#### From the Principal's Desk


Academic achievement, particularly in NCEA is the corner stone of every New Zealand secondary school. So it is with pleasure that we are able to reflect back over the past 14 years and note the progress that has been made at Tokoroa High School in that time. In 2004, NCEA results when averaged across levels one, two and three, was at 38%. In 2009 these figures rose to 59%. It is heartening to note that since 2014, NCEA results have risen considerably and now remain close to the 90% mark. Average NCEA figures across these three levels were 92% in 2016 and 88% in 2017 and these figures are above the national averages for all New Zealand schools. To further advance academic achievement this year, we witnessed success with the introduction of a pilot study at year 13 level. The target group were 14 male students who were not expected to gain university entrance literacy, let alone the full university entrance qualification. The sport science and business university entrance pathways course saw 10 of the boys gain their university entrance literacy through science. 13 boys gained a business studies university entrance domain and seven boys gained a third domain in physical education which enabled them to achieve the full university entrance qualification. The course will be expanded in 2019 to comprise more students and will include the trades area. The mission statement of Tokoroa High School is the "best and highest qualification for all" and university entrance is the highest qualification that can be obtained at secondary school.

The 2018 Tokoroa Christmas Parade was highlighted by the presence of our very own, Joseph Manu and Zane Tetevano, who stole the show by show-casing the 2018 NRL grand final trophy that they had won as members of the Sydney Roosters team. As former students at Tokoroa High School, both had been in the professional sports pathways course which sits as part of the Careers and GATE (gifted and talented) programmes. For Joseph Manu, 2018 was a stellar year as he represented New Zealand in test matches against Australia and England and received a further honour when he was named in the World XIII team. Joseph was the only New Zealander to be selected.





On the morning of Tuesday 25 September, the new school gymnasium was officially opened. Our grateful thanks to the efforts of project manager Himi Whitewood, executive officer Piki Kelly, ministry of education property personnel Gary Anaru, Sharon Walker, David Vincent and the appropriately named Construct Ltd crew led by Graeme Hawthorne, Dave Chibnall and Nick Hoebergen for completing the project. Our thanks also to One Foundation NZ for their sponsorship of equipment.



The celebration of the gym opening continued with the 50th re-union of the Tokoroa High School 1968 Basketball team who returned to the school on Friday 28 September. It was on that date 50 years earlier that the team won the New Zealand Secondary School Basketball championship. Re-union organiser Kevin Storer noted in his appreciation to the school, "On behalf of the coach, team, WAGs and family we would like to pass on our respect and love for the warm welcome that you embraced us all with and making us feel at home. You turned a great get together into a special and emotional moment for us all, which we will hold close in our hearts and cherish for our remaining years. We all came away with a sense of pride of not just our years at the school but to be able to observe first-hand the respectful and

kind nature of you all, it took us all back to our Tok town days of old. Once again many thanks and keep up the good work, so proud".





One of the great strengths of Tokoroa High School is the diversity amongst the staff. 

Congratulations to Sail Young for being the top academic student for Year 11 and to Atinei Fuimaono for taking out the Fortitudo Award for 2018.


Our best wishes goes to Robyn Tucker for her services to her tutor students over many years. We hope that she enjoys a well-deserved change and not having to come to school on weekdays.




#### TE MANAVA PASIFIKA







#### ENGLISH

Importantly, issues such as the dangers of totalitarian governments, modern day racism. human trafficking, and police brutality have been discussed and analysed. I have always been a firm believer in putting an emphasis on real-world, contextual learning, and each of the texts we studied provide commentary for the world our students are currently living in. So much learning takes place through our 'off topic' conversations, but this is what life-long learning is about.

I have enjoyed teaching across Level 2 and 3 English this year, and there have been a lot of fun times. Significantly, there have been so many chances to build relationships and learning opportunities. I look forward to building on these foundations with my senior classes in 2019.

