As a Classroom Teacher, I am sure that I was on occasions guilty of expecting the Administration to perform miracles on my behalf.



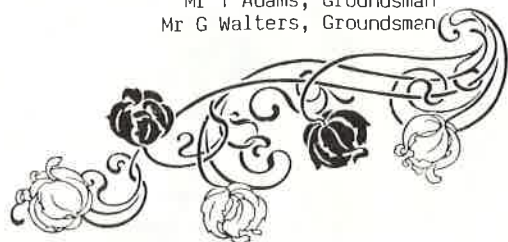
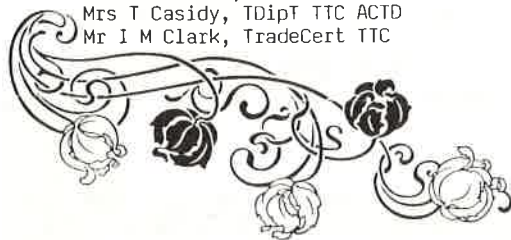

PRE-EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMME

The main purpose of the Tokoroa High School pre-employment programme is to assist young, unemployed school leavers in their efforts to find a job.

Schemes like this have had tremendous success in those areas where young people have been hard hit by unemployment. The programme offers two distinct areas of training:

- the "In-School Unit" - Two days a week for eighteen weeks - provides the student with training and experience in the "Life Skills" essential for job-seeking, and enables them to improve their social skills. This unit also gives the young people a base to work from and a chance to develop leisure-time activities and sports.
- The "Work Experience Unit" - Three days a week for eighteen weeks - offers the student a chance to work alongside people of their own choice and, in doing so, improve their job skills. The young people can choose the type of work they want and it enables them not only to appraise their employment chances realistically, but also gives them the opportunity to see how suitable their job choices are.



The two units complement one another and students are encouraged to participate fully in both. The programme has been successful so far with nineteen students already placed in full-time jobs. We hope to increase this number by the end of the year.

Ideally the programme should be seen by students as one more tool they can use to their advantage. Unemployment does not only affect young people of low academic achievement so the scheme can offer much to any school leaver.

Classes and groups of students may use the Centre from time to time for particular purposes - perhaps to learn something about the language and culture of one of the groups represented. But it will be a sacred place, a special place, a place that we treat with respect.

Later, Stage Two of the complex will be completed. This is the Dining Room and kitchen. The uses here are obvious and we hope that large and small groups of people can be hosted. Both buildings will be joined by a wooden deck which should be a very pleasant area on which to meet. An ablutions block, to be built near the corner of the complex, will complete the Centre. When it is completed, Tokoroa High School will have a facility that is second to none in the country.

Our thanks are due to so many people who have helped both to plan and to build. So many people have given so generously of their time and their talents. Thank you - we are deeply appreciative of your efforts one and all.

