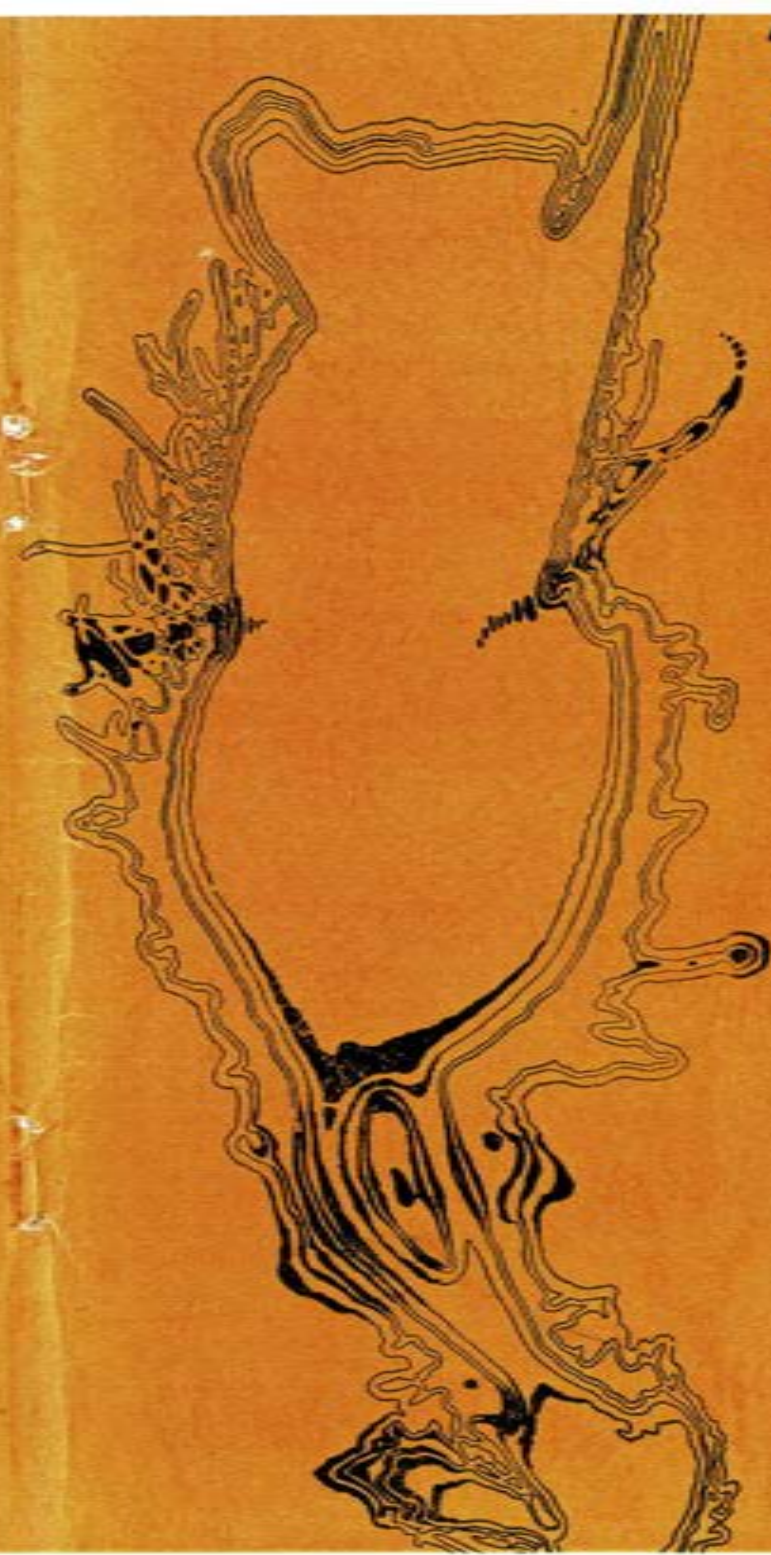

ATHLETICS

CRICKET

GENERAL STUDIES

The Liberal studies programme for sixth and seventh formers, which first made its appearance some five years ago, has this year continued under a new name, General Studies. This subject has been given greater emphasis in the curriculum because a need has been felt to discuss some of the weightier issues that do not normally appear in other subjects or which are not normally given treatment in depth. Five periods were set aside per week for General Studies.

