I am pleased to be able to contribute a Chairperson's Report for this magazine for 1984.

In July, the Board accepted with regret, the resignation of Mr Brian Blackwell as Chairperson, a resignation necessitated by his transfer to Whangarei. His administrative skills and patience, have contributed much to the Board's progress during the year.

These are difficult times for High Schools because, while decreased employment opportunities place a bigger responsibility on the schools to produce versatile students and the falling school rolls situation is threatening to reduce staff and narrow the curriculum. Added to this, a change of government mid-way through the year has slowed negotiations on important educational problems in which this Board was involved - for example the ramifications of falling rolls, changes in external examinations and changes in the core curriculum. Hopefully, positive progress will soon be made.

A bright spot has been the progress in the multicultural building complex. It will, I am sure, be an asset to the school both artistically and culturally.

On behalf of the Board I would like to express the hope that our school leavers have positive and rewarding experiences as they take their place in the outside community and I would like to wish Staff, parents and pupils a Happy Christmas.

THE DAY WE BURIED 6 O'CLOCK

The day New Zealand buried the six o'clock swill, was the day I first met Edna Peters. Whilst the men did the decent thing, Edna sat in the middle of our Bisonia-carpeted sitting room and filled my head with useful facts and fiction about living in Tokoroa. The transition from 'new chum' to seasoned veteran was the smoother thanks to Edna and other supportive friends.

She performed much the same service a few years later, when I first began working at Tokoroa High, showing me how the professional knowledge and experience I already had could be adapted to what was, for me, a new working situation.

In those days the Reading Programme (Withdrawal) was three part-timers operating in B1. Our present Resource Centre and the different programmes now operating at Tokoroa High grew out of those small beginnings - due in no small part to Edna's energies and innovative long-sightedness. She used both what and who she knew to get what Tokoroa High needed.

Edna came and went a number of times, and other gifted, energetic people carried on the work. But each time she returned she reminded us of one very important fact - that our school community is not static, that yesterday's problems are not exactly the same as today's and that tomorrow's will be different still, and that yesterday's solutions may be quite inadequate tomorrow.

We miss her as both friend and colleague.

GRAHAM PETERS 1959 - 1983

Graham left the staff, having completed 22 years of service to Tokoroa High School. He arrived a phys ed teacher just out of Teachers' College and left an experienced Head of Department.

As Graham grew in the phys ed department, the department grew around him, "Built in with the bricks" took on a new dimension in Graham's case.

He was one of a few teachers here who taught a complete generation. Children of the children he taught in his early days are now at High School.

If you talked to all of these people there would be countless stories of Graham's contributions to the life of Tokoroa High. Apart from the experiences in his phys ed classes, stories of the sports' teams he coached, including the 1968 NZ Secondary Schools' Basketball Champions, would emerge. Experiences gained from fourth form outdoor education camps, where the 4th formers en masse took to the woods, figure prominently in the memories of students and staff who attended them. As Senior Tutor of Fourth Form, the help and guidance he gave to the students is still remembered.

What students and staff appreciated particularly was the commitment Graham gave to the school. He was actively involved in developing the esprit de corps and the developing identity of the school as a community.

A central pillar of the Staff Room Committee, Graham initiated and organised many of the social activities of the staff, welding a motley crew into a cohesive whole. Some fine staff dinners were due to Graham's efforts. Who could ever forget the heroic soccer match played in the Peters' backyard when New Zealand born teachers, heavily outnumbered by the 'foreigners' on the staff just managed to uphold the honour of Godzone by scoring the winning ... try?? The zenith of his social life was when he became a gentleman teacher/farmer and entertained many of the staff around the estate pool on summer evenings. Many were the educational issues of import thrashed out and decided at that venue not to mention God, the Universe and Everything.

Tokoroa High School's loss is Birkdale Colleges gain and we wish Graham well in his new environment.

GUIDANCE

1984 has been a time of settling into a new job and learning new skills of administration, planning and teaching a careers' programme. It has not all been easy and I still prefer to deal with people in an interview situation than do much of the paperwork that comes across my desk.

I have found Guidance Counselling to be the most demanding and rewarding job I have had and a job with much variety. My work brings me into regular contact with students, parents, teachers, employers, ministers, social workers, Maori Affairs and Police. At times I feel very privileged when students talk honestly about themselves and their desire for help and change. Honesty is the first step towards the resolution of any problems.

