incidents brought us down out of the clouds to the harsh realities of human nature. Many people, after arranging a time for the job, forgot about it, and in many cases our students, after walking eagerly from school, found on arrival an empty house and no message of any kind. Two of our girls were particularly unlucky. Leaving school with three jobs cards for three different places, they walked a circuit of over two miles only to report on their return to the school that everyone of their prospective employers was out!

The most heartbreaking case involved was a lady in Manaiia Street who asked for four strong boys to clean up a neglected garden. Five different groups of four strong boys put in four hours of work each of the five days, and

the tractor squad put in at least six hours of work carting seventeen loads of rubbish to the tip in Newell's Road. For this the Council was paid a grand total of \$10. This works out at about ten cents an hour per boy for dirty heavy work continued even in rain. Some considerable resentment was felt in certain quarters and suggestions like dumping the rubbish on the front doorstep together with some more colourful ideas were voiced. However, after sober reflection, everyone decided to be philosophical about the whole thing and yet another lesson in life was learnt.

A 'gentleman' in Billah Street, offered \$20 for a big digging job. Four boys duly completed the task and came back with reports of how pleased the man was with their work, but no money came. The money has been called for on at least three different occasions since and has still not been paid.

Experiences of this kind have given pupils insight into the tremendous amount of work that goes on behind the scenes which is so often not appreciated. They have enjoyed the warmth of working together for a cause. They can now see in clearer perspective the criticisms of "the youth of today" or "High School Kids" in relation to the true situation. Having justifiably felt some antagonism and resentment towards Tokoroa residents in general, because of a small proportion of 'rotten apples' amongst the high proportion of good ones, they can accept unjust generalised criticism more stoically—and we hope not make similar mistakes as adults.

All in all the Student Council is a great institution with many beneficial aspects to its work and it is to be hoped that it goes from strength to strength in the future.

MADRIGALS

A madrigal group is a small group of voices who sing unaccompanied songs. We have two such groups in the school. These groups, the Junior and Senior, were started by Mr John at the beginning of the year and he arranged it so that the seniors practised one day and the juniors another.

The first song the senior group learnt was 'God be in my Head' which was sung in four parts. In the groups the singers are divided into parts depending upon their range. The junior group started by singing Innsbuck. These two songs were sung at the Red Cross Evening on the 26th June, the first appearance in public for the madrigal groups.

The next song that was learnt was a Russian song called 'The Silver Birch'. As you know many Russian songs contain complicated variations in tempo and this particular song took some time to learn.

Meanwhile, the junior, group was learning another song, 'When Evening's Twilight', and, when that one was finished, it was sung at the Mrs Tokoroa contest on the 18th September, along with the senior song, 'God be in my Head'.

The Music Festival was held on the 26th September, and at this the two groups sang 'God be in my Head' and the Russian song 'The Silver Birch'.

Recently we have been learning two Welsh songs "Myfanwy" and "All through the Night." We sang these two songs, in Welsh, on the 16th October at the Arts Festival. For these songs the senior and junior groups combined, so now there are seventeen singers altogether. PUBLIC SPEAKING

The 1968 Speech Contest was held in March, and, as in previous years, the school was divided into three groups. Each section was given a different general subject and time. The Junior Topic was "An Aspect of New Zealand Life," and its time limit was three minutes. The topic for the Intermediate Section was "Entertainment," with a time limit of four minutes. In the Senior Section the subject given was "Any Major Current Political, Social and Economic Issue," with a time limit of six minutes.

The winner of the Intermediate Section spoke on "The Effects of Television on Society" and this speech appears below.

"Five years ago it would have been hard to imagine the hold television would have over the majority of New Zealanders. Now as the novelty wears off, people are beginning to weigh up the pros and cons and decide whether or not it has been a good thing.

"A question often asked, is what physical effects it has on viewers. This question is answered by the Stanford University Press, who say:

"The physical effects of television are not very marked provided that it is viewed under the correct conditions. There is little evidence of added eye strain or serious loss of sleep."

