Mr and Mrs Ryan were farewelled by the school in two separate ceremonies on Thursday of the last week of Term II.

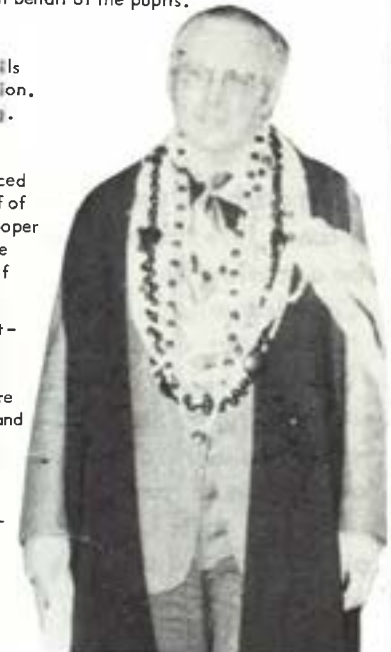

## PRISONER

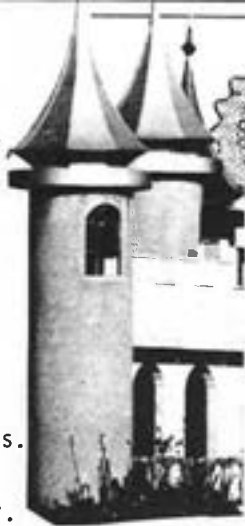
He stands alone.

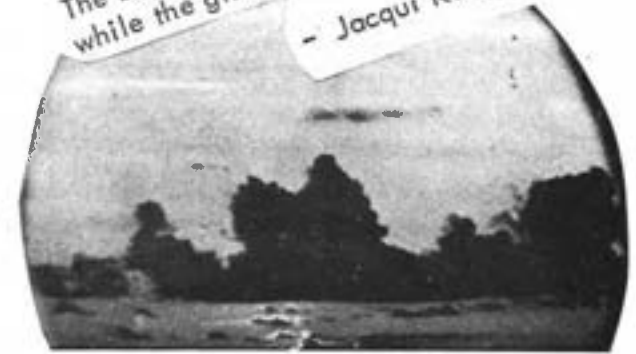

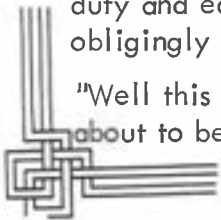

For the first time in many years, if not the first time ever, there were no staff changes at the beginning of 1982. There has, however been some movement during the course of the year. 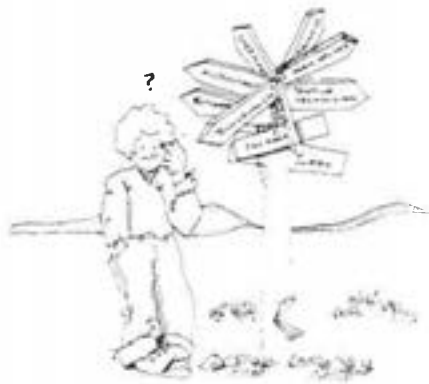

## GUIDANCE, COUNSELLING AND CAREERS



We've really had a pretty good year! A few upsets, certainly, but we find that there has been a steady decline in the usual bickering and harrasing amongst the juniors which used to be a feature of the settling-in period at the beginning of each year.

We are convinced that our Tutor system is at least partially responsible for the change and that the 'vertical' mixing of youngsters is having a good effect upon the whole school. Word of this must have gone out in a grand way as we have enrolled 64 new students up to the time of writing this, including twelve overseas students from: Australia (2), Holland (3) Cook Islands (2), Fiji (1), UK (3), and USA (1). Let us remember that although they've come here to learn about our ways, we can learn a lot from them too!

Here we cannot resist mentioning that, although he was not officially enrolled (!), our new Headmaster, Mr Burrige came quietly, adjusted quickly and has already given us the message that we are going to have to accept a few new ideas from him too, take it or leave!