The programme started with a team of five teachers but owing to the demands made by the timetable only three teachers carried the programme for most of the year.

Studies were conducted in two ways. For most of the year sixth and seventh formers divided into three groups and seminars were conducted in classrooms. There were in addition several major studies taken in the hall. Seminars on sex, on drugs, on types of elections, on how the economy of the country works were some of the major studies. In smaller groups the population explosion, methods of learning, student attitudes to current issues, the race problem, the school environment, man's emotional re-adjustment to major changes in the Twentieth Century, the nature and effects of Radio and T.V.; town planning; Electoral systems; Democracy, Student Government; Arab-Israeli Conflict; the war in Vietnam; Apartheid; Utopia - more Christ and Marx; Creative writing, were studied.

On the whole the programme was a success and most of the students appreciated the opportunity to discuss these issues. Some students however, were apathetic and others were so examination-oriented in their thinking that they did not appreciate a programme divorced from the examination system. This is a pity. Many also did not realize the work that members of Staff put into the programme. It is hoped that with the experience gained this year the programme next year will be more successful.

Each Wednesday lunchtime, Crusaders meet in A.23, with our leaders, Mrs Ward and Mr McDonald. Crusaders are a group of students with a common interest - witnessing for God, as our motto, "Witness Unto Me," (Acts 1:8) states.

Even though our own school group is small, the Crusader movement, which has groups all over New Zealand, certainly is not. This was revealed to us when we attended a Crusader rally in Hamilton recently, and met many of our fellow members.

PARENT - TEACHER ASSOCIATION

One of the chief aims of the association during the year was to plan, raise money for and have completed, a swimming bath, by the end of the year. It has been possible to raise some money and all this has been put aside for the construction of the swimming bath. However, the planning has suffered a set-back in that the Board of Governors has not found it possible to finalise their thinking on the form this bath should take. They have, very wisely, approached the County Borough Council in order to sound out what the interest might be and whether the borough would come in on a share basis. These considerations take a lot of time and so far have been inconclusive.

To raise money for the swimming bath, two major activities were carried through. The first was a coal drive and the second a walkathon. Quite a few parents and pupils and teachers did a lot of work to make these a success. However, the opinion was expressed that many more parents and pupils could have been more helpful. Indeed some people thought there was a degree of apathy amongst the pupils at the High School, concerning these fund raising activities. Perhaps if the association had been able to be more explicit about the type of pool and when it was proposed to build it, there would have been a better response.

The need for education on "healthy living" has all been very much in the mind of your headmaster, teachers and Parent-Teacher Association. This year, as was done previously, the association, with the help of the teaching staff arranged for "Mother - Daughter" and "Father - Son" evenings. These meetings were very well attended by pupils and parents.

Another evening was devoted to "getting to know the school" and "meeting the teacher." On this evening a large number of parents and their children visited the school and were shown over the classrooms where they were met, and various activities discussed and explained, by the teachers. Afterwards there was an opportunity to discuss their children's progress with the teacher.

Many children at Tokoroa High School come from far away places, such as Cook Islands, Tonga, Fiji or from distant parts of the world. Thus they come from different ethnic groups and some parents are not well aware of the New Zealand educational system and the opportunities offered. The Association felt that there were language difficulties and possibly shyness which prevented them from making full use of opportunities. In order to attempt to improve this state of affairs a "League of Nations Evening" was held. During this evening, parents from different ethnic groups were talked to by an expert on the educational system in New Zealand in their own language and afterwards were able to take part in discussions, again in their own language, on various questions and problems relating to secondary education. Afterwards there was a supper provided by the different groups consisting of examples of their National dishes. By arranging this type of evening, the Association has hope that the parents will feel more free to join in future activities associated with the school.