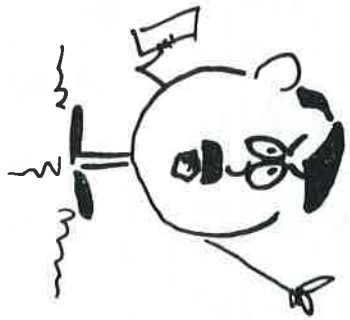
"The emotional effects are probably noticeable, but differ with the individual. The most obvious example is in children, who are all frightened by a programme at some time. This is probably because they grow so attached to a character that, when harm threatens it, they are terrified. If this character leads a particularly exciting life, the child could be depressed by the mundaneness of its own environment.

"This could also be the reason for some of the behavioural effects suffered. All children want to be like a successful character they admire whether it be good or bad, so we hear not only children, but also adults, using phrases from popular programmes they have seen.

"I partially blame television for the lack of culture and etiquette the younger generation are continually being reminded about. After all, how can you expect children to learn table manners when the whole family sit round the television each night with a plate or a tray balanced on their knees.

"Neither can you expect people to take an active part in cultural interests, when all the amusement they require can be obtained by the flick of a switch. This is why many young people are so easily bored. They lack the ability to organise their entertainment.

"It seems television has little effect on education. A Britannica Library Research Paper on Television, states that the amount of added information gathered from watching it is disappointing. It says television is not realising its full potential as a carrier of ideas and information. From



the practical side, however, school work should not suffer, providing it is watched in moderation.

"To me, the most serious effect on the community as a whole is that of the domination of television in society. So often, when entertaining, the host is inclined to turn the television set on and it remains on all evening. This causes an anti-social effect and certainly does not encourage intelligent conversation.

"I feel television is very definitely an asset in the community and any bad effects beginning to appear, can be avoided providing it is viewed under the correct condition, at the correct time, and in moderation."

"LIBERAL STUDIES — an exercise in thought and discussion."

In 1968 Liberal Studies were introduced to the sixth form. This was in the nature of an experiment which, it is generally felt, has been successful. The meetings were well attended with controversial topics such as war and the right to strike proving most popular.

Each of the meetings, held during a school period, was conducted by one teacher who presented a chosen topic for discussion. The general format of the meetings was an outline of the subject by the teacher followed by a general discussion. Some of the topics included "War" by Mr Cooper, a seminar on 'Religion' by Mr John and a discussion by Mr Edmeades on how the Bible and scientific details of evolution can be reconciled.

In the second term pupils were asked to suggest topics for discussion which interested them. The resulting requests from pupils were matched with staff interests. In the case of two topics, 'Freudian Psychology' and 'Sex,' outside speakers were invited, but without success. Subjects which were finally presented were: "Testis and Measurements (with special reference to I.Q.)" by Mr Bach, "Revolutions in Biology" by Mr Carter, "Intervention—Maori-Pakeha" by Mr Cooper, "Building a House" by Mr Wolfe, "The Problems of Urban Living" by Mr Edmeades, "Censorship" by Mr Robyns, "Should Workers Be Allowed To Strike?" by Mr John, and "Is God Dead?" by Mr Rothwell.

As the future of Liberal Studies seems assured, there have been a number of fresh possibilities for 1969 suggested. These are as follows:

1. Two periods for each session instead of only one. The most convenient periods appear to be periods 2 and 3 or 6 and 7, so that discussions can continue during interval or after school, if necessary.
2. The possibility of inviting outside speakers on specialised subjects.
3. Different speakers putting forward different points-of-view on the same subject to stimulate debates.
4. More pupil participation in topics suggested and arrangement of speakers to work in with the staff.
5. The formation of "buzz groups" in which pupils would meet, first to form their own opinions and then to report back to the main discussion with their conclusions.
6. Besides these possibilities is the question of whether pupils should do a follow-up to the discussion in the form of an essay or some other work. This would be one of the more controversial points in the Liberal Studies programme for 1969.

Most schools, however, have agreed that Liberal Studies should not be a normal examinable subject—any such suggestion would kill the whole idea of Liberal Studies.

DRAMA

"The Tokoroa High School Drama Club with its second major full length production has more than come of age. It has become, without a doubt, a leader in the field of school drama."—Newspaper Critic.

Such were the compliments for the 1968 drama production for "The Crucible." Mr Bruce Mason, well-known N.Z. playwright and drama critic, who made a special trip from Wellington to see the play, considered it to be the best school production he had ever seen. All this was the result of four months of hard work on the part of the producer, Mr D. L. John, and the large cast, which included boys and girls from the third to the upper sixth form.