Despite the present day difficulties, and here we are referring to the unemployment situation, many school-leavers managed to secure some good jobs for themselves and a considerable number have indicated an interest in further study at University or Technical Institutes.

Teacher training took a knocking this year! Only four applied, which appears to confirm our thinking that pupils DO read the newspapers and are up with the 'political times'. The greatest surprise this year was that although all senior Māori and Island pupils were given an opportunity to meet and talk with Māori Affairs Community officers from Tokoroa and Rotorua in July, not one applied for an apprenticeship in the Trade Training Scheme. A healthy interest was shown in our pre-employment training programme which started in February with 32 fifth form boys and girls and ended just before the August holidays. All participants had an opportunity to observe and work in four different job situations. It is hoped that we may be able to continue the scheme with next year's fifth formers and perhaps extend our careers programme more widely within the fifth form.


During the August holidays, four boys and one girl were nominated by the school to train on local farms. Remembering the August sunshine, it must have been good fun for them too!

# «BIG AL»



This year's musical production was set in the gangster era of the 1920's and 30's and revolved around the life and times of Al Capone, (Stephen Puckey) the notorious gangster.

The play progressed from the emigration of Capone's Parents, (Debbie Watts and Peter Hardy) from Italy to America to begin a new life.

As Capone grew up, he was introduced into the Gangster world by "King Pin", Johnny Torrio (Conrad New), and his Moll, Goldie Kandinski (Raewyn Benten). Capone, accompanied by his wife Mae (Fiona Pook), took over the bootlegging and brothel in Chicago. The story ended with Capone's release from prison and his eventual death in 1931.

I think the students all wanted to stay longer and were sad to leave. We all learned something about the Maori way of life which in itself was an achievement. We all learned through group discussion about "mana and aoha" and also about Christ through prayer and discussion also.

I would sincerely like to thank the Elders of the tribe Marae especially Koro Peter and Koro Dave for sharing their time and way of life with us. I would also like to thank the teachers the guest speakers, the parents of students and the cooking staff.

Later that day we had some lectures from the Police, CIB and Ministry of Transport. That night certain people were moved to ensure no bed-hopping or talking and we all had a peaceful night.

Once again there was a 6.30 am marathon and later that day we had more visitors from the Social Welfare, Citizens Advice Bureau and Red Cross. We then had our final meal and prepared to return home. Everyone climbed aboard the bus slowly because no one wanted to leave.

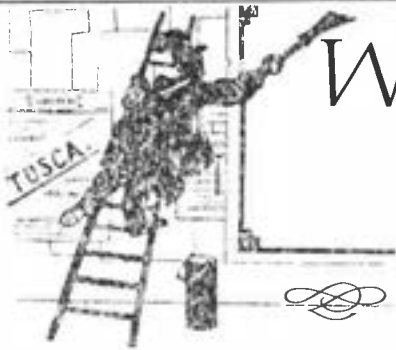

But for a trip spiced with cultural activities and the Maori way of life - not to mention a lot of fun and the experience of living together, eating together and sleeping together, and learning of aoha and mana, the kids of 3E and 3F would love to visit that little marae just up the road again one day.