Throughout this year I have become very impressed with the inner qualities of many of our students - students who are coping well in situations many would find unbearable - students who have overcome tragedy, and had to take on extra responsibilities. It has been a pleasure working amongst you all and I look forward to several more years of the same.

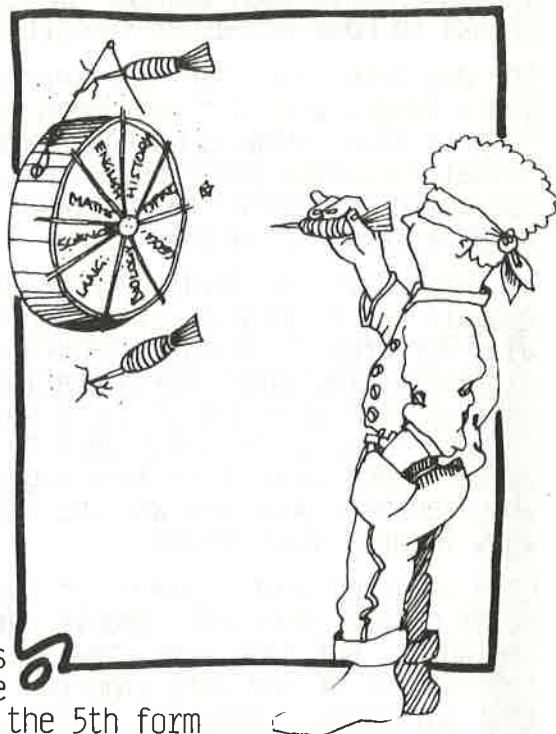

CAREERS

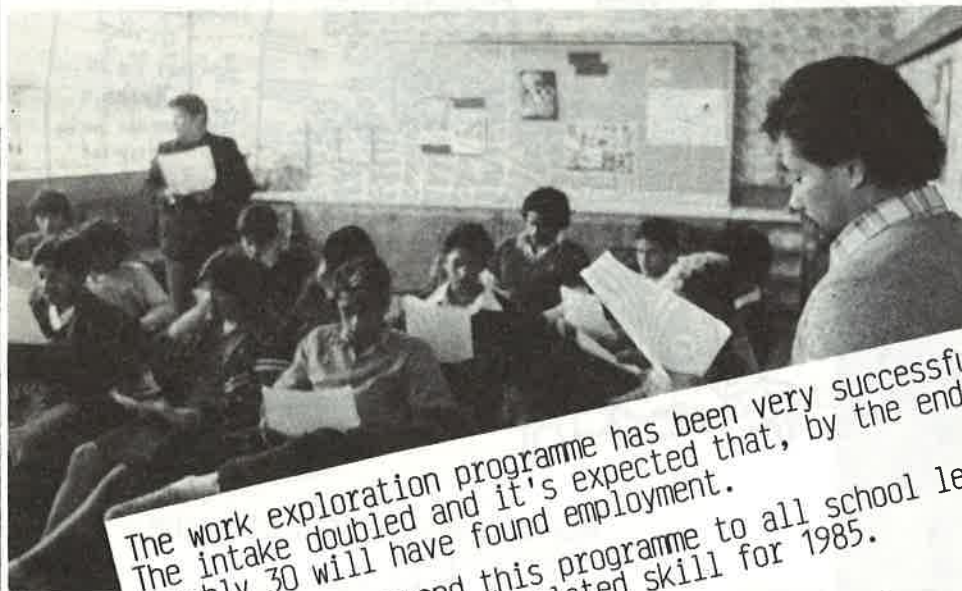
The careers' programme in the school, this year, has worked on two fronts; individual advice and guidance and class-room teaching and discussion as a unit of the 5th form social education course. Our main thrust has been to attempt to widen the thinking of students when they make career decisions. Gone are the days when a job was for life. Flexibility, adaptability and willingness to keep learning are the qualities our students need to take with them into the world of work.

We have tried to ensure, in our 4th form programme, that students make informed choices for their 5th form year and keep as many doors open to themselves as possible. Girls, in particular must follow courses such as maths, science and the technical areas traditionally avoided as courses leading to male dominated careers. Only by preparing themselves as fully as possible in as wide a range of subjects as possible can they hope to compete on an equal footing with their male counterparts for training and entry into the apprenticeships and professions open to them. Girls, indeed, can do anything, can grasp the opportunities open to them but only if they think ahead and take advantage of the equality of opportunity offered in school courses. It is encouraging to see the growing tendency for girls to aim, for a wider range of career choices. The movement has started; we hope that it accelerates rapidly. With parental encouragement backing the school programme, we are sure that it will.