"The Crucible", set in Salem Massachusetts, in 1692 was written by Arthur Miller as a result of his experiences with the Anti-American Activities Committee in the early 1950's. This committee, since disbanded, was founded to investigate alleged communist activities in the U.S.A. and to hunt out those accused of communism or pro-communist sympathies. Miller saw in this a parallel with the witch-hunts, accusations and trials of 1692 when those accused of witchcraft were sentenced to death. "The Crucible" is a dramatisation of these events. It begins with the discovery that some village girls are dabbling in witchcraft. To divert blame from themselves the girls accuse others of witchcraft. The "crying-out" gathers momentum and soon Salem is a fear-stricken community where the threat of the gallows is never far away. "The Crucible" is a play with special relevance for our times.

The large cast consisting of more than 20 members portrayed a puritan society of farmers and their wives, ministers, judges, old men and women, a court official and a marshal, an old tramp, several young girls and a negro slave. John Givins, now in America on an A.F.S. scholarship, played John Proctor a decent and upstanding Salem farmer in his mid-thirties. However, Proctor is plagued by guilt and self-doubt because of a former moral lapse. Seventeen-year-old Abigail Williams was played by Raewyn McDonald. Abigail is a passionate, head-strong girl largely responsible for the witch-hunting and subsequent hangings in Salem. An immoral hypocrite, she is the cause of Proctor's guilt. Stephen Nicholson played the part of the Reverend Samuel Parris, minister of Salem. Parris begins the play a blustering, nervous man and ends it a broken one, fully aware of the terrible wrongs that have been done. As Abigail's uncle, he shares much of the guilt for the witch-hunting and its terrible consequences. The part of Deputy-Governor Danforth was taken by Terry Scott who portrayed an authoritative middle-aged judge, at times quiet and reasonable and at others remorseless and frightening.

Over a period of four months "The Crucible," perhaps thought by some to be too ambitious a production for school pupils, took shape under the direction of Mr John who was ably assisted by the exceptionally hard work-



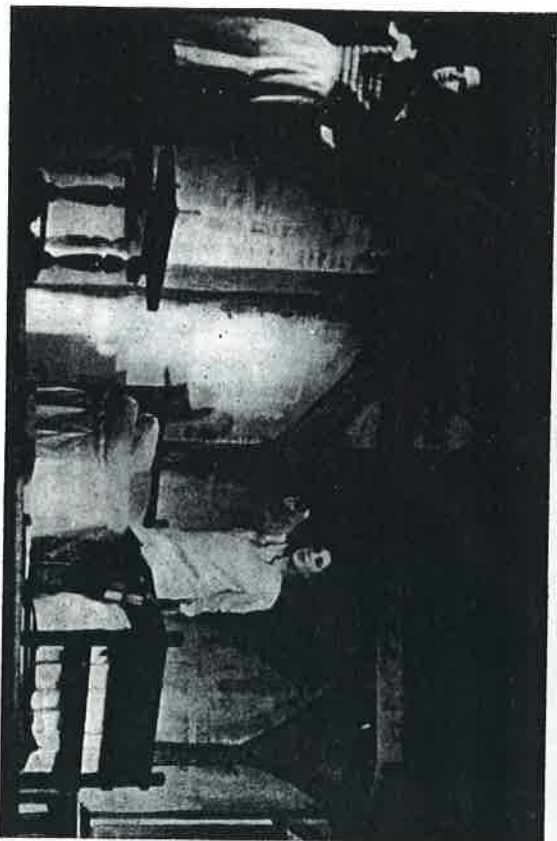

ing Elizabeth Betschart. The task of costuming 22 characters in the severe Puritan style was handled by Mrs E. Evans as designer and Mesdames J. Lennox and D. McDonald as seamstresses. The realistic and colourful stage settings were designed by Mrs Evans. The staging with its various levels and entry from the main body of the hall resulted in greater personal involvement of the audience in the action of the play and lighting was used to great advantage in high-lighting particularly tense and dramatic moments. The result was startling and exciting drama.