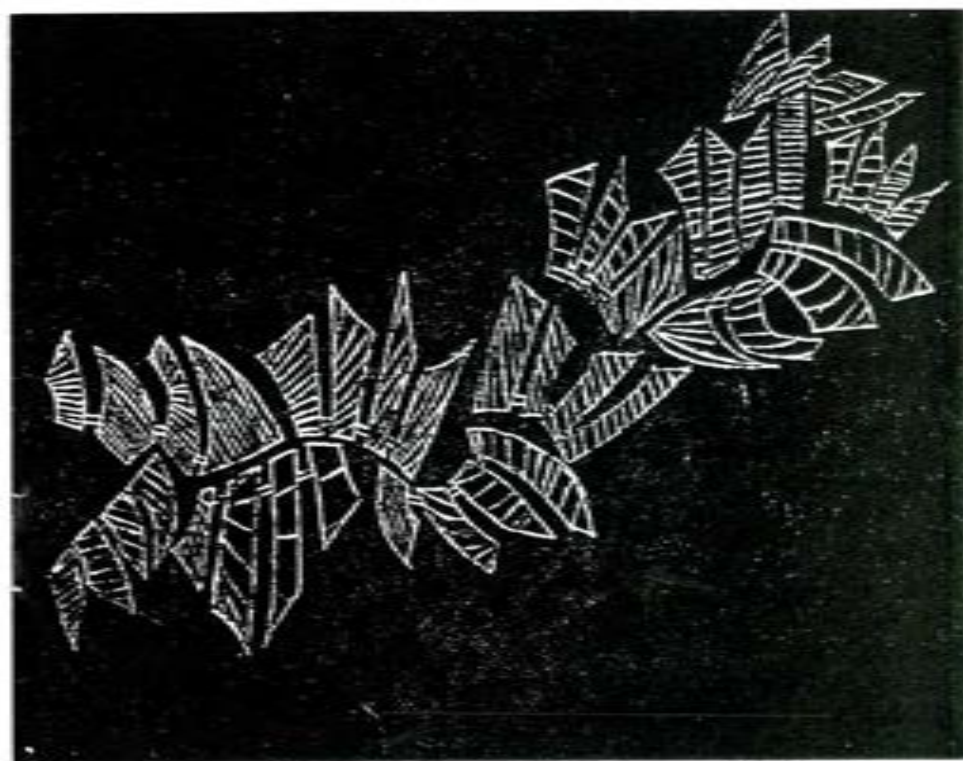

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

At our Senior Prizegiving function last year I spoke of the growing sense of frustration which I had at the failure of people, both inside and outside the profession of education, to appreciate the real needs of young people today. All too often the demand is for a highly structured situation in schools closely governed in accordance with a strict set of clearly set down rules and measured by examinations. At best such a system has only produced citizens trained to conform, at worst young people rebellious in the extreme when they escape from the authoritarian situation.

I ask your indulgence as I quote a paragraph from my 1969 Report in which I echoed the words of Miss Lack of Rosebery Grammar School. "Educationists and parents alike share a great responsibility, not only to make the new generation aware of what is happening but to help them break down the division between "we" and the faceless "they" who make decisions. Not only must our young people be brought to that important goal of academic achievement but they also need to understand the social implications of new developments in technology and science. They need to be given scope for the idealism which is such an essential part of youth, and to be given ways to approach problems constructively. They need encouragement and help in believing that these great problems of mankind can be tackled, and be tackled by them, working together as members of a democracy, but a democracy in which each individual has a genuine chance to make his own contribution felt. This will obviously require both a radical reconstruction of the curriculum and a different treatment of the young people in our schools. They will have to be given much more freedom, and, with freedom, much more responsibility."

During this year we have tried rather more to do these things. With five periods each week timetabled for General Studies in the 6th and 7th Forms our Senior people have been encouraged to escape from the formalism of their traditional subjects and to look closely at some of the problems around them. As one direct result, I believe, five seniors asked to be nominated for Volunteer Service Abroad. The group has also been involved in several surveys and undertakings in this local community of Tokoroa, and within the School itself, following discussions and studies, the Prefect system has been abolished and changes made in the Student Organization.

