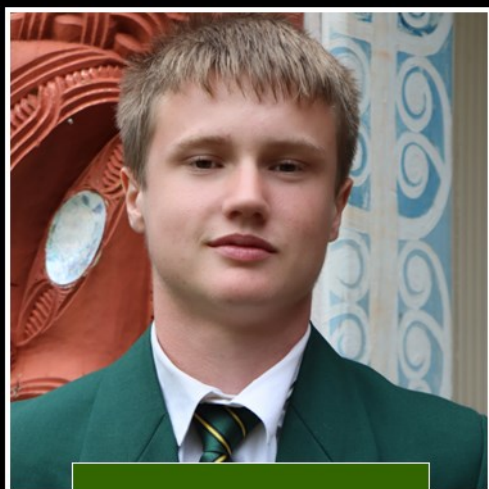

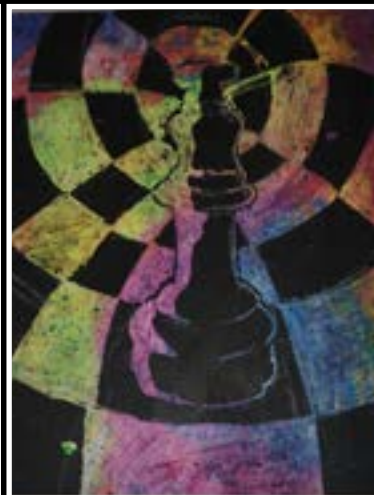
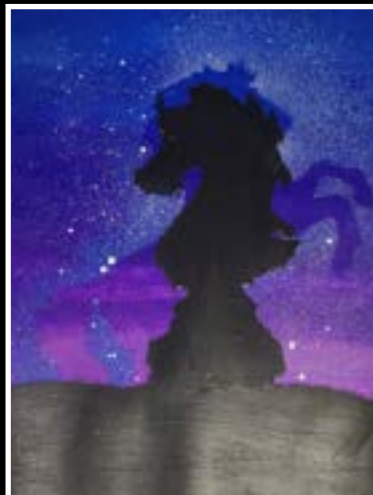
KYAH TOWNSEND

These assessments involve performing technically demanding pieces in front of an audience. For these students it was the culmination of over 10 weeks of rehearsal.

Representing our Year 11's we had bassist Sam Patena-Tiare who had prepared two pieces for the event – completing the NCEA assessment with "Rua Kenana" by Tuhoë and "For Whom the Bell Tolls" by Metallica. Vocalist Ataahua-Leigh Hemi also took to the stage to present a highly convincing rendition of "Back to Black" by Amy Winehouse.

From our Year 12 cohort we had vocalist Jesse Parsons who opened the concert with "Khait Maputi Na Ang Buhok Ko" by Richard Poon. 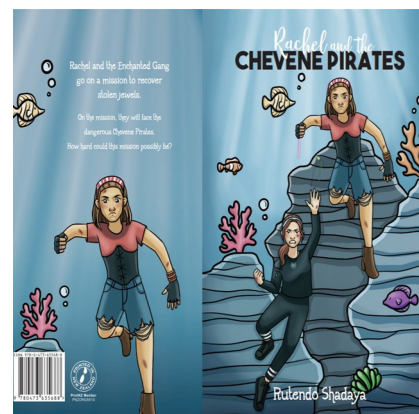
Key Achievements:

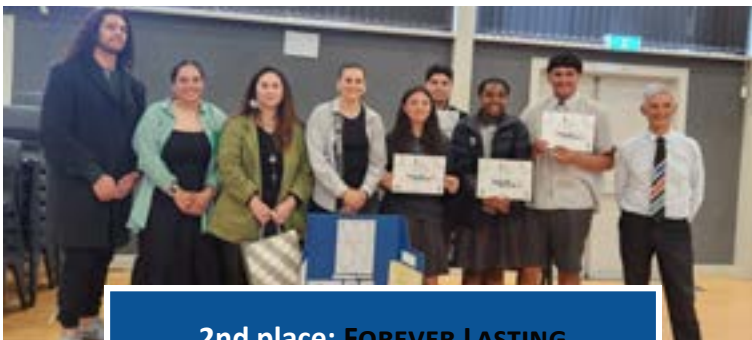

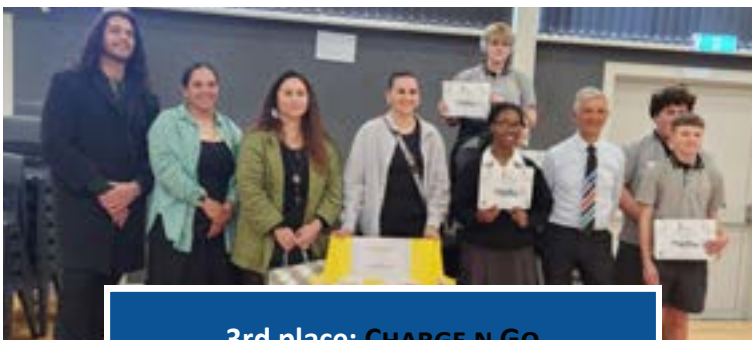

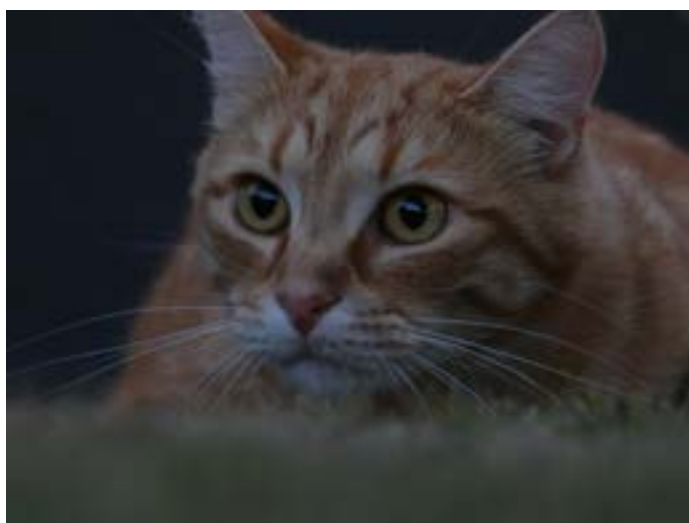


Tokoroa High School PHOTOGRAPHY CLUB

I AM UNAPOLOGETICALLY MĀORI

Who am I? What am I? And what do I stand for? This unimportant white girl whose skin colour gets me places, but then again, I'm just another white face lost in the crowd. As a young woman with mixed whakapapa, struggling to define my identity; society often categorises people based on their skin colour. You see for too long I have been told I am too white for one group - yet not white enough for the other. **But I, I am** more than this and I refuse to be defined by someone else's narrow-minded perceptions. **I am unapologetically Māori**, and I always have been. Regardless of my skin colour - I am **Māori** and I will not apologise for it.

I have often been told that I have "white privilege" over darker-skinned Māori, but I refuse to believe that my achievements are solely based on my skin colour. Yes, I may have been given certain advantages in life because of my white skin, but that does not diminish the hard work and time I've put into my studies. I graduated, and I earned that right as a white girl who ALSO happens to be proudly Māori. Unfortunately, there is still a persuasive pattern of shame that exists within society and this only gaslights a vicious cycle of negativity and self-doubt.

But you know what, I have to believe that this is not what we want. I have to believe that what we want is to challenge the equilibrium.

We need to educate ourselves and learn from prolific people like the late Sir Turi Carrol who stood firmly in both words and who advocated for the rights of Maori. Or follow in the footsteps of leaders like Dame Whina Kupa who walked the walk and said **'Maori Ma' not one more acre to be sold - I will die fighting for my people.** What about Hone Heke who chopped that flagpole not once but four times for false guarantees made under treaty of waitangi. **They did**

this unashamedly and unapologetically for who? for us. So that we can stand tall and proud and fight for our tino rangatiratanga.