Special thanks must go to all those teachers and pupils who helped to make the play a success. The Tokoroa High School Drama Club has established a reputation which it should do its best to maintain.

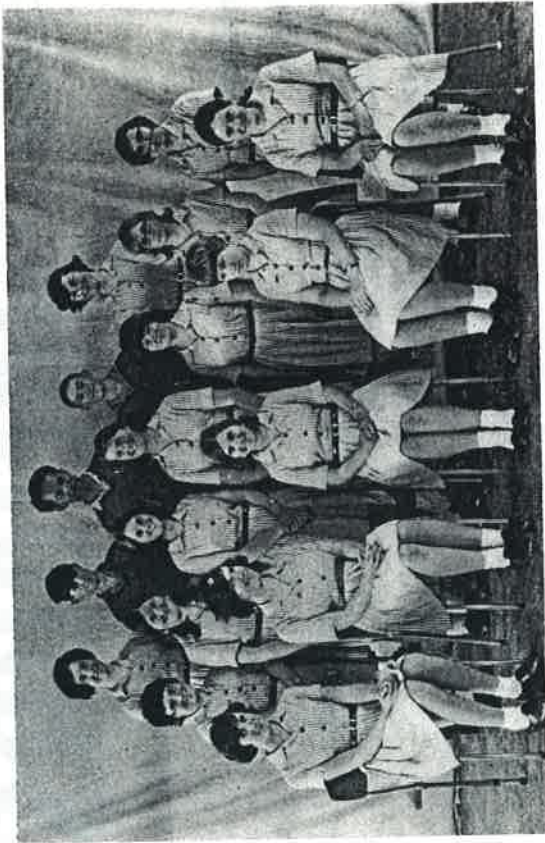

The Library is a room of quietness? The Library is a place of refuge for the bookworm? Perhaps it is both of these things, but we hope that it is even more than these. Fusae made good use of the Library and we like to think that our books did a lot to help her understand our language. She presented the Library with a beautiful book on Japan.

The whole school owes a great deal to those students who give up much of their spare time to help in the Library. We could not manage without them. There are several others who may be given badges early next year.

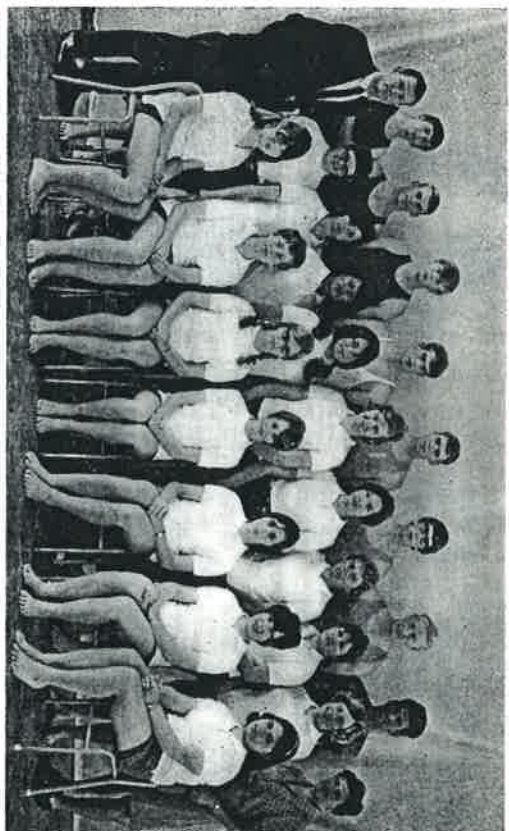

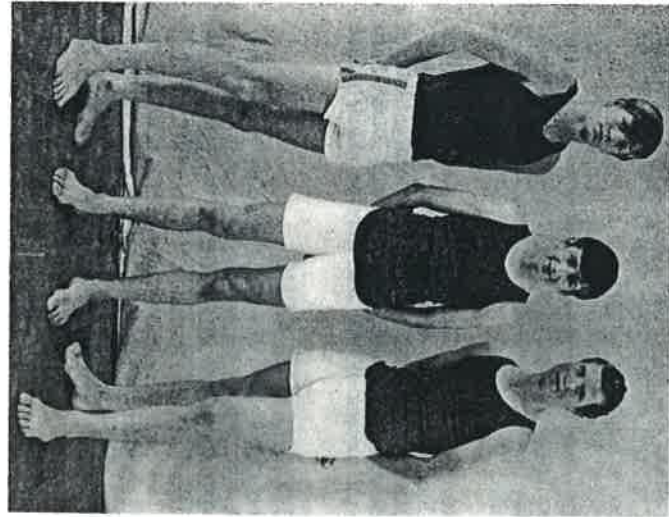

The best game we played was that against C.C.N.Z. in which our "all-games" fitness was the major factor for the victory.