I have long believed that the best educational situation is one in which the student is encouraged to find his strengths and weaknesses, and so to train himself by a system of planning and experimentation based on his experience, with the guidance of his parents and teachers. He will make mistakes, of course, and often the result appears to be chaotic but the learning processes involved, although perhaps appearing to the traditionally educated outside observer as dangerous no-education, are in the long run much more valuable than the somewhat neater result of the older more formally structured organisation.

We have not reached an ultimate this year and much development remains to be done to improve our working model, but we have taken one major

It is my opinion that the prefect system has not been effectively replaced and because of this the school has suffered certain intangible consequences. Things such as tone and student-teacher relations are not as good as they have been or could be.

Perhaps one of the main problems this year is that so many changes have taken place at once (abolishment of prefects, full time liberal studies, school uniforms etc.) or perhaps it is too much to hope that students will accept freedom and in return act in a responsible and mature manner.

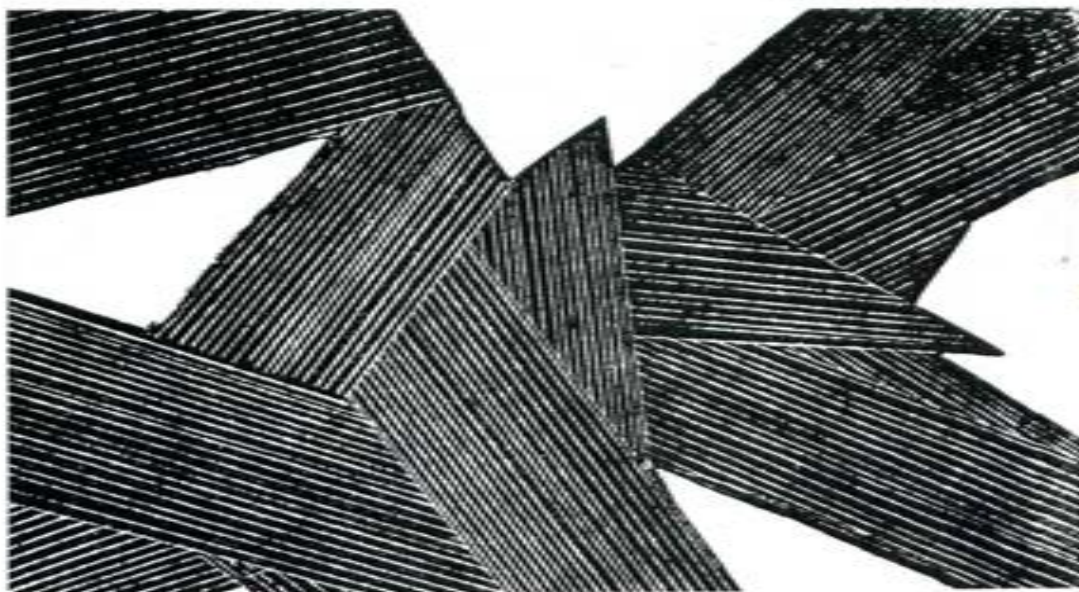

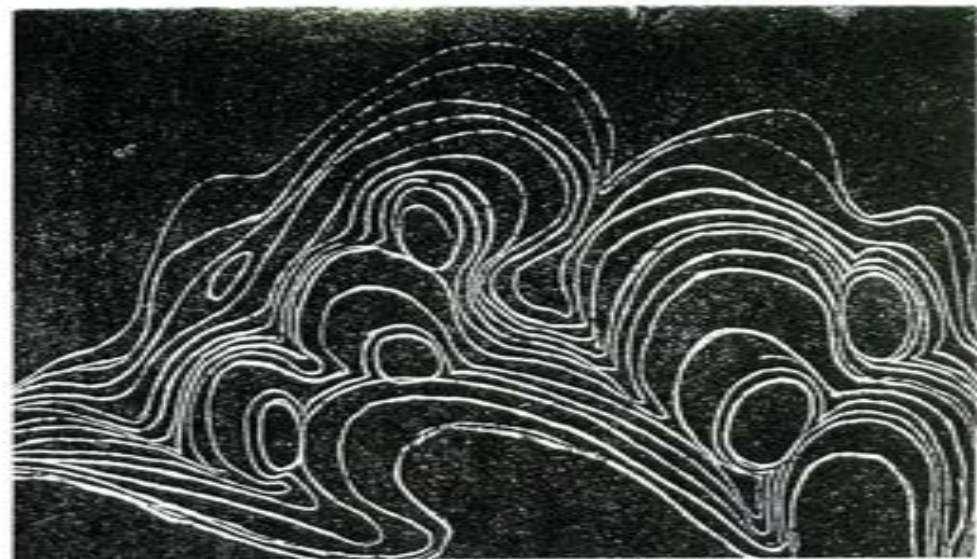

Being and living, for any length of time, with another family in a different country is the most sharing, growing, learning experience possible for 5th and 6th formers all over the world. Although this may sound eruditely fanatical, to me it is a sincere statement of what I wish all could participate in at some stage of their lives.

My year in the U.S.A. on an A.F.S. International scholarship was spent living with my American family - the Townsends of New Canaan, Connecticut. On the eastern side of the continent and less than an hour from New York city, the opportunity for involvement - as myself and as a New Zealander - was vast.

1969-70, being a year of much unrest, instability and participation; moratoriums, anti-pollution work-ins, peace petitions, work with intellectually handicapped children, folk festivals, skiing in Vermont, travelling throughout the U.S. and to Mexico during spring vacation, were part of my year - also going shopping in "my" Maori outfit, teaching elementary school children English and "New Zild", working on the school year book, teaching swimming at the \$3 Million Y.M.C.A., seeing many New York plays and most of all being a part of my American family and community.

Over 3,000 foreign students live in America as A.F.S.-ers, and less than half that number of American students spend either their summer or a year in one of over 64 countries - Beth Malkus is one of these students. It is only through direct experiences such as ours and the families and people with

