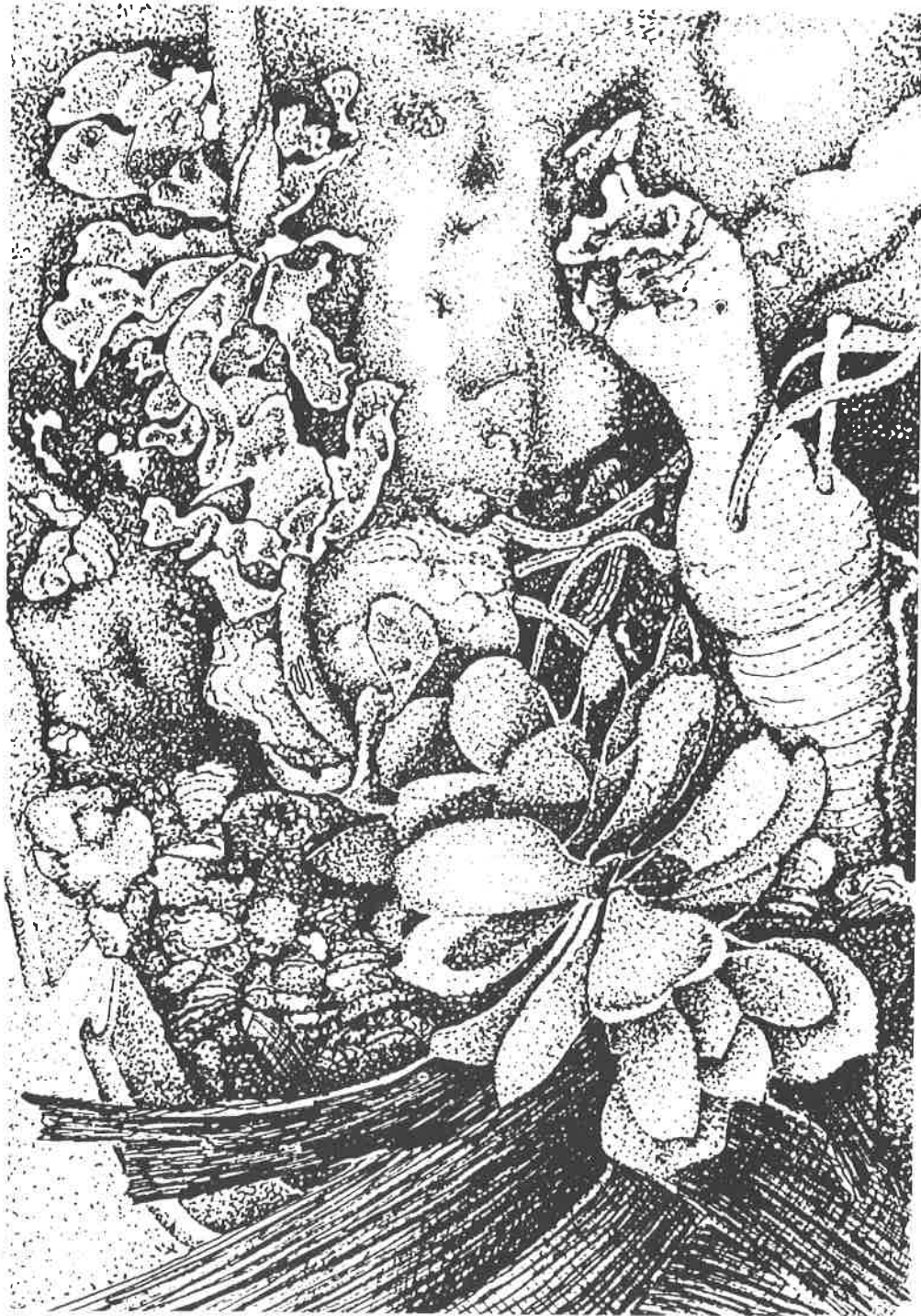

IN MEMORIAM

GEOFFREY JOHN BURRIDGE
Headmaster of Tokoroa High School
Died February 8, 1986

He was headmaster for a little over three years, beginning in September 1982. He brought unique qualities to a unique school. Dynamic, direct, with great insight he worked unstintingly towards goals to which he felt this school should aspire.

He had great empathy towards the concept of multiculturalism. His previous experience in schools within the Waikato, his work and fellowship within the Anglican Church, his membership of organisations within the communities in which he lived, his being a husband and father; all contributed towards the making of a headmaster whose character and personality were ideal for Tokoroa High School.

Thus it was that he came home to his tangi at Te Whanau a Noa on Monday afternoon, February 10. So staff, students, the elders of the community, the community at large, were able to show love and respect to Geoff Burridge in a unique way. Unique in the sense that many languages were heard on the marae Te Marae o Noa, in praise of a man of vision.