POLYNESIAN PILOT SCHEME

Ka pū te nura
Ka hao te rangatahi

The old net is cast aside
while the new net goes afishing

The Polynesian Pilot Scheme was introduced for the first time to Tokoroa High School through the wisdom of Mr Burrridge who saw the necessity of offering opportunities of retaining a tentative framework for the study of Māori oral literature, also oral history and oral music where relevant.

Prose

Special thanks also go to the māmās and pāpā of each group for their support and most appreciated contributions to the various groups.

This scheme consists of three schemes, te Roopu Māori, te Roopu Kūi Airani me te Roopu Hāmoa. The most important reasons for the introduction of this scheme is to enable the members of each ethnic group to learn more about the customs, traditions, language and history of their individual cultures. It is more than just learning action songs and haka for the enjoyment of others or merely for entertainment.

The most important aspects taught are the waiata and the tauparapara. These are very sacred and valuable Ki te ao Māori (Maori World)

Also each group learn certain areas of the other cultures. For the success and continuation of this scheme the polynesian groups must take full advantage of what is being offered, so that the following generations have something to look forward to and hopefully retain the values within.

Once again thanks go to ngā māmā me ngā pāpā o ia rūpu o ia rūpu. They are indeed a valuable source of knowledge and strength to us all and their recognition of the disciplinary needs are adhered to by students.

Special thanks go to Koro's Pita and Haki Thompson, Mr Burridge, Mr Letoa; Kuia's Mrs Hamana, Mrs Barret, Mrs Grey and Mrs Tahuri, also to the NZ Maori Art and Crafts Institute of Rotorua and elders of the Te Arawa Tribe, for making the experience possible. Kia Ora Koutou.

The Ceremony

It was a fine afternoon and after the school had assembled, the manuhiri (visitors) were welcomed on by the women calling. Selected males, representing the many nationalities we have in our school, carried in the carvings. It was a pleasure to see Kerry Wilson, a past student of the school, and now a carver at the Institute, also delivering the carvings.

When in front of the meeting house, prayers were said in various languages and then the Maori hymn "Whakaaria Mai" was sung. After this, the carvings were carried to their final resting place and laid down.

Following this came speeches of welcome, praise and gratitude from the speakers of both manuhiri and tangata whenua (local people) and of course the waiata (chants) which support them.

By viewing the unique art and learning of the historical values of the Maori people, a greater aroha was created between the different ethnic groups of Tokoroa.

These carvings depict the history of all Maori Tribes of New Zealand but the most significant figure is that of Noa, who can be recognised by every ethnic group as something to identify themselves with. We all wait now for the Opening Day when we will see the carvings come to life.