VOLUNTEER SERVICE ABROAD

Volunteer Service Abroad is an organisation which was formed with two main aims:

1. The cultivation of better relations with our less developed neighbours through assistance and education.
2. To give young New Zealanders the opportunity to travel to another country and live with the native people.

The service runs two schemes. The one in which I am involved is known as THE SCHOOL LEAVERS SCHEME. Under this scheme boys and girls, leaving school from the Seventh Form go to one of the countries of the Pacific Basin or Thailand for a year to teach. They live in quarters near the school and these quarters, although comfortable, are as near to local standards as possible so as not to arouse antagonism. In fact the volunteer must try to exhibit as little economic superiority as possible. The subjects taught by the school leaver are to a great extent the same as those taught in our school. There is, however, an emphasis on agricultural subjects. The subjects are taken up to School Certificate level.

The volunteers are chosen only after very careful selection. The first step is to fill in an application form. This form asks a great variety of questions: that is, about academic and family background, your sporting and other interests, and your views on issues of the day. On the basis of this and an initial interview the applicant may be chosen for the Final Selection Course. During the Final Selection Course the volunteer is observed under a great variety of circumstances, e.g. in discussion, groups working with other volunteers, cooking meals etc. Also during this course the volunteer undergoes two more interviews. These are perhaps the most probing interviews anyone is likely to encounter. The questions asked are apparently simple but they are searching, and the answers to them will give the extremely perceptive interviewers a pretty clear idea of your character. Their views coupled with the observations of the supervisors indicate the suitability of the prospective volunteer for assignment overseas. Once the selections have been made the lucky forty successful volunteers (about 20% of the initial applicants are successful) receive instructions regarding passports, visas, inoculations, etc., for the country of your assignment.

I applied for posting to Thailand. If I am given this assignment I will be involved with welfare work, as well as teaching, in a school for stray boys. I will be teaching English, Agriculture, Physical Education, and sports. I will be living in the boarding establishment at the school itself. Most of my spare time will be occupied with extra-curricular activities, e.g., sports, trade training.