On Tuesday, February 11, a service was held on the marae by ministers representing the various denominations within the town. Then Geoff Burridge was carried from the marae, through silent lines of students, out of the school he had served so well; and tragically so briefly. To the Anglican Church St Francis where the Vicar, Rev. Adrienne Bruce, officiated. Staff Smith, an old family friend, read the eulogy.

Geoff Burridge was buried later that afternoon at the Tokoroa Cemetery, surrounded by those who loved him as a son, as a father, as a teacher, as a friend.

To Pene, Keay and Stephen goes our sympathy. We are all the better for having shared something precious in knowing Geoff Burridge.

Let us unite as one people.

SCHOOL WELCOMES PRINCIPAL



On April 17 we assembled in the grounds of Noa and took part in the powhiri to welcome Tokoroa High's fifth Principal, John Lambert. The Lambert family was honoured with speeches, waiatas and dance, provided by most cultures within our school and community.

In his speech Mr Lambert outlined some of his concerns for the future of Tokoroa High School.

"The four traditional Maori values; Aroha (love, concern, gratitude, family hospitality and selflessness), Manaakitanga (caring for others), Whanau (family), Whanaungatanga (kinship, sharing) were the values that the late Geoff Burrige placed above all other values within the Tokoroa High School family. These values will continue to be the basis for the school's philosophy with Aroha being the corner stone of the school's climate," said Mr Lambert.



OLD FACES . . . NEW PLACES

MR LAMBERT — PRINCIPAL

Since his arrival at Tokoroa High School as head of the Science Department in 1975, Mr John Lambert has, in succession, also held the positions of senior master, deputy principal and, since April of this year, principal. This career path of promotions within one school is unique in Tokoroa and rare in the secondary service.



For Mr Lambert, the decision to apply for the job of principal was not an easy one. After twelve years in Tokoroa, he and his wife and children were thinking of moving south to be closer to other members of the family. However, Mr Lambert did want to see work and ideas that had begun in the school completed, and a feeling of commitment to the pupils and staff and Tokoroa made the decision to stay and apply for

the job more clear cut.

As principal of our school, Mr Lambert enjoys being a part of helping people decide on goals, giving value to activities, and working hard to achieve results.

"Schools are involved in giving people opportunities across a wide range of experiences and activities," he says. "There are frustrations involved too; the biggest of these is dealing with teenagers who do not appreciate what their parents want for them. The waste of so much energy and talent is unacceptable. Schools must find ways of directing and developing the talents of these young people."

Mr Lambert wants to promote the general development process within the school. This involves analysing how well we are working as individuals and as a school. By looking carefully at what we do and how we work, we can improve and grow.

MRS GRAHAM — SENIOR MISTRESS

In the years she has spent at Tokoroa High School, Mrs Graham has been through many areas of teaching within the school; part-time teacher, assistant teacher, head of the Music Department, senior woman and now senior mistress.



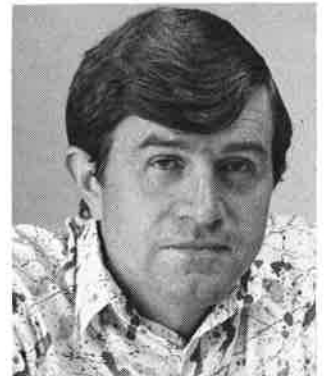
In this new role, Mrs Graham wants to foster pupils' individuality, particularly for the young women of the school. Part of being senior mistress involves disciplining pupils and in doing this Mrs Graham works for long term solutions, making pupils realise that they have responsibility for their own behaviour.

Part of Mrs Graham's philosophy for the school involves attempting to help individuals develop to their full potential. She would like the school to instil in students a sense of self-esteem and desire to continue learning.

In Mrs Graham's words: "Remember that education is preparation for life and not just preparation for a job. We live in a world today, which increasingly believes in things that you can see and touch. However, the lasting things and the most important things, are those that you cannot see or touch. The things that really matter in the long run are; humour, courage, loyalty, reliability and integrity. If you have these things then you are truly rich."

MR SOMMERVILLE — DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

In 1985 Mr Sommerville first came to Tokoroa High School as Senior Master. The appeal of our school for Mr Sommerville lies in its focus on the individual and the opportunities to learn it gives both pupils and teachers.



Now Mr Sommerville is deputy principal, he describes his position as challenging and full of variety. Mr Sommerville sees his role as one of creating opportunities for people and offering clear direction to them. Talking and listening are important parts of his job.

Mr Sommerville still enjoys work in the classroom, teaching geography. It offers a complete change from the daily administrative tasks.

Mr Sommerville says: "Opportunities abound in Tokoroa High School for teachers and students. Sometimes it is difficult to recognise these opportunities but working each day, at being better at each thing we do, they soon emerge."