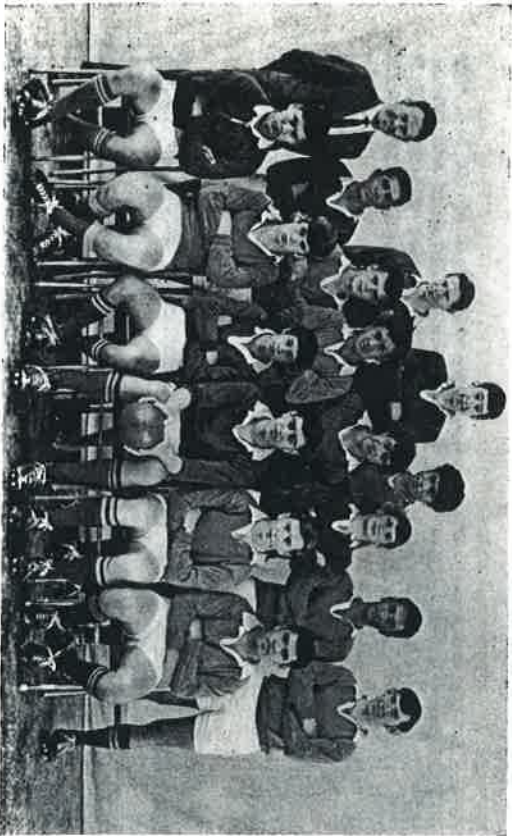
SECOND XV

CRICKET

The 1968 season proved successful and enjoyable for the First Cricket XI. This season the team competed in a Waikato competition which included a number of strong teams.

The first squad for the season consisted of D. McLeish (Capt.), G. Chambers, R. Alexander, W. Jackson, B. Morrissey, J. Cowley, K. Williams, N. Hoy, R. McLeod, K. Lowe, M. Shaw, K. Hillier and B. Fraser. Tokoroa played Matamata in their first home game of the season

Tokoroa, batting first, scored 138 (Morrissey 30 and Cowley 32, McLeod 17 and Shaw 16). In reply Matamata scored 130. Tokoroa, in their second innings, scored 41 and Matamata scored 25 for three. The game ended in a draw.

Tokoroa's second game of the season was against Te Awamutu at Tokoroa. Te Awamutu batted first, gaining 95 runs. (Bowling for Tokoroa Alexander 4-17 and McLeish 3-19). In return Tokoroa scored 90 (Morrissey 27, Chambers 20 and McLeish 26). This was an even match, in which Tokoroa, because of its failure to play constructive and sensible cricket in the latter stages, did not really deserve to win. Nevertheless, Morrissey showed fine form with the bat and Alexander bowled particularly well.

The team's next game was against Taupo. Taupo batted first and scored 73 (bowling for Tokoroa—Jackson three for 27 and Alexander four for 18). Tokoroa could only score 50 in reply. Taupo went in again and compiled 54 with Alexander bowling intelligently and successfully. Tokoroa then went into bat with the opportunity of gaining an out-right win. After a poor start Chambers and Williams attacked the bowling, forming a 40-run partnership, lasting 25 minutes before Chambers was dismissed for 30. Williams carried on scoring runs at a great rate, ably supported by Hoy, and between them they were able to overhaul Taupo's total and secure an outright win for the team. This game was won by team-work and every one of the eleven players performed competently with the fielding being of a very high standard. The game was high-lighted by K. Williams' aggressive 41 not out in 30 minutes which made victory possible.