There are forty assignments available this year. The other assignments are in Fiji, British Solomon Islands, Papua, New Hebrides, Tonga and Western Samoa.

This scheme is of great value not only for the country receiving aid but to the volunteer as well. I would recommend that any sixth former considering applying for this scheme do so without hesitation, remembering that they can withdraw at any time if they should change their mind.

MICHAEL SHAW: (1st five-eighth) Led the team in a mature fashion both on and off the paddock and played a very fine Waikato trial game.



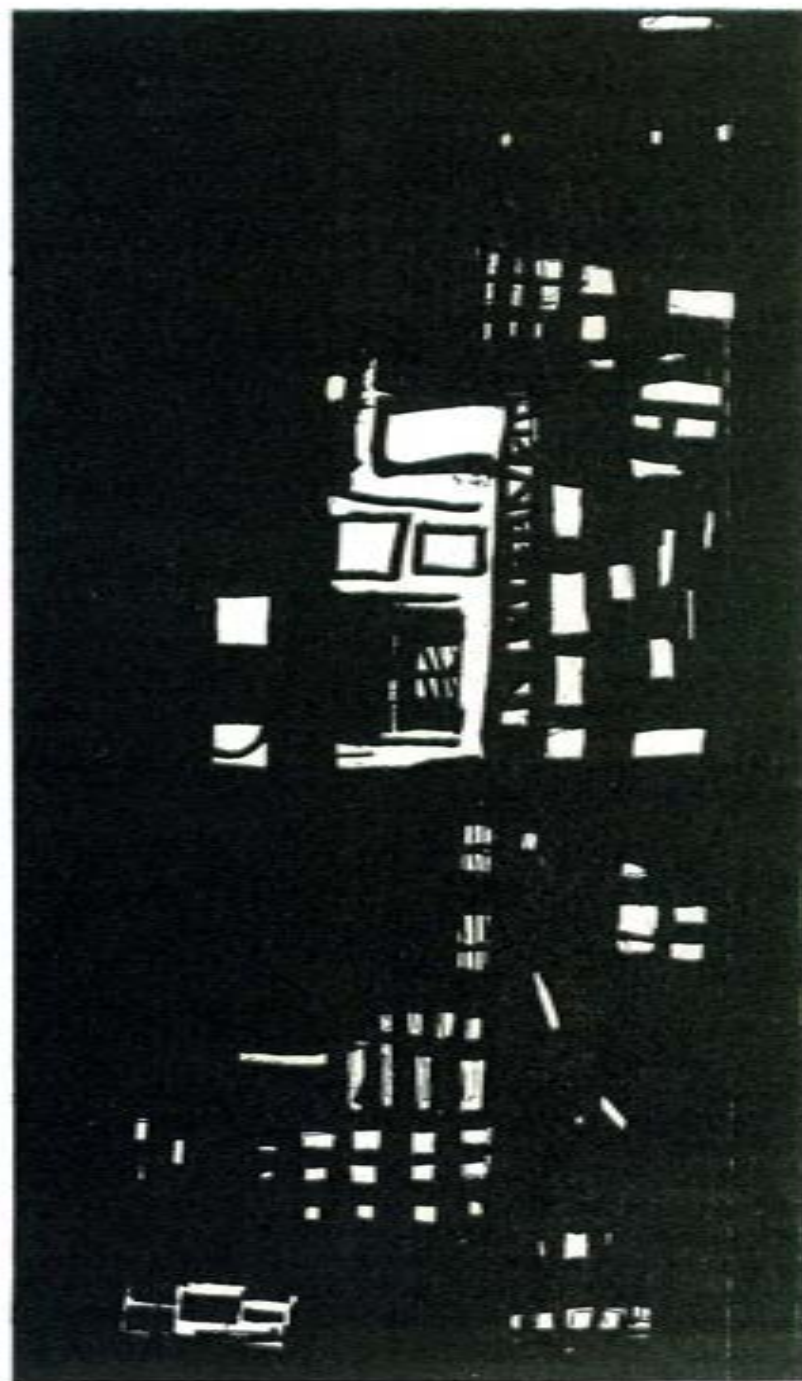