EDUCATION FOR THE FUTURE

Opportunities for individuals and groups to experience a well-balanced and well rounded programme of education is a key part of school philosophy today.

Tokoroa High School welcomes the flexibility made possible, especially at Sixth Form level, by the changes in classroom based subjects. Sixth Form Certificate — the only qualification now at sixth form level — is providing students and teachers with the chance to work in a new way. In all subjects practical work now counts directly in a student's achievements instead of, as in the past, being forced into the background by the pressure of external examinations. The standards demanded by classroom based tests, assignments and internal examinations, however, are not lowered but raised by the increased emphasis on these important skills. By allowing practical skills to take their place alongside the more traditional academic skills we allow our students to broaden their range of skills and knowledge and develop, more fully, their true potential.

All of our courses, from third form onwards, play their part in the transition from school to work and living in the adult world. Cultural Studies for example, enables our students to understand and relate to the different ethnic groups that make New Zealand a multi-racial society; Mathematics gives them the numeracy skills needed to deal with their day-to-day budgeting and finances; English enables them to communicate and function in a literate adult world. In short school helps to provide students with the skills and understanding needed in New Zealand society.

With the more flexible structure made possible by Sixth Form Certificate, as the only award at Sixth Form level, we can develop programmes to fit the needs of our students as in "Transition".

Sixth Form Transition fits in with and extends the existing steps (transition) from school to life and work in the world beyond school. The courses aim at developing student abilities in areas previously ignored or not formally recognised. Speaking skills needed in the work place and the chance to sort out personal objectives are two parts of this course.

We see this extension of Sixth Form as a beginning and mean to continue to augment and shape our curriculum to more closely fit the needs of the individual student.

Two Transition courses provide opportunities for students who want full-time programmes that concentrate on working experiences. The South Waikato Forest Skills course will develop practical skills and provide a complete alternative to normal school. The other full-time Transition course provides three days work each week as a basis for understanding how full-time employment works.



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HOUSING CORPORATION AWARDS

Tokoroa High School's success in the Housing Corporation Competition is a tribute to our school's dedication and commitment believes Minister of Housing, Mr Phil Goff.

Speaking to a large crowd of teachers, parents and students in Te Whanau a Noa on June 20, Mr Goff said he was impressed by the work produced by the pupils.

Eleven schools from Waikato, King Country and Thames Valley entered the design section which involved designing a cluster of three units on one site. Three schools entered videos and thirteen submitted posters.

A group of Tokoroa High School's sixth form pupils "scooped the pool". "It is such an achievement for one school 'to take the lot' so to speak," Mr Goff said.

The winning design was entered by Heng Kuoch, a Kampuchean born student, who arrived in New Zealand six years ago. Class-mate Colin McCormick won the poster competition and a group of seven sixth form students prepared and directed the successful video commercial.

It took Heng more than fifty hours to produce the winning entry — a two-bedroom unit; a unit for disabled people; a two storey three-bedroom unit.

The corporation plans to build one of the units in Tokoroa and some of our technical drawing students will be involved in negotiating with the builders to help to oversee the construction.

"How can we, the Housing Corporation, help you?"

Was Colin McCormick's winning slogan. A keen artist, Colin spent four weeks designing the poster. Entry in the competition was compulsory for his sixth form English class. The work was assessed as part of the students' overall sixth form certificate grades.

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CYCLING

The cycling season began well, with 17 enthusiastic peddle pushers attempting the gruelling Round Taupo 100 mile event. Most riders finished the course with the team raising over \$300 in sponsorship. The funds were used to buy new tricycles for the IHC school.

We entered three teams in the annual Bay of Plenty 16 kilometre time trial in June. Our boys' team placed well while the two girls' teams had no real opposition — although the race organisers were thrilled to see them compete.

The highlight of the cycling year came with the thrilling Tokoroa versus Tauhara Triathlon in July. Our experienced club cyclists, Andre Weiss and Peter Geers, put two of our teams decisively ahead of the opposition over the 10 kilometre course around Lake Moana-Nui.

Tokoroa High made a clean sweep in three out of four divisions, with four Tokoroa girls' teams taking part in the canoe-cycle-run event, and competing creditably.

Several cyclists also competed in the Waikato Interschools' Triathlon in September.

Thursday night twilight racing is currently underway thanks to Forestland Wheelers Cycling Club, and our cyclists are using these time trials to assist them develop stamina for the 1986 Round Taupo Cyclethon on November 20th.

The canoeing highlight of the year was the Tokoroa vs Tauhara triathlon at Lake Moana-Nui in August. Our club paddlers quickly left the main field far behind, setting up the Tokoroa cyclists and runners for a clean sweep in all but one of the four sections. Duncan Ropiha recorded the fastest time of 8 minutes 46 seconds for the 1.4 kilometre course.