#### HISTORY

It has been a great pleasure to teach such an enthusiastic bunch of students this year, alongside Miss Chesterman, who has done a fantastic job with our Level 1 and 2 students.

The students got to learn about a wide range of topics that were important in the past, and are still making an impact on their lives today. Importantly, several significant New Zealand topics were analysed as well. Our major topics studied this year across all three levels included the Holocaust, Parihaka, the NZ Wars, the Cambodian Genocide, the Easter Rising, the Black Civil Rights Movement, NZs involvement in Vietnam, the Rwandan Genocide, the Women's Suffrage movement, the establishment of the Maori Women's welfare league, the 1981 Springbok Tour, and the Bastion Point protests.

The highlight of the year was the approval of a trip to Cambodia in December 2019. Planning and fundraising is well underway for this, as we are taking a group of 20 current and past students. At Level 3, our students study the Cambodian Genocide and the effects of this on South East Asia and New Zealand. We are extremely excited for this opportunity to study first-hand the effects of the Genocide, as well as other important issues such as human trafficking and wildlife exploitation in South East Asia. We look forward to the support of our wider community as we continue our fundraising endeavours



























#### Technology

2018 was another successful year in the technology department, with very good practical and academic results. Our school has well equipped facilities to offer Building Construction, Mechanical engineering, Hospitality, Catering and Café operations. We have motivated, well qualified and highly experienced staff in the department.

Junior Diploma. The year nine student all have the opportunity to try their hand at the various career pathways offered in the technology department by completing a six week taster course in each department. They can then choose three different pathways to follow during year ten. The year ten options follow a thirteen week cycle and is an excellent opportunity for the students to determine which career pathway or pathways they want to follow in the senior school.

Building Construction. The students completed a pre-trade training course in Building construction with Mr Hamman. Our facilities are fully equipped and certified by BCITO to deliver the BCATS certificate. This is a Building industry ITO pre-trade training course that is accepted by sixteen different construction trades. The aim of the course is to prepare students to enter any construction related trade. This is an excellent career pathway because there is a huge demand in our country for qualified builders and building-related skills. The students completed at least four projects each, including cabinets and garden furniture as well as several projects completed for Tokoroa High School.

Mechanical Engineering. We did not offer this course this year. We follow the Tools 4 Work curriculum, which is an engineering ITO course. Our workshop is fully equipped with lathes, milling machines, welding machines and sheet-metalworking equipment and is certified by Tools4work. We offered a multi-materials course including sheet metal, machining and welding components. There are many employment opportunities within our town and indeed the whole world for qualified engineering personnel.

Hospitality. Ms Lotter follows the Hospitality ITO curriculum. We have a fully equipped and certified commercial kitchen. The students were involved in many public functions where they cater for large numbers. The students also gained valuable experience in preparing food and various Café operations by working in, and running, the Tok Kai Café.

Digital technology (ICT). Ms Miller once again did a sterling job overseeing the digital technology department. Computer literacy is a vital skill in today's workplace and with the help of Mr Chandra the junior students developed their computer literacy skills. Aided by Ms Crate and Ms Kelly, the senior students learnt how to use the full suite of Microsoft Office products, such as Word and Excel. The seniors also developed their skills in photography and Adobe products such as Photoshop and Illustrator.























#### NGA MANU KORERO

Nga Manu Korero is special because it gives Rangatahi like myself, a platform to convey their message, to speak on behalf of those who cannot speak for themselves. It gives us an opportunity to further immerse ourselves in the Maori culture and bring it back to life. Nga Manu Korero is for sure an unforgettable experience and it would not have become a reality if weren't for all the people who helped me get to the national stage, and for that I am grateful to all those who came along and helped me on this Journey.


















#### COOK ISLANDS LANGUAGE WEEK 2018

This year, we were so fortunate to have the support of Creative Arts New Zealand, to enable us to run two workshops on Cook Islands Arts and Crafts.