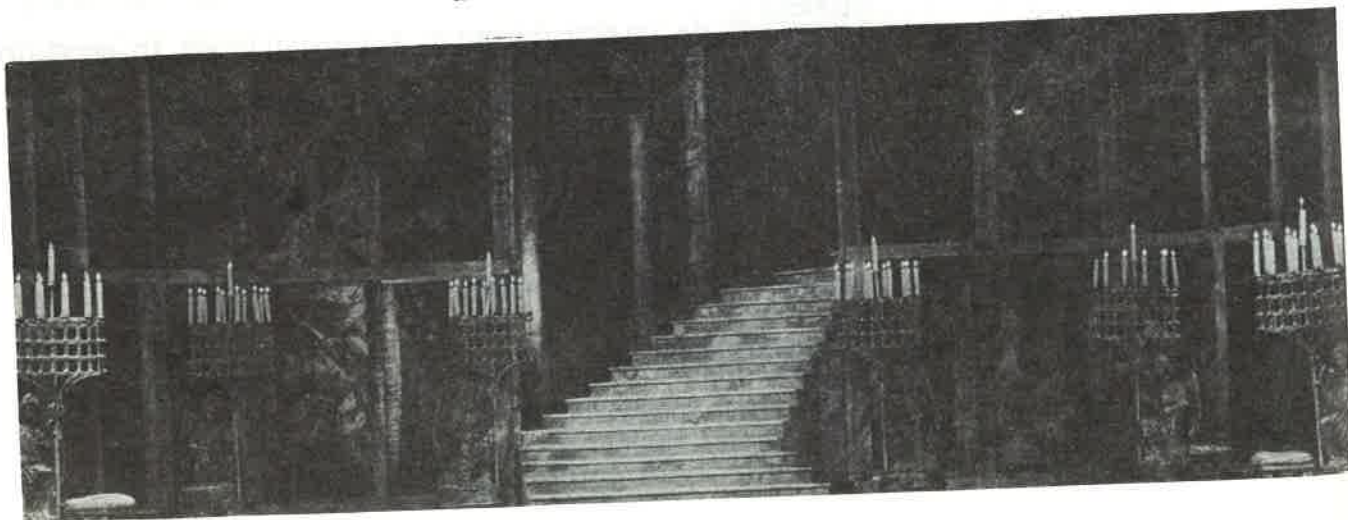

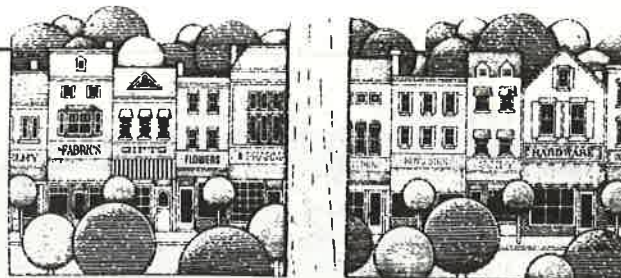

FORM 4 URBAN STUDIES TRIP



Each fourth form class travelled to Auckland during Term III for the Social Studies' Urban Studies Programme. Classes were accompanied by their Social Studies' teachers and by other interested teachers and parents. All were set for four days of hard work.

The classes were accommodated on urban Maraes throughout the Auckland area: Ko Kiri Ki Maungarei, Mount Wellington: Mataatua Marae, Mangere: Te Tira Hou Marae, Panmure: Te Unga Waka Marae, Newmarket: The Anglican Maori Centre, Epsom.

Fourth form students raised money from the school Workday and a Social Studies raffle to help defray the cost of the visits. The students were required to plan, shop for and cook their own meals on the Marae - a new experience for many.

Themes explored during the Auckland visits were:

- * Employment and Careers - visits were made to factories and military bases for talks with recruitment and personnel officers.
- * Inequality and Contrasting Lifestyles - visits to affluent and less affluent suburbs.
- * Urban Growth and Town Planning - viewing functional zones from the volcanic peaks.
- * Mapwork - identifying suburbs and physical features of the Auckland area.
- * Historical Case Studies - work on the ancient Pa sites around the city - contrasting older and newer suburbs.
- * Technology and Change - visits to a variety of Museums and Industrial plants, contrasting the "Big Smoke" with the "Little Smoke" (Tokoroa).
- * Transportation - surveys and traffic counts on the Motorway and NZ's busiest roundabout. Visits to Container Wharfs and Auckland International Airport.
- * Pollution and Recycling - tours of re-cycling plants and sewage treatment plants.
- * Urban Stress - visits to Central Police Station and the Auckland Courts.
- * Mass Media - visits to a Newspaper and to a Television station. Visit to the Auckland City Council Complex.

Each class travelled to and from Auckland and around the city by mini-bus. It proved to be a fascinating experience, particularly for those students who had never visited the city before.

Our thanks to staff and parents who helped provide our youngsters with these unique experiences. Our thanks also to the host Maraes.

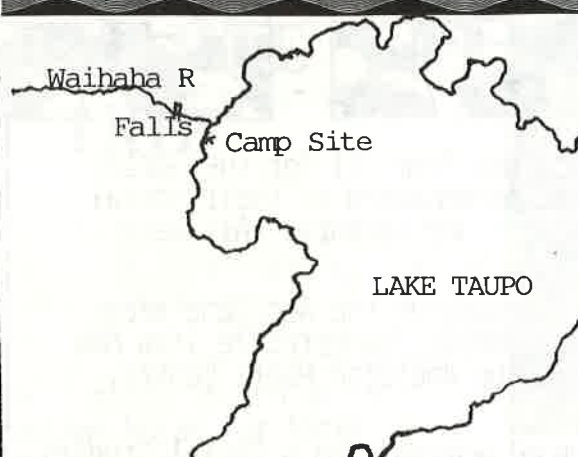

The Waihaha Marae site is situated on the Western Bay of Lake Taupo.