Now - when we look at this concept of being unapologetically Māori, who do we see? I see leaders fighting to make change. Māori parliament leaders who will not apologise for being who they are and standing strong in their Maoritanga. I see Māori who push against the barriers of white supremacy - a man in Parliament, who refused to be shoved into a mould made by white men. **Rawiri Waititi exclaimed "My tie is my taonga. It's my tie to my people, to our mana motuhake."** This is **such a pivotal moment** - When I see leaders who are not afraid to stand up and fight for their land, language, and self-determination.

Land disputes have always been **contentious**. Ihumatao served as a powerful testament to why we as Māori should never be apologetic for fighting for our precious resources. During the land dispute, our people refused to back down in the face of adversity. Fighting for our mana motuhake and full autonomy over our precious resources which are the key to our future sustainability.

Whanau here me when I say - I AM a young woman with mixed whakapapa, who has struggled to define my identity in a society that 'DOES' categorise people based on their skin colour. **Too** white for one group -**YET**- Not white enough for the other. **But I, I am** more than this and I refuse to be defined by someone else's narrow-minded perceptions - And whanau neither should you. I am unapologetically Māori, and I always have been. Regardless of my skin colour - I am **Māori** and I will **NOT** apologise for it! **We are Maori** and we will **NOT** apologise for it!