The annual fixture against Rangitoto College was the next game for the XI. Rangitoto, batting first, amassed the mighty total of 170. Even on a pitch favouring the batsmen, this was a formidable challenge. Tokoroa opened its account with a fine first wicket stand of 33 by Morrissey and Alexander. However, after Morrissey's dismissal, Alexander was given only token help, with Cowley the only one looking confident against the opposition's pace attack. After Alexander was dismissed for a well earned 37, the team slowly folded up, and was finally all out for 105. An error of judgement by the captain, McLeish, had a decided effect on the game, although the team played well, with the tremendous bowling performance by W. Jackson who captured seven wickets for only seven runs being a feature of the match.

Tokoroa's next competition game was against Matamata at Matamata. The game was played on mats which caused some difficulty to the team. Matamata won the toss and batted first, scoring 183 runs. Alexander, again being the most successful with the ball, took four for 38. In reply Tokoroa scored 144 (Morrissey 47, Hillier 39, Chambers 21, and Williams 23). This resulted in a first innings win for Matamata.

Tokoroa's last game of the season was against Cambridge at Tokoroa. Tokoroa batted first, gaining 70 runs. Cambridge was all out in their first innings for only 53. A fine display of pace bowling by Jackson and Alexander, each taking five for 21, clearly showed Tokoroa's superiority.

A feature of the season was Morrissey's consistent high standard of batting, an asset the team was fortunate to have, in most games.

Special note should also be made of Alexander's bowling performances throughout the season. Morrissey gained 168 runs during the season and Alexander captured 24 wickets.

The team wish to thank Mr G. Peters, the coach, for his help and encouragement throughout the season, and Messrs Miller and Scampton for the fine condition in which they kept our pitch during the season.

BOYS' INDOOR BASKETBALL

The season opened with the return of four of the 1967 'A' Team, which created a strong nucleus upon which to build our team. Those returning were Jerry Cowley, Zeke Cowley, 'Bones' (Warren Osborne), and Brian Morrissey. New-comers were Peter and Paul Storer, Gordon Povey, and Chris Kahui.

The team had a few practice games together before the start of the Waikato Competition. These were important in that the boys learnt to play more as a team and less as individuals.

By the beginning of the winter season the team had developed a great team spirit and played according to the coach's wishes. During this competition the team trounced all opposition and was threatened only by Taupo and Church College. The toughest game was with Church College which we won 26-20. This was indeed a great feat as Church College have been the dominant force in the Waikato Secondary Schools' Basketball for several years. After defeating Church College, the team went on to win the competition without the loss of one game.

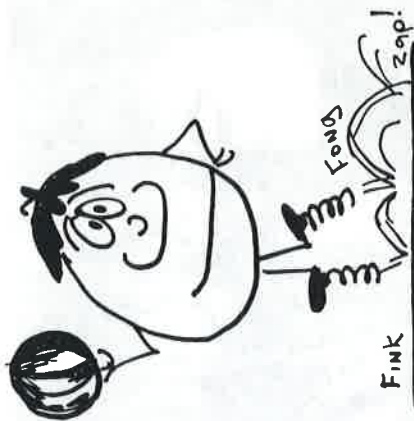
From here the team went into the Waikato Secondary Schools' Tournament held at Church College on the 19th August. Besides the regular 'A' team players the team also included K. Storer, P. McLean, and B. Lund (one of last year's players who had recently returned).

In the preliminaries we defeated Melville and Fairfield quite comfortably and went into the semi-final against Hamilton Boys' High. In this game we had little trouble and so moved on into the final against Church College. As the game was being played in the College stadium, all the pupils were there to support their team. (Tokoroa only had three of its students as supporters). Spurred on by these three the team played tremendously, swept the opposition aside and won 43-28, much to the disappointment of the 500 "Church-College-of-New-Zealand" supporters. The team performed incredibly well with pressure defence being the key weapon, bustling Church College into numerous mistakes. Control of the boards by Morrissey and Lund, accurate shooting by Zeke, and unquestionable leadership by Jerry Cowley were key features of the game. The game was played with tremendous emphasis on speed and Tokoroa was dominant in all aspects of play.

The tournament as a whole showed defects in our play which our coach ironed out before the New Zealand Tournament in Palmerston North. It also showed the depth and quality of our younger players — the Storer clan showing great potential in their shooting and defence play, while Gordon, Chris and Peter McLean performed well on the boards.