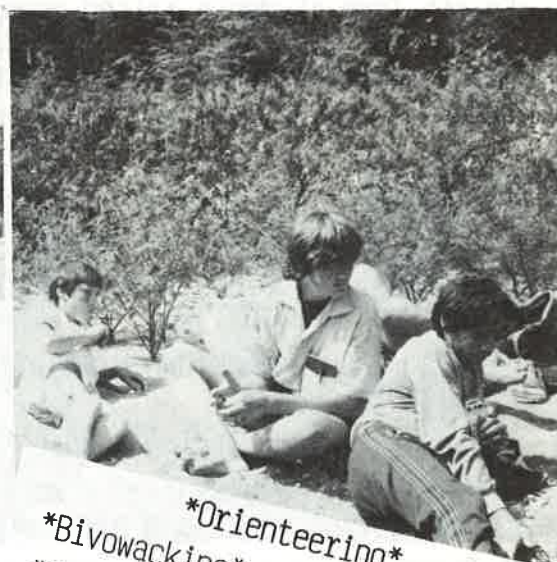

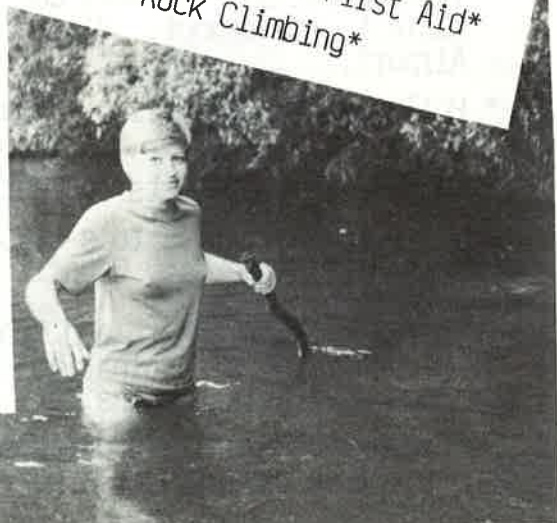


A Typical Day's Programme

- 11 pm Bed in the bivouacs!