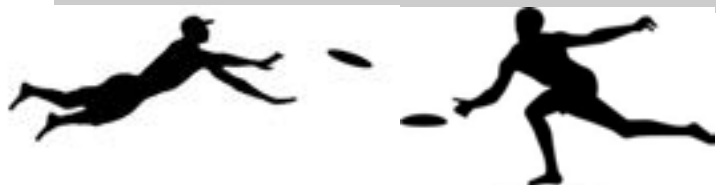
KI O RAHI

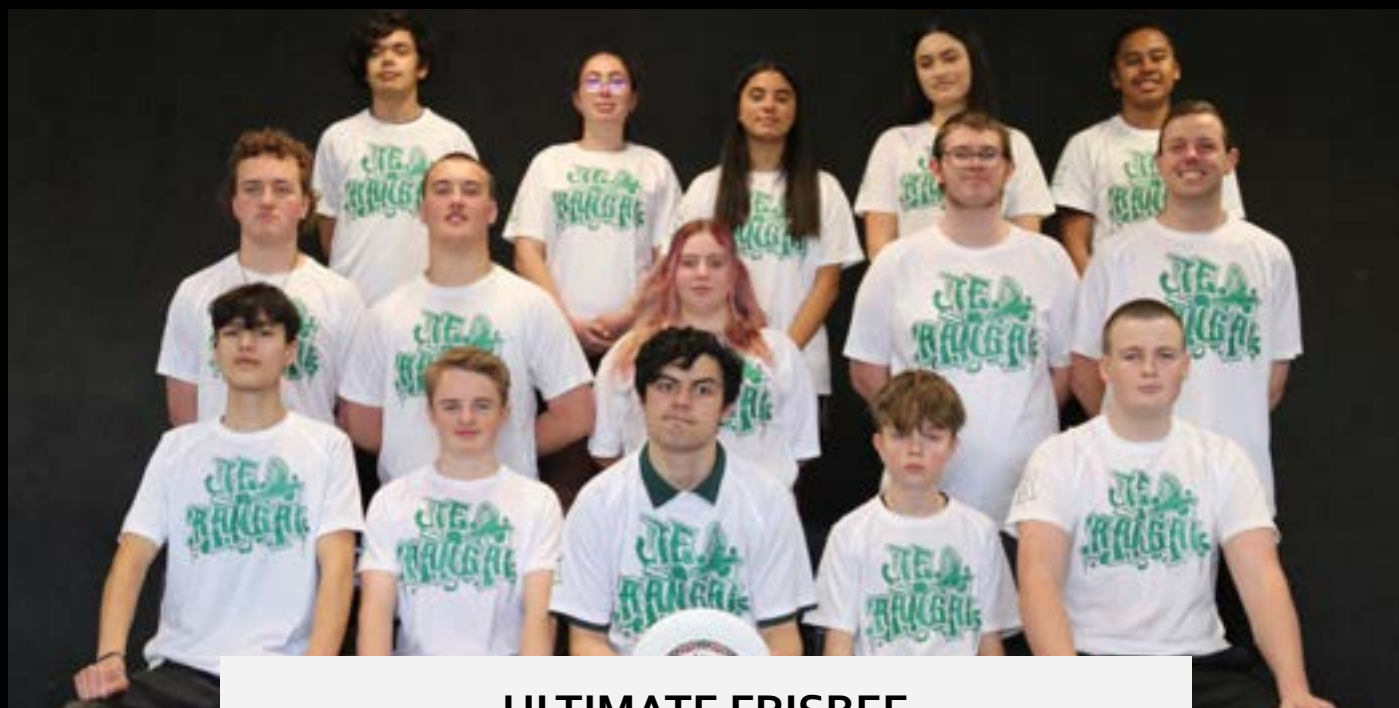

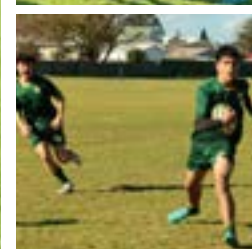

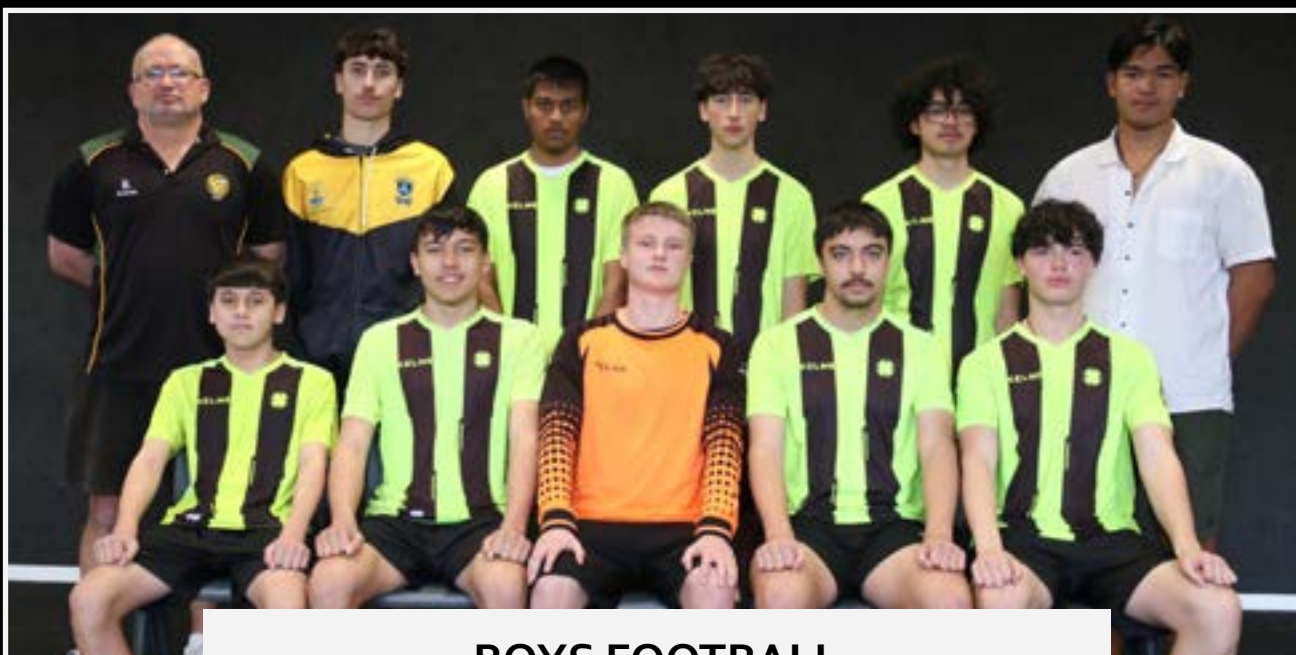

Final score 29-22 with Zoe Fraser in her first year of rugby making some metre eating runs as well as some solid hits in D.



Game 4 vs Otorohanga at home saw us play for the first time with the "Game On" rule in play. With them only being able to field 10 players it was an opportunity for some of our players to get some decent game time. Although we ended up with 15 v 15 after loaning them some players it wasn't long until injury struck. And by not long im talking within the 1st minute one of their players dislocated her knee. Quickly followed by one of ours, Tyra Costa putting her knee cap out of place 30secs later. We took this game 55-5. Saydee & Sasha scoring 7 tries between them.

In the final week before school holidays we had another clash of codes. This time regional Rugby League vs Taikura to secure a place in the NZ National Secondary Schools competition landed on the same day as our second round kicked off. As you can imagine at Tokoroa High 95% of our league players are also our rugby players. What a game of league it was too. A draw at fulltime with Taikura resulting in a golden point play-off which also meant we had a matter of minutes to get from Ngaruawahia to Hamilton to play HGHS. We arrived just before kick off to quickly run on to the field from the vans and got the drubbing we deserved from a very well drilled and disciplined outfit. Bumps and bruises from league and girls not being able to play meant we finished the game having to use 2 of their players. Going down 52-0 but a two week break was coming.

During week 2 of the break we held a rugby camp in Rotorua using the services of former All Black and Hurricanes trainer Lipi Sinnott. We had two training blocks with him doing a circuit training and endurance session in the morning followed by a skill session in the afternoon. So much was learnt in so little time. The evening had us doing a boxing session at Waikite Gym followed by recovery at Rotorua Aquatic Centre. 5.15am rise the next morning much to their dismay and it was back to the gym for a weights session before departing home.