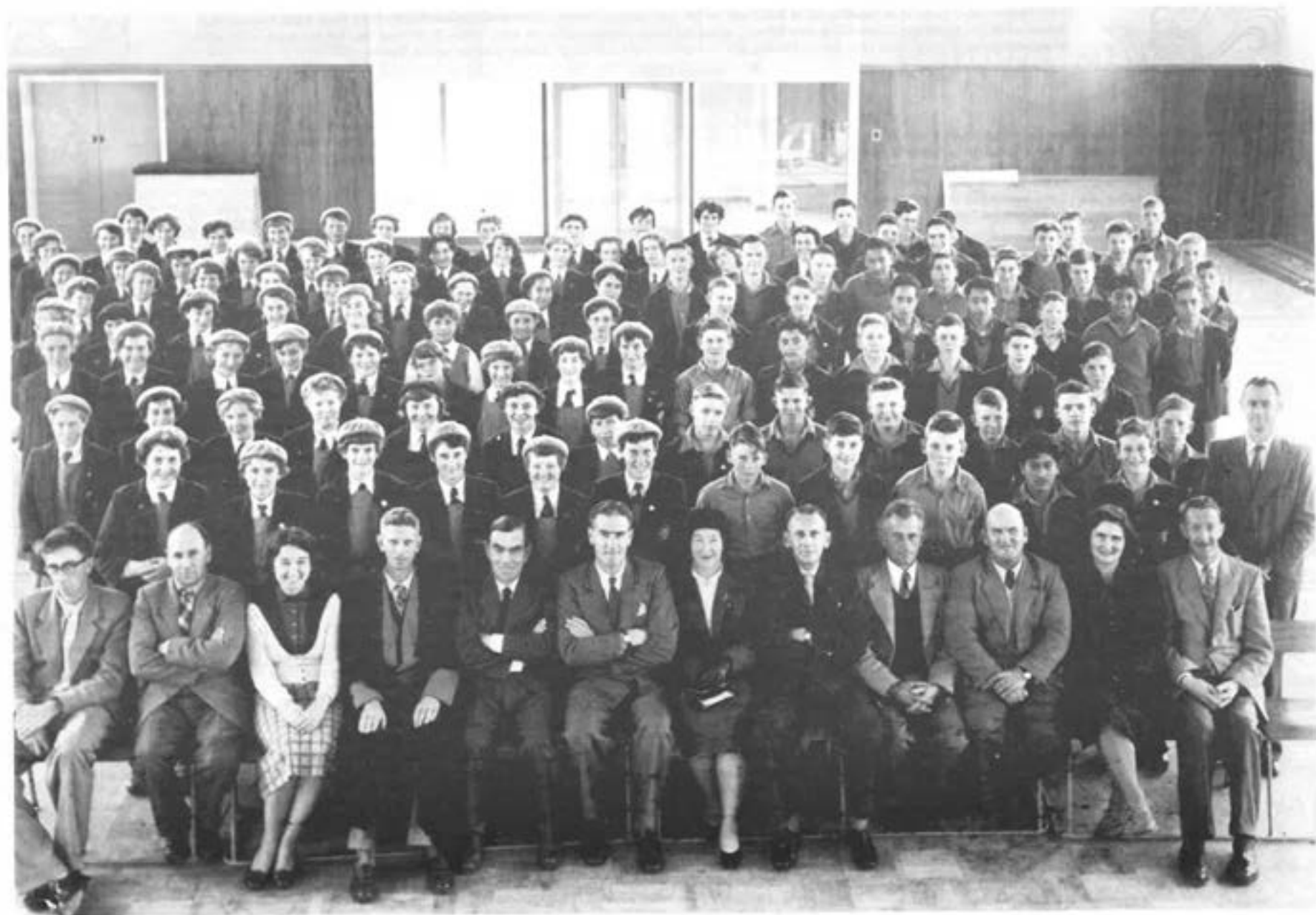

FOUNDATION PUPILS AND TEACHERS 1957







Each of our school magazines recording the events of the past year, forms a chapter in the history of Tokoroa High School. This year, our 25th Anniversary, gives us an opportunity to look back on the past and pay tribute to those whose combined efforts have made Tokoroa High School what it is today - a culturally diverse school, whose philosophy encompasses not only the skills of learning, but the much wider sphere of providing each individual with the confidence and strength to make our future society a better one to live in.



... the 121 foundation pupils and seven staff members moved to the new High School buildings .. ultra-modern in decoration, design and furnishing. The tuck shop opened for business .. on the first day only Coca-Cola was available for sale .. the second day saw a variety of sweets available, the most popular items being those that could be sold for a penny or twopence.

The 1957 Foundation pupils are now fifth and sixth formers. With our larger roll, the number of school clubs has increased; we now have a thriving Chess Club and Maori, Athletics and Badminton Clubs.

