EDITORIAL

In considering a comment for this editorial I consulted Mr Ryan for an experienced view to offset the possible bias of my own youthful opinions. We talked about freedom, the greatest issue of the modern world, and naturally enough, we talked of freedom in terms of education and Tokoroa High. Young people today are being given more and more freedom. Some abuse this because they do not have the maturity and responsibility to cope with it. But in most cases young adults are accepting new freedoms and the responsibilities which must go with them.

Tokoroa High gives more freedom to its students than many other New Zealand schools and we are often criticised for this. In the light of the incidents of violence in and around Tokoroa, outsiders may see its young people as hooligans. However, this obviously is not a fair representation of the town's Youth.

We, the young people, are dealing with relatively new freedoms and the older folk are trying to point out the self discipline which is needed to make freedom work.

What is this "freedom" and "responsibility"? It is the freedom of doing what you wish, with the responsibility of giving due regard for the rights of other individuals. It is the freedom to guide your own morals with the responsibility of understanding the consequences and possible effects on the community. It is the freedom of expression with responsibility. It is the freedom to manage your own affairs with the responsibility of understanding your economy, health, and for that matter, your conscience. But perhaps the most important is the freedom to think as an individual without being bogged down by the trappings and taboos of our society.

In the light of what I have written, I can ask the older generation to understand that youth and education need freedom, and the young people to accept emancipation with commonsense and not abuse the priveleges which come in increasing abundance in our changing society.

REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

It is difficult, in an end-of-year message such as this, to express all the thoughts that one considers important regarding our school, that are relevant at this particular time of the year.

All of us who have close contact with the school — staff, students, parents and Board — are all aware throughout the year of the importance of the school in the community. It is at this season though that one tends to consider more critically those aspects of the school year that appear to have had some special significance.

There has been, of course, material progress in the growth of the school. Frustration too has been encountered by those whose task it is to ensure that this growth is matched by extended classroom and associated facilities. However vital and necessary to expansion those things are, they are not in themselves as important as other less tangible additions to the school's growth and station. Increased rolls and additional buildings are but the outward and visible signs that the school is, like the town it belongs to, growing at a very rapid rate. It is, of course, essential that we cater for this growth and always strive to provide adequate opportunities for teaching and study to realise their full potential.

The real growth of this, or any school, however, is better measured — in my opinion — by these qualities, hard to define, yet essential to understand. Such qualities as education in its full, not just scholastic, sense; maturity of outlook, exemplified by the more senior pupils; responsibility and citizenship allied to an objective, not human, approach to controversy; these are the characteristics of a school indicative of real progress. These qualities in the pupils of this school have been readily discernible in this past year, and are more and more becoming part of the pattern of behaviour of a larger majority of the student-body.

A school is known and judged largely by its students and their performance, not only at classroom and examination levels but also in the wider sphere of human activities as a whole. Thanks to the leadership of your Principal and Staff, and to the ready acceptance of their guidance and help by the student-body, there is no doubt that the reputation of this school has never been higher than it is now. I am sure that this trend will continue, safe as it is in the hands of the pupils of the present and the Old Pupils of the future.

To those of you who leave school this year, my best wishes to you to find a sense of achievement and success in your chosen careers. To those who return to school next year may you continue to strive for, and achieve, educational improvement, and in so doing help yourselves and your school to greater achievements.

I lived in Salina, Kansas, in the middle of America's wheat fields as part of the Rupert Family and attended Salina Senior High School with another 1900 students. In this town the wonderful friendship and hospitality of Americans was shown to me by all quarters of the community.

I took part in a full high school student's life which was mainly set around the school with a tremendous amount of after school activities in sport and dramatics. Of course, I also followed the American pastimes of drive-in movies, gridiron football, hamburger and French fries and the greatest pastime of all "dragging Main."

American people are basically the same as New Zealanders, they like many of the same things, and above all, they are "human." They have feelings. This is the over-riding aspect of my year in America — I now realise the importance of people. I met with 3000 other Field Scholars and we all agreed that the A.F.S. motto had real meaning for us as we had put in to practice and it had worked. The motto is

"WALK TOGETHER, TALK TOGETHER O YE PEOPLES OF THE EARTH:
THEN AND ONLY THEN SHALL YE FIND PEACE."

LIBERAL STUDIES

A full and varied programme of liberal studies was presented to the 6th and 7th Forms during the year with topics on drug addiction, economics, Australia-N.Z. relations, the adolescent's role in society, Soviet life and education, Rhodesia and psychology.

Mr Pozdnyakov of the Soviet Legation presented a profusion of facts about Russian life and was eagerly questioned on matters ranging from the Russian invasion of Czechoslovakia to the role of religion in the U.S.S.R.

Mr Paris, in a talk on psychology, pointed out many of the misconceptions concerning this subject, such as the fallibility of I.Q. tests and the superstitious belief that one race is naturally mentally superior to another.

An interesting contrast on the Rhodesian situation was given by Mr Henderson Tapela (formerly of Rhodesia) and Mr Sam Greene (President of the N.Z. Rhodesian Society). Mr Tapela spoke about Rhodesia from the point of view of four million black Rhodesians without the opportunities and political rights of their white neighbours. He pointed out that all races must have equal rights and opportunities if Rhodesia, and ultimately the world, are to be saved from a savage blood bath.

Mr Green presented a picture of Rhodesia in which there is a happy and contented African majority which does not want, indeed resists, any idea of African rule. The Africans have equal opportunities with the whites and if for some reason they lack their educational and political standards it is only, according to Mr Green, because they are mentally inferior to them.

declare at 87 for 6. H.B.H.S. went back in to bat and were all out for 80. This resulted in a first innings win to Tokoroa.




This year they have played in many inter-school fixtures, with the most enjoyable being against Otumoetai, as well as competing in the North

Island championships and other out-of-school tournaments.