Week 1 back at school and with a few personnel changes and again struggling to get numbers at training we struggled against Cambridge High who finished on top of the table going down 49-12.

Forest View were next up and surprise surprise numbers at training and one of the first times we've had an entire backline there. If there's a game to put everything you've learned into practice this was it. We took the game to them driving the ball up the middle before sending it wide to our backline who duly obliged every opportunity they got creating space or busting through on attack and knocking them back on defence. Saydee, Tui, Lineta Misa playing for the first time at second V and Paige Kohere were responsible for most of the destruction and our wingers Armani Te Whiu & Kaedyn Amouta always in support putting in a solid team effort and taking the win 44-0. Holding any team to zero takes a mammoth effort and our girls put it altogether in front of our home crowd with the forwards setting a great platform.

Our final game Vs Rototuna who much like Tokoroa play on heart was a torrid affair going try for try for a while before we managed to nudge ahead with all our conversions going over 3 tries (Taylah, Tui, Armani) to 2 and a 21-10 score line to finish our year and finish in 3rd placing. The game itself could've broken wide open with Olivierre being chopped down millimetres short of the line on two occasions after some long range breaks courtesy of some power running from Jacqueline Jones in a stellar performance.

Overall the year was a successful one and I'd like to thank everyone of the girls who showed up. Who fronted up. Who answered SOS calls when we had no numbers. Our ring in coaches like myself. Our trainers. The parents who allow your girls to play. The parents who don't know your girls are playing and our management team of one. Without you we wouldn't have a team and they wouldn't have created these rugby memories of 2023.

A team full of potential and promise for the 2024 season!!!