Perhaps the most important Prefects' Dance of the year was held on 27 April to farewell Mr and Mrs Anstice. Copies of the School Monogram and gold and green streamers were used to decorate the hall and these, with the bright orange coats of the orchestra, added to the gaiety of the evening.

Although the original staff and pupils in the school in 1957 have largely gone, they will always occupy a special position in the School's history.

In this age of the Sputnik, television and the Supermarket, first-rate education, open to every child, is not only desirable, but essential .. the first task must be to cut classes to a maximum of thirty



February 2nd was our first morning at High School. Assembly overawed us .. the first few weeks were utter chaos; in the first term alone we went through four Science teachers!

MUFTI DAY: Long pants, purple shirts, Ragged fringes, mini-skirts. Such a strange sight to see When seated all at assembly.

As well as being distinguished by the growth of 'hippiness', the various crises in Vietnam and Israel, and the economic situation, 1967 was .. the tenth birthday of THS. The opportunity was taken to look back. Things have indeed changed: now it is the girls who wear knee-length socks; it is the boys whose hair is deplored. We pupils gain more freedom; we have an active Student Council, a newspaper, and a Senior Common Room which is off-limits to staff.

I can ask the older generation to understand that youth and education need freedom and the young people to accept emancipation with common sense and not to abuse the privileges which come in increasing abundance in our changing society.

On a hot and dusty day, 19 October 1957, before a large gathering of parents and visitors, Sir David Henry, Managing Director and Chairman of NZFP at that time, officially opened Tokoroa High School. Classes had already commenced in February. The first two weeks of lessons were held at the Community Centre and Tokoroa East School, until the move into the new buildings - A, C; and D Blocks, which were still in the process of completion. These new buildings stood on open waste-ground, surrounded by builder's debris and pumice dust, which became mud after rain-fall. Over the next decade our school became not only established in appearance, but also an integral part of the Tokoroa community.

Since those early days much has changed, and perusing through our school magazines, it becomes an impossible task to outline all those events which have ultimately influenced the Tokoroa High School of today. However, these small excerpts can give us an idea of what it was like in "the good ol' days."

... the Prefect system was set aside .. discussions were carried out in a democratic manner, which is really another way to describe chaos .. Library Notes: .. we now have 10,000 books, a well-organised vertical file and an index for articles in periodicals .. of particular value for Liberal Studies subjects. Rugby: The 1970 First XV, because of its winning record, must rate as the best team to have represented the High School in its 12 years of Waikato Competition.



1971 - 73

1971:  
Staff Notes: ... Among the new faces in the staff room ... was the enigmatic Mr ... who arrived and departed within the space of a term. Australians do not seem to be very adaptable.

PTA Association: Possibly the most discussed future project at the present time is the swimming pool ... with money in hand and the government subsidy we are over half way.

1972:  
The computer club was started earlier in the year. One of the biggest lessons learned ... is that even the smallest error in grammar can be very serious, and a small error in logic can lead to the strongest results.

1973:  
Chairman's Report: ... the swimming pool has at last become a reality ...

1974 - 77

1974:  
A welcomed and much needed addition to the timetable this year has been a period of Social Education. Those students who thought "S.Ed" .. meant sex education were disappointed.

1975:  
The topics for this year's Senior Oratory Competition were controversial enough to cause an uproar among the audience ... Audience comments ranged from "scandalous" to "outstanding" to "thoroughly enjoyable".

1977:  
Girls' Soccer: ... we had to scrape up some girls who were willing to play their first match ... our team walked out onto the soccer pitch (half of us in sandals). We looked at the opposition. Gee, they looked so professional ... our team had that terrible negative feeling. But, with a little sweat and charming language, we drew nil all.

This year we introduced a new organisation for the whole school: the Vertical Structure. This is a way of decentralising a large school and making it a more "human" place.

1979:  
September 28th - our long awaited Reading Room was opened.

