It was the last day of February for 1987. The time 3.30 am. While I was sound asleep in my warm bed, two fourteen year old girls were lighting a fire in the cooking room of Tokoroa High School's 'C' Block. Just over eight hours earlier a fire had been doused by the Tokoroa Fire Service in Room 5 of C Block.

Totally ignorant of the fact, I went about my Saturday morning routine, until I heard a bulletin on the radio. I only heard a bit of the bulletin and wasn't sure if I had heard correctly. Later on that morning one of my friends rung me up to give me the details. She told me that 'C' Block had been totally destroyed by fire. It was hard to believe, but she had seen it, so it must have been true.

I resisted the urge to rush down to the school to have a look, but at two o'clock I could resist it no longer. I quickly walked to the school and as I approached 'C' Block, or what was left of it, I slowed my pace, trying to take in the magnitude of the scene before me. It was horrific, the stench was so strong it almost knocked me out. Charred remains of classrooms shadowed the teachers who were trying to clean up. I walked around 'C' Block in silence, surveying the damage. I was horrified that anyone would want to do such a thing. I thought of all the things that were wasted needlessly. What a list! Books, maps, desks, chairs, it could go on forever.

On Monday morning, the school was buzzing with rumours about when and how it was started. Our Principal, Mr Lambert, put most of these rumours to rest with his speech at the school assembly that morning. He became emotional when remembering the destruction that had occurred.

My tutor room and geography room had been flattened by the demolition crew that had been employed to clean up, so my class was relocated to the Senior Common Room. Hundreds of other students also had to be relocated. The school used any spare space that was available to cope with the problem.

I don't believe what the arsonists did was right, but it shows that it takes a disaster before any progress is made. For example, the resources of the various departments were old and insufficient to cope with the demands of the classes and yet now there are stacks of new, upto-date text books available. When all things are weighed up, this disaster could turn into a blessing in disguise.

Tokoroa High School entered eighteen projects, the work of twenty-seven enthusiastic students.


A 6th Former, Craig Malins, won the Senior experimental section with his entry on 'Arrow Velocity' which was inspired by his weekend involvement in archery.

This year we have covered the following skills: releasing planting, pruning (2m, 4m, 6m), region, spraying, burn off. The crew this year is excellent. The crew's attitude is very impressive and really makes every skill worth doing.

The first day we worked in the bush I thought I wasn't able to finish this year, but that's the best thing about this scheme — "can ya hack?". The job I liked the best was the burn-off, because after all that smoke that hits your eyes, and after all that sweating, choking, coughing, you get a massive feed out at Kinleith. "Choice". The job I hated the most would be releasing, because it's boring. You have to walk a long way to get to where you are supposed to go and the scrub is pretty wicked. The tool you're mainly using is a slasher. The hills you have to go up aren't funny. But my general comment would be that this scheme is pretty "choice", and the crew is pretty excellent.


A lot of teachers were dancing as well. Some teachers danced very well, and some of them looked funny.





The large audience of about 400 students responded enthusiastically to this programme of "weird music", "mellow", "different" and "beaut" — and most agreed that it was a really good concert.


BRASS BAND



This year Tokoroa High School was lucky enough to




have the group stay for a week during the second term. During this time 4th and 6th Formers were given the chance to take part in the workshops and in the final performances.

CYCLING CLUB

Around Taupo Cyclethon

The annual Around Taupo Cyclethon is billed as the biggest one day cycling event in the Southern Hemisphere. Among the 800 starters in the November 1986 event were 36 cyclists from Tokoroa High School. Their aim was to complete the gruelling 100 mile event and to raise funds for the junior IHC school at Cargill.

The cyclethon began at 8.00 am on Taupo's main street. The weather was cold and calm with winds increasing through the day. All our cyclists had passed the 50 mile half way point at Kuratau by 1.00 pm despite some punctures, cramp and mechanical failures.

Into the steep hills between Kuratau and Turangi, several cycles suffered terminal gear failure which meant a long walk to the next transport station for the riders. By 3.30 pm, 32 riders had crossed the Tongariro River Bridge and were cycling the long undulating straights back to Taupo township. Two riders were forced to retire with cramp on the formidable Earthquake Gully hill climb with just an hour's cycling remaining to the finish.

By 7.00 pm, thirty cyclists were finally back in Taupo township reliving their gargantuan struggles with the hills and resting their weary limbs in the local hot pools. For the technically minded, the course climbed 300 metres about lake level in the first 16 kilometres. Cyclists finishing the course climbed and descended a total 1,600 metres. And, in accordance with tradition (since 1973), one cyclist in five withdrew from the event.

Our fastest cyclist recorded 6 hours 40 minutes, our slowest 10 hours 55 minutes. Our finishers included three female cyclists and the team raised over six hundred dollars for the Junior IHC.

Completing such an arduous course is an achievement of which any cyclist can be justifiably proud. A very big thank you to the many parents who provided transport and trailers and who assisted and encouraged the students out on the course.

Joined by Gavin Mantogomery and Michael Bailey the team fought their way through to the finals in the junior canoe polo tournament held at the A.C. Baths.



The trip was financially possible because of the hard work that was put into fundraising: A sausage sizzle at athletics day, a school social and the fashion show.