SCHOOL COUNCIL

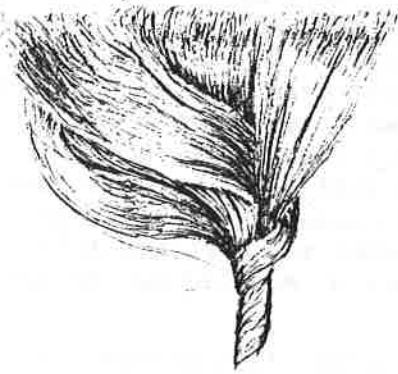

INSTRUMENTAL GROUP

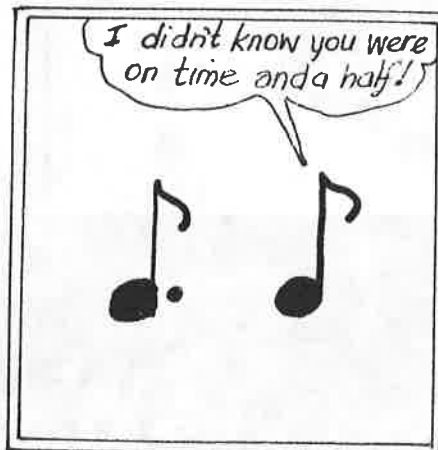

MATHEMATICS TEAM

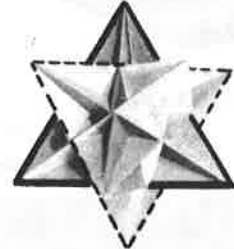

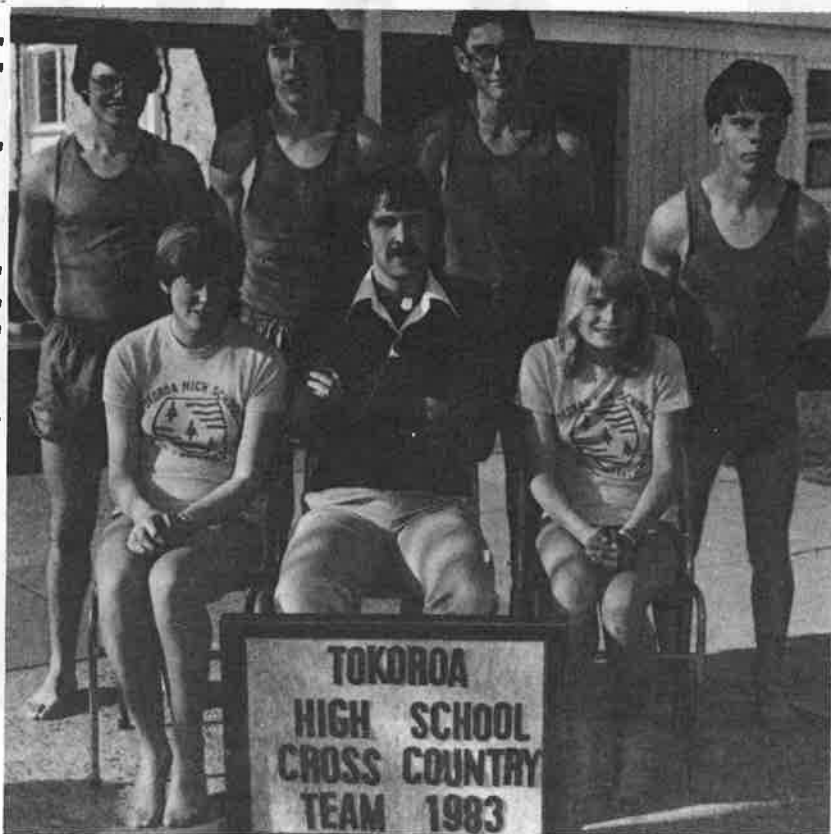

CYCLING

Like most other sports, cycling is physically demanding and requires a large amount of training. Most riders go out training four days a week and racing two days during the road season (in the winter months). During the summer, you have the choice of racing track and keeping up this high level of training or not racing and going out for rides only once or twice a week. This is to ensure that not all fitness is lost thus making it easier to begin training again during the road season.

There are different types of road racing and they are:

A Criterium (or Kermesse) is a race around and around a small block.

A Handicap race is one which people are set off at given intervals of time according to their ability to give everyone a fair chance.

Mass Start race is when everyone goes off together. A Stage Race or Tour is a number of races held over a period of time (such as the six day Dulux).

Individual Time Trial means people are set off one by one to battle the elements alone and race against the clock. The Teams Time Trial means the team of 4 or 5 people race against the clock.

In track racing there are: Sprints, Individual pursuits, teams pursuit, mass starts and handicap races the same as on the road.

For protection from the wind, skin tight clothing is worn but you also have to ride closely beside and behind other riders using them as a block, reducing the amount of wind hitting you, making your ride easier.

The School cycling team competed in the annual Bay of Plenty Secondary Schools Teams' Trial and were placed 6th.