On Monday, our first workshop was led by Miss Tarai, who taught us how to make a floral crown, or otherwise known as an 'ei katu'. All you need is some flowers(that you can buy at the \$2 shop or Hui Huang), some electrical tape, and some parcel wrap which forms the base that you tape your flowers to.

We were able to make over 50 ei katu's that us students got to take home. Miss Tarai said "when you wear your ei katu, it allows you to feel beautiful, to be proud of what you have created". We all love our ei's and for the whole week we were wearing them to school, to the market, to the social, you can wear your ei katu anywhere.

Ei katu's are a way of celebrating your culture, the Cook Islands culture and our community. Aroa atu I to ei katu, Love your ei katu"





On Tuesday, we had local artist Moana Mitchell-Peraua (Tahayna, Karma-Ray, Arona and Luka's mum) who was commissioned by the school to carve two boards for us. The boards would allow us to screen print our own pareu's and patterns on to our garments. Rev Timote Turu was also their to bless our boards, ready for us to use.

The first board has a Cook Islands feeling with the flowers of the pacific. The second board has the school emblem as the centre and Samoan patterns to also capture the pacific flavour of our school.

In screen printing, you can print an old t-shirt and make it brand new, or you can print sheets, pillows, or any material to make yourself either a dress or a shirt. Puna Vai Ora hope to use the boards in the future, especially in passing on both the skill and art of screen printing.

It takes a lot of time, and you need to be passionate about this work, because you cant afford to make any mistakes. "Aroa atu i to tatou peu, Love your craft".

On Wednesday, we had a whole school assembly where we were able to award the best dressed, the best dancers, and just a time where we celebrate Cook Islands Language Week. You can't have a celebration without some singing and dancing.




#### Year 13 Future Pathways Camp

It has been a busy time since I began with over 360 individual counselling appointments to date. It is a privilege to be able to hear young people's stories and for them to be able to come and talk with someone they trust to maintain confidentiality.

I am also enjoying running the Traveller's Programme with Ms Mellisa Chesterman and a group of year 9 students. I look forward to continuing this great programme in 2019 and developing other ideas to support our young people.

#### OPEN DAY





STARS helped me with that.

We're extremely fortunate, because our co-ordinators, backed by our principal, give us the freedom to implement the programme, as we see fit, based on what we believe, are the needs of our Year 9s. When you have a team of 50 mentors that you're responsible for, as well as 130 Year 9 students, that task is quite daunting, and of course, I was expected to use my voice. Was it easy? of course not. But I learnt that my words, backed by my actions, and an awesome team, could achieve so much. Harold S Green stated, "Leadership is practiced not so much in words, as in attitude and in actions". When I was a Year 9 student, I spoke only when I needed to. Through STARS, I realized, that I could speak whenever I wanted to. 


















## PULARECOUNT

Ti 5 ti 5 ti ti ta 1 am a performer who loves showing my Cook island culture with pe'e, imene ,ura and many other island dances. No matter where I am I always love to express my Cook Island culture. Recently our Polynesian group called Tokoroa High School Puna Vai Ora performed at Pacific by Nature in Hamilton where we were able to show case who we were being pacific, not only the Cook Island culture, but all pacific cultures were honoured on that day.



This is vital for not only us being Cook islanders but also all pacific islanders to hold on to whom they are, to know their roots and where they came from. A person with no culture is a person with no identity. A person with no identity is just a person.

WHO IS ME? I am a Cook Islander.

The theme for Youth week is "Be who you want to be". Sometimes it is hard to be who others want us to be, or for us to decide who we want to be. When do we know our sexuality? When do we know what sports is our favourite? When do we know who we truly are? We are competing and still finding out who we are, we have a long way to go. I say, "Enjoy yourself while you are still young: Take every opportunity to add to your kete of "WHO IS ME".


















# Stars Community Project

We appreciate the partnership with the Waikato River Trails and look forward to working with them next year.






















# TOKOROA HIGH SCHOOL TRUST