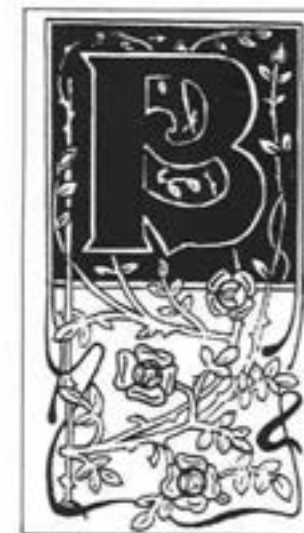

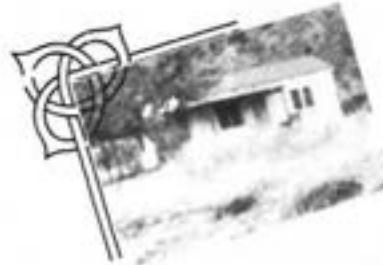

The evening we arrived at Ruatahuna, we visited Mataatua Marae first, before we ventured onto the other many landmarks of Tuhoe. In doing so, we were able to pay our respects, to the origins of Tuhoe and continue our journey in harmony.

We were called onto this Marae, the major marae of the tribe of Tuhoe, by the Kuita (Mrs Tahuri) in the traditional Maori way. During this Karanga, the wind and oncoming darkness added to the mysterious quality of the place. This Marae was unlike any other I'd ever visited. It stood majestically amongst the wilderness, reigning supreme over the land.

On entering the Whare of Mataatua, we were given a brief account, by Uncle John of the ancestors adorning the posts. I was enveloped with a sense of awe as I entered the Whare since the inside was just as majestic as the outside. It was very spacious and there was little wonder why it's renowned as the biggest Marae of the Mataatua canoe.

Pictures of those already gone before hung on the walls. Their legends provided for us famous faces, events and names. Engravings etched for us famous events and legends of Tuhoe; carvings portrayed the ancestors of Tuhoe in figurative curves; Korowai, in recognition of those rangatira already gone before, graced the walls; Koru designs, in the colours red, white and black added character to the Whare; tukutuku patterns displayed their intricate details on the walls; and relics of bygone days, such as the greenstone mere, were exhibited for our view.

Uncle John was very helpful in his informing us about this Marae. Through him we were able to absorb and appreciate the past, which constantly enveloped us while we were at this Marae.

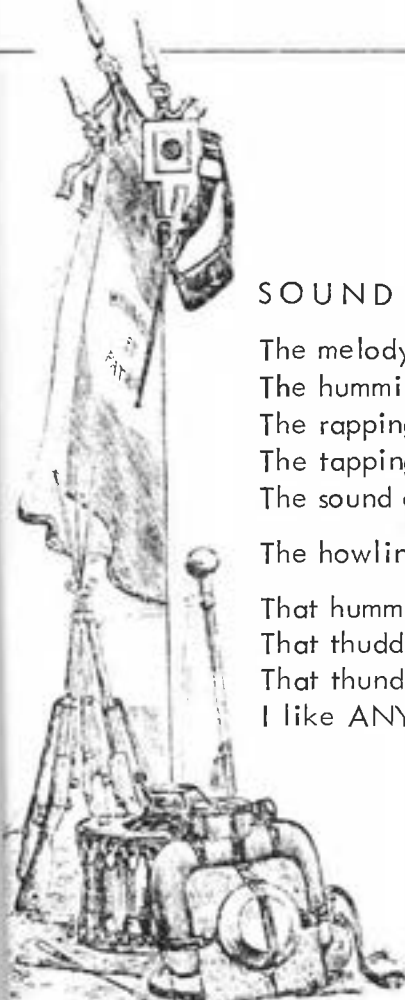

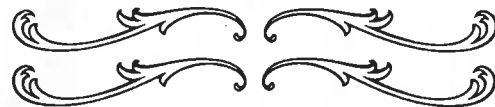
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