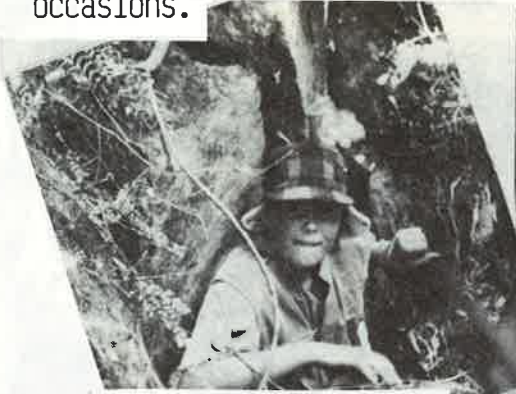

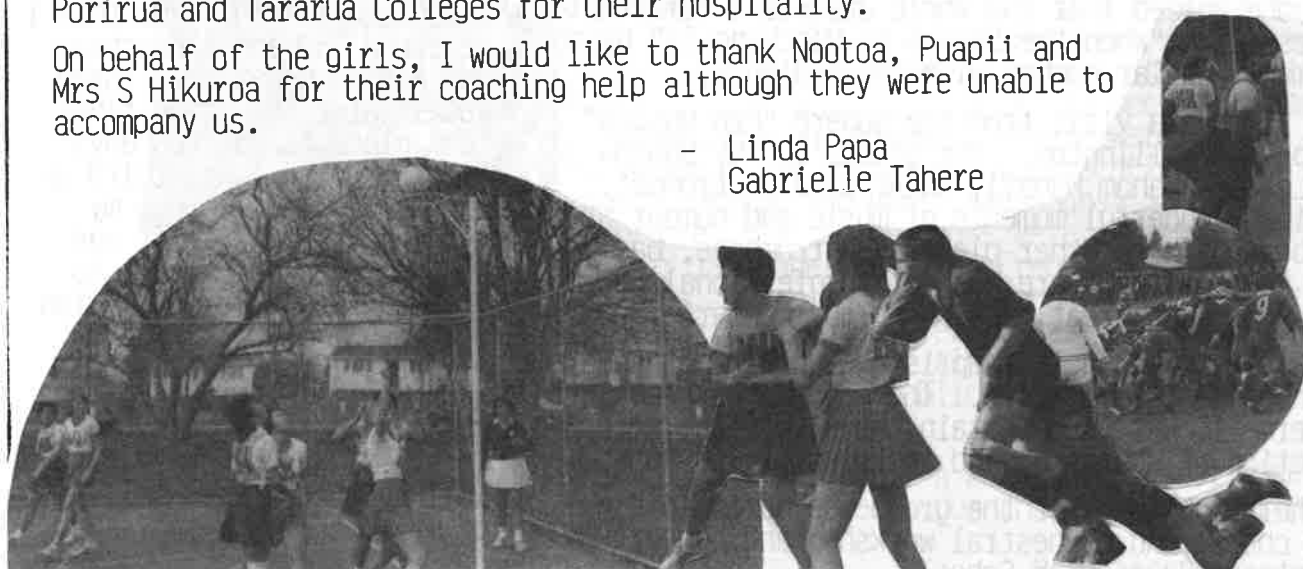

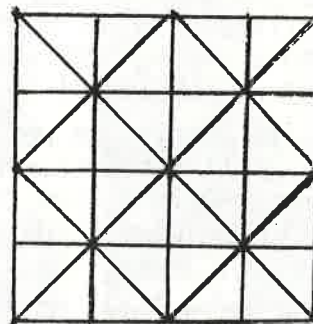
MATHEMATICS TEAM

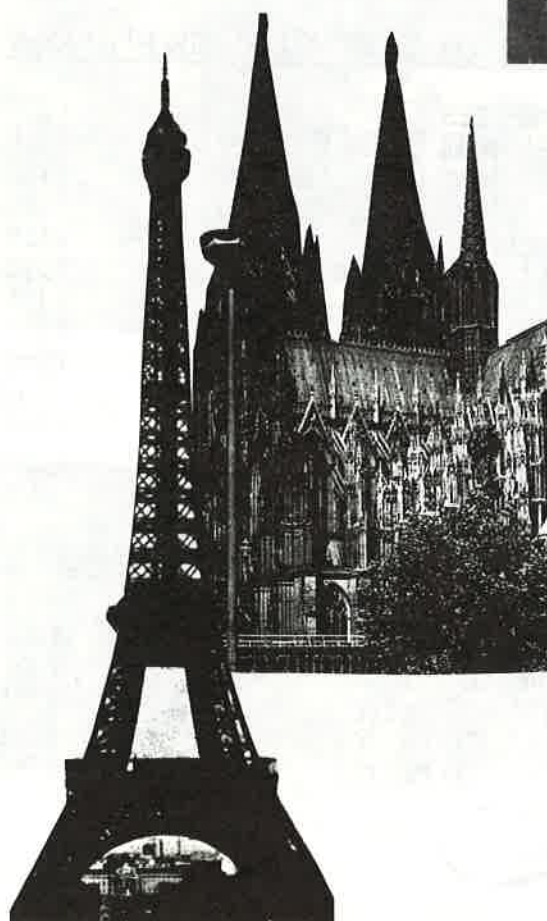
BRASS BAND

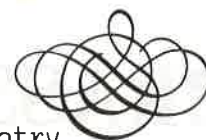
LANGUAGE CAMP

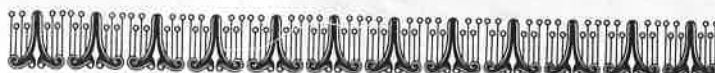

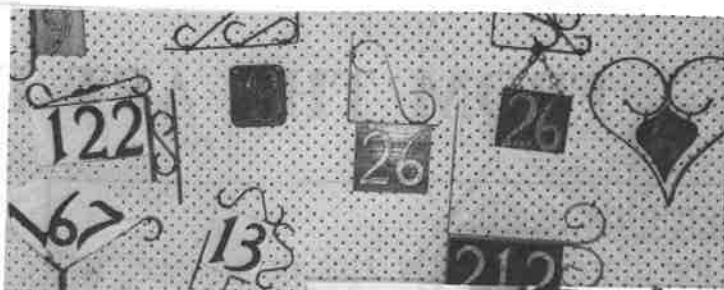

ETCHINGS

The plate is usually zinc or copper. It is prepared and cleaned with a file and wet and dry paper and then covered with a special wax coating (beeswax, resin and bitumin) and then the drawing is scratched into the wax, laying bare the metal. Then the plate is immersed into a weak solution of nitric acid, biting out the exposed metal lines and areas which are then filled with fresh oil-based ink, after the plate has been cleaned. Handmade paper, softened by dampening in near boiling water and passed through a high pressure roller-press is used for the print, pushing the paper into the ink laden grooves, thus depositing the ink onto the paper.