After this great performance, the team was eligible to compete in the first-ever New Zealand Secondary Schools' Indoor Basketball Championships, held in Palmerston North on September 28th.

In preparation for this tournament Coach Peters ordered the boys to keep in trim over the holidays. The third term saw the team working on

Individual skills interwoven into their teamwork. Great emphasis was placed on "full-court-pressure" defence and control of the boards which were the team's strong points. With a week to go the team played two pre-tournament games against Taupo and Putaruru, winning both. This was held primarily as a fitness test and the team would like to thank the Taupo and Putaruru boys for their help in our preparation. It was obvious from this that the team was not as fit as thought, so the final week was spent in some fast workouts during lunch-hours.

September 28th—2 p.m.—and the first-ever tournament of its kind, got under way, when Tokoroa took to the court against Nelson College, winners of the Wellington zone tournament. Tokoroa held an early lead and with ten minutes of play remaining had amassed a 15-point lead. At this stage, however, three of our boys had four fouls each and with rapid succession Morrissey, J. Cowley, and Lund left the court with five fouls. The closing minutes were tense, as Nelson hauled themselves back to only a 3-point deficit by full-time. The final score was 59—56.

This tournament by the way was a knockout competition with four teams which had all qualified by winning their respective zone competitions. In the second semi-final Otago Boys' High defeated Mt Albert Grammar to move into the final.

In the final Tokoroa went into an early lead. In the opening stages Jerry

received a black eye and five minutes before half-time Lund was fouled off. In the second half with "Bones" registering four fouls he had to play it "cool," resulting in the others playing much harder. Due to sound play by MacDonald, the Otago Boys' captain, his team hauled themselves into a 6 points lead with only five minutes of play remaining. The pressure was on and Coach Peters called a time-out for a last-minute morale-boost.

Morrissey, with "dazzling foot-work" was able to control offensive boards, while Zeke with deadly accurate shooting was able to draw Tokoroa level. In the last 3 minutes Tokoroa forced its way into a 6-point lead, defeating Otago Boys' High, 59—53.

By winning the first New Zealand Secondary Schools' Indoor Championship the season ended on a successful note.

Jerry Cowley was outstanding throughout the year and his leadership, sportsmanship, and indubitable excellence as a player contributed to the boys playing as a team to win all games. Jerry was well rewarded as he played for the Bay of Plenty Representative Team against the touring Venture for Victory American Team, where he proved himself a great prospect for future New Zealand honours.

The high standard of play achieved by the team was largely due to the skilful coaching of Mr Peters. The team would like to thank him particularly for the time and effort he put into making the season such a successful one. We would also like to thank the Girls' 'A' Indoor Team, parents and many others who supported or contributed in making the Tokoroa High School Boys' Indoor Basketball Team's season such a success.

The school championships were held in the first term and the results were as follows:—

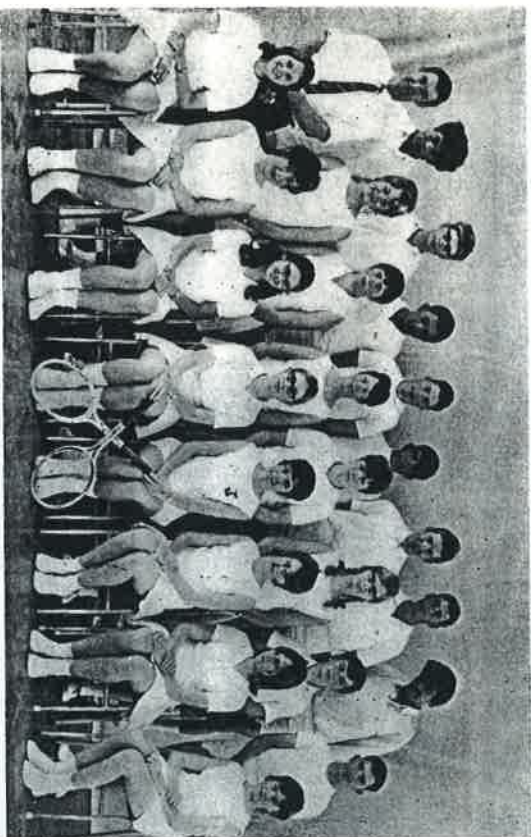

SCHOOL YOUTH HOSTELLING TRIP AUGUST 15th — SEPTEMBER 3rd.

This trip was undertaken by one member of staff and ten boys and began with a night train journey from Hamilton to Wellington. It was fairly comfortable but there was little sleep that night. Wellington was cold but fine and the inter-island ferry trip was smooth and uneventful, except for the passing of the damaged ship 'Gothic' in port for repairs and the sunken 'Waline' which was surrounded by activity in preparation for its removal from the harbour.

The first three days were spent at Havelock, a tiny town at the head of Palorus Sound, but the weather was unwhiting with cold winds and continual cloudy skies. In spite of this a walk was made to an old goldmining area at Canvastown, where no gold was found by any of the boys. The following day, 18th, a climb was made to one of the hills overlooking the Sound, a steady, but not arduous task. The view was worth every ounce of effort as a large area of Marlborough came into view and the snow-capped mountains south of Blenheim.

From here the party travelled by 'faithful' New Zealand Railways to Kalkoura which proved to be popular with the group. The hotel there is new, situated below the cliffs and close to the beach. Visits were made to the Kalkoura Peninsula, the Seal Colony and the cave of Maori's Leap before a stormy N-E. gale blew in and prevented further travel on our final day in the area.

From Kalkoura we travelled further south to Christchurch where the weather became fine and warm. City life was apparently readily acceptable, even though several cameras and one boy were nearly lost during a short 48-hour stay! A variety of pursuits were followed including visits to the Museum, New Brighton Beach, Lyttelton Road Tunnel and the Port Hills and a reunion with Mr Jones who left Tokoroa Staff last year. It was good to see him settled into his new position.

On Monday 26th we left the South Island on the overnight ferry from Lyttelton for Wellington. The trip was cold and calm except for hundreds of small boys roaming the ship. On arrival at Wellington it was a matter of a quick breakfast and on the train for Napier, where we arrived after a cramped 6-hour journey. Our first afternoon produced heavy rain, so reluctantly we went to the cinema to see 'The Charge of the Light Brigade' which was well appreciated by the audience.

During the rest of our short stay here a general tour of the city was made on foot to places of individual interest and then we continued our jour-

ney up the East Coast to Gisborne, where we arrived on 'Hostel Night' and became involved in pancake making and judging the results which gave us indigestion and stomach pains for a week!

The inevitable walk to the top of Kaiti Hill was completed in sunshine and the Cook Memorial visited at the beginning of the ascent. Again rain intervened, but we needed the rest as our train left Gisborne for Wairoa at 3.50 a.m. on 31st August. This was made necessary as the only bus from Wairoa to Lake Waikaremoana left at 7.45 a.m. A few semi-conscious members of the group soon completed the job, once they had settled in their seats and we arrived at Wairoa in complete darkness at 5.0 a.m. It was cold. The walk into town was like an army manoeuvre, but the group saw their first sunrise for many years and very worthwhile it was, even through bleary eyes!

The wait at Wairoa seemed unending, but we finally arrived at Aniwanuiwa Youth Hostel which is a very unusual building. It consists of two small bunk rooms and a kitchen with an open fire. There is no electricity at the Hostel so we enjoyed the novelty of candles, as we huddled around the open fire to keep out the cold. The weather was unpleasant most of the time and snow even fell during one evening.

The views around the large, peaceful lake were superb and many tramps were made to gain height to improve the area of vision. Other hikes were made to the Bridal Falls and Papakorito Falls before the group divided into two sections. One group hiked to Lake Waikareiti and then for several hours around the far side to a National Park Hut, where they stayed overnight. The other group went as far as Lake Waikareiti only and then climbed Mt Ngamoho, 3644 feet, where the whole lake comes into view with the East Coast, the sea and rolling hills to the north. The area is, of course, unspoiled as it is in the area of the Urewera National Park.

These last few days were certainly the highlights and it would have been wonderful to stay on for at least another week, but our bus left the Park on Tuesday, September 3rd (it only runs three times a week in Winter) for Rotorua and then a quick change of buses to return to Tokoroa.

The trip was very successful and I certainly hope we have more converts to Hostelling which gives you cheap, adequate accommodation and a way of seeing your country and the world that you can't in any other way.
